
A CAMBRIDGE INSTITUTION

The Fox & Tishman Diner, Delicatessen and
Restaurant at 304-310 Main Street fed the
Kendall Square neighborhood through the
Depression and World War II, and became a
favorite of locals & MIT students. Founded in 1924
by Isaac Fox and Robert Tishman, it was later run
by Marvin Fox & Maynard Tishman the second
generation of the F&T.

The original dining car was expanded towards the street to add booth seating, and the adjacent restaurant could seat 125 people at wooden booths and a long bar. The iconic "EAT" sign served as a beacon, drawing in customers from all walks of life to this neighborhood favorite.

For many years, it was the only restaurant in Kendall Square as the area underwent a transformation in the 1970s and 1980s. For years the F&T changed with the neighborhood, as Marvin remarked to the Boston Globe in 1982, "we're doing terrific now and we're not going to change all that much. Maybe a little change in the menu . . . we serve quiche now, for instance."





THE "RED DEATH DINER"


The nickname given to the F&T by MIT Students, ostensibly due to the red metal exterior paneling.



60 YEARS IN KENDALL



There's no fare in the Square-- only Harvard Yard and clip-joints that take a credit card.


What they sell at Lobdell is recycled sludge prepared to nourish, at best, a grudge.

MEMORIES & MEMENTOS

ALL THAT REMAINS

After the 304–310 Main Street parcel was sold for the MBTA station, a significant effort was made to move the dining car for potential re-use. The interior of the restaurant and diner was salvaged as best as possible and put into storage, and the dining car jacked up and moved on a trailer to a parking lot near One Kendall Square.

Ultimately the many adaptations made to the dining car over the years proved to be too much, and the structure did not survive. However, much of the exterior paneling was carefully removed and preserved.

The red paneling was part of an 1995 exhibit at the *Museum of Our National Heritage* called "American Diner," and the 2006 exhibit "Counter Culture:

HAND-PAINTED SIGNS



125 HISTORIC SEATS


IF THESE BOOTHS COULD TALK

Running the length of the restaurant, numbered, and completed by a chrome stand upon which to hang your hat, these wooden booths were home to thousands of meaningful—and meaningless!— conversations in Kendall Square's history. Approximately 125 seats and formica-topped tables remain and can be restored and reused.
