When we launched the South Sound CARE Foundation in 2008, our desire was to bring novel treatments and better access to research options for our cancer patients in the South Sound. In 2023, we made great strides toward our mission through incredible new clinical treatment options and collaborations. We have patients who are living longer, and they are living better lives.

Last year, I talked about Adeline, a young woman suffering from an aggressive brain cancer. This bright young woman had experienced a rapid reoccurrence to her resected tumor. She was struggling with walking and speaking, and was severely fatigued. The South Sound CARE Foundation was able to access the NEO 100 treatment for her, and after 12 cycles and almost one year of treatment, she is truly living life again. Adeline recently traveled to Florida with her husband and two young children, and has even resumed her yoga practice. The size of her tumor has shrunk from the size of a lemon to the size of an acorn.

2023 also marked important collaborations with MultiCare-we have now opened two trials from the National Cancer Institute through the Southwest Oncology Group (SWOG). These focus on breast cancer and lung cancer. We are also excited to work with Dr. Lu at the Salish Cancer Center to bring access to research to the Puyallup Tribe and the Salish Cancer Center.

Thank you for partnering with us on this journey and sharing in our desire to make a difference with local cancer patients.




\$306K IN **MOLECULAR TESTING**

Patients received critical molecular testing valued at \$306,000 thanks to our partners at Caris Life Sciences.



12 CLINICAL TRIALS

Partnering with Multicare, we increased local research trial options with the addition of 12 industry trials in pancreatic cancer, colon cancer, prostate cancer, bladder cancer, breast cancer, Multiple Myeloma, Myelofibrosis, and MDS/AML.



AS WE LAUNCH INTO 2024...

Our hope is to report on even more extensive community collaborations and a central focus on research options, coming together not as independent practices and health care systems, but as a community focused on patient care and access to research.



\$1.5M VALUE OF MEDICATION RECEIVED

\$1.5 million worth of medication received through our applications for Off Label Use and Compassionate Use. SSCF Coordinators navigated the complex regulatory process with the FDA and pharmaceutical companies to bring these agents to our patients.



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KNOWLEDGE-SHARING TOWARDS A CURE

Triple negative breast cancer is an aggressive and dynamic disease, with metastases displaying characteristics that frequently differ from the primary tumor. It is more fast-growing than other types of breast cancer and has a higher risk of metastasis and recurrence.

As an innovative approach to determining the feasibility and merit of performing and analyzing biopsies to inform patient treatment, the Intensive Trial of Omics in Cancer (ITOMIC) study was launched as the South Sound CARE Foundation's first significant trial. Designed by Dr. Tony Blau, Dr. Sibel Blau and Dr. Frank Senecal, the study began enrolling patients in 2013.

In 2018, the CARE Foundation hired Study Director, Dr. Kimberly Burton, who brought the trial in-house. Burton shares,





"Like many, I have been touched by cancer and greatly appreciated the opportunity to participate in this groundbreaking clinical trial. When the trial moved from the University of Washington to the South Sound Care Foundation, I wanted to continue with this work in hopes of providing clinical trial opportunities for women faced with the difficult diagnosis of cancer."

Local Treatment Informed by National Expertise

Patients participating in the trial enroll in All4Cure, an innovative data-sharing platform that aims to harness the power of genomic testing and collaborative knowledge-sharing to enhance patient care and accelerate cancer research. Their test results and medical records are shared on the platform, allowing experts across the country to review cases, provide feedback, and offer insights into treatment options based on similar genomic profiles—a shared resource rarely seen in traditional medical settings.

Leveraging this expansive network of cancer advocates, experts, patient data, and resources through All4Cure, The South Sound CARE Foundation and our medical partners are bringing the most innovative treatment options, research, and resources to patients in our South Sound community. EXPLORE A HEARTENING PATIENT UPDATE:

TABATHA

In 2016, Tabatha, then 35 years old, noticed a lump in her armpit. Despite two normal mammograms, a biopsy in 2018 revealed triple-negative breast cancer. Tabatha underwent chemotherapy, a bilateral mastectomy, and radiation. She remained disease-free until January 2023 when a biopsy revealed a recurrence in her bones.



Tabatha shares, "Sometimes as a patient, you feel like you're another number in the system. But with the CARE team, you feel like you're noticed, a person—you matter."

As of January 2024, Tabatha's PET scans show stable disease—an encouraging development!









AN EXCITING COMMUNITY COLLABORATION

We are thrilled to announce a new collaboration with the Puyallup Tribe and **Dr. Lu of the Salish Cancer Center**, aimed at extending access to cutting-edge research and trials to patients who are navigating the complexities of cancer.

The Salish Cancer Center, a state-of-the-art facility in Tacoma, Washington, was the first Tribe-owned facility of its kind in the

United States when it opened in 2015. Since then, it has been at the forefront of community-centered cancer care. Committed to providing evidence-based and personalized cancer treatments, the center offers chemotherapy, naturopathic integrative oncology, targeted anti-cancer therapies, acupuncture, native healing, and immunotherapies. The South Sound CARE Foundation looks forward to expanding the range of innovative cancer research options available to the Salish Cancer Center's patient population.

"Our Salish Cancer Center is open to the public.
All patients who need service are welcome," Puyallup
Tribal Councilwoman Monica Miller said, emphasizing
that no patients are turned away. The South Sound CARE
Foundation will work with Dr. Lu and his team to provide
clinical research options for patients who are no longer
responding to standard of care treatments. Patients will
have access to these resources locally, allowing them to
remain close to home—surrounded by their loved ones
and communities—while receiving treatment.





MEET TIM & KIRSTEN WYNNE

Meet CARE donors, Tim and Kirsten Wynne, partners in life and philanthropy. Local, small business owners themselves, they understand the monumental impact of a strong community rallying around those who need it most, and take pride in supporting CARE and other philanthropic causes dear to them.

How did you get involved with CARE?

KIRSTEN: Gordon invited us to sit at his table at Beer and Bites the year we met him. You get to the event, and see the profound impact that your work is doing for people in their lives, and how can you say no?

TIM: We got involved with CARE through Gordon, but my relationship with cancer comes professionally. For over 30 years, I've worked with surgical products that treat cancer, and know the course that a prognosis puts patients and their families on.

We went through it ourselves. I was diagnosed with melanoma 20 years ago. There is this period where you don't know if it's spread. Even if it hasn't metastasized, which it hadn't in my case, it changes lives.

Why is CARE important to the South **Sound Community?**

KRISTEN: We've seen first hand the impact on people who don't have access in their local communities to the kind of care that CARE provides. Tim's from Montana. One of his best friends' was diagnosed with esophageal cancer. He and his wife came to live with us for 6 months while he was receiving treatment in Seattle because they didn't have access to treatment at home in Montana.

The work CARE is doing makes it so people here in South Sound hopefully don't have to uproot their lives and live somewhere else while they are going through probably the most difficult thing they've dealt with in their lives.

TIM: A lot of people don't know this, but 35-40% of all humans will be diagnosed with cancer sometime in their lives. Cancer survival rates have increased dramatically. This is not because cancer has become less lethal on its own. It's because of the efforts of organizations like CARE and the willingness of people to participate in research. Some patients survive and live longer than they would have, which is a victory. These trials also capture important data that can help those who face cancer downstream.

Why is CARE a priority in your giving?

KIRSTEN: It feels to me that CARE is helping people who had nowhere else to go. There is no question in my mind that our donations are helping to make a profound difference in peoples' lives.

What would you say to someone considering supporting CARE for the first time?

TIM: Come to Beer and Bites and see the energy of the organization. This tells you all you need to know. There are plenty of people and causes, but it would be hard to argue that the South Sound CARE Foundation isn't one that should be strongly considered!
