

LIVING HISTORY ~ THE TRADITION STARTS WITH YOU

THE LADY LIGHTHOUSE KEEPER OF ANGEL ISLAND

As any mariner knows, fog in San Francisco Bay can be treacherous, rolling in without warning, blanketing islands, hills and shallows, shrouding landmarks, rocks and ships, and bouncing light and sound off water. After the Gold Rush, shipwrecks and collisions were common and as more merchant ships, steamers and ferries traveled the bay, new lighthouses, fog bells, horns, and buoys were added to aid navigation.

In October 1886, the Daily Alta reported, "The new fog signal recently built on the southwest corner of Angel Island is ready for use and will go into operation on Wednesday next... The bell at the station, during fogs, will be struck twice in quick succession at 15 seconds intervals."

To keep the fog bell working, a lighthouse keeper was retained and a residence built high up on Point Knox that was reached by a narrow footbridge. A separate building jutting over the rocky cliffs housed the huge 3,000 pound fog bell operated by a Gamewell bell striking machine with a heavy weight suspended below to power the mallet striker. Once the mechanism was wound, it would operate for several hours.

From 1902-1914, the fog bell keeper at Angel Island was Juliet Fish Nichols, widow of a former lighthouse inspector. In the early morning of July 2, 1906 with heavy fog rolling in, Juliet woke to the warning blasts of the Lime Point foghorns at the Golden Gate and went to turn on the striking machine. It failed. She tried again. Knowing the importance of the Angel Island fog bell to the Tiburon steamer ferries

passing Point Knox, and with no way of summoning help, Juliet began ringing the bell by hand - two blows every 15 seconds. The fog persisted and she kept banging for 20 hours and 35 minutes!

Just two days later the machine broke down again. Juliet later recorded in her logbook: "On the night of – 4th of July, the machine went to pieces, the great tension bar broke in two and I could not disconnect the hammer to strike by hand. I stood all night on the platform and struck the bell with a nail hammer with all my might... "During her tenure at Point Knox, she reported at least eight striking machine failures. For her outstanding service, she received a medal from the Lighthouse District and her salary, which in 1912 was \$500, a year plus 20 cents per diem for rations.

In 1961 a new, more modern lighthouse and fog station opened at Point Blunt on Angel Island and the Point Knox lighthouse and bell structures destroyed. Today, the only thing left is the big bronze bell still showing the hammer marks Juliet made to keep the ships in the fog from running aground.

1. In early 1900s, Tiburon was a busy railway and ferry terminus with huge sidewheel ferry steamers like the Ukiah and James M. Donahue carrying passengers and cargo to San Francisco.

2. The Angel Island lighthouse keeper's residence at Fort Knox was an isolated and lonely spot with its fog bell housed in a separate building over the cliffs.

3. In 1961, the huge 3,000 pound fog bell was abandoned on the foundation of the old lighthouse station facing the Golden Gate.




In addition to the company of trusty Ollie, Jen and Jeff have three teenaged children who take precedence in their lives. Their eldest is Rhys, a sophomore at Redwood High School and represents the school's track team in the 100- and 200-meter dashes, and twins, Gaby and Caroline, are 8th graders at Saint Hilary School who enjoy playing tennis and soccer. For the record, Caroline is older by one minute. Rhys played on the Tiburon Sharks competitive soccer team for a few years and the girls recently wrapped up a great Tiburon Sharks rec season. The Marples family entered Saint Hilary in 2011, when Rhys started Kindergarten and the girls followed the year after entering the pre-k program. When the twins finish up this school year at Saint Hilary, they will be the final graduating class who have been stalwarts of the pre-k program, closing out a chapter at the school. Jen and Jeff are so grateful for the community that they have grown with at Saint Hilary, especially with the support that fellow parents have provided to The Marples' entrepreneurial family.

Following Jen's studies at the University of Iowa, she moved back to Hawaii for a little over two years and began her career in public relations. Looking to make a change, she moved to Colorado and worked for a boutique public relations firm. 

On her weekly podcast, Jen features female entrepreneurs in their forties and fifties and asks them to share their best advice to fellow women who are perhaps struggling to make that leap out of their comfort zone to pursue their true and fulfilling passion. The show encourages women to come together to wake up to their potential to get what they deserve, despite feeling that it may be too late in life to make the attempt. She wholeheartedly believes that "every single woman has something incredible to share and that it's not too late to do whatever the heck you want" which could be the a-ha moment for a listener seeking to make a change in their personal or professional lives. Jen's goal for the future is to engage in more public speaking events nationally where she can continue to help inspire midlife women to achieve the life and business that they desire. She's on a mission to empower and activate over one million midlife women! She continues to coach a variety of women, host events, run masterminds and conversation series, and plans to write a book this vear: you might have an idea what the book will be called! She can be found dispensing daily life advice and inspiration all over social media, so make sure to follow her @jenmarples. Outside of her professional time, she continues to be supportive of all those around her by serving on the board of the Sparkle Foundation, whose mission is to ensure that struggling single mothers and their children are supported via an annual Holiday Gift Drive and ongoing enrichment programs. She also runs a monthly Redwood Parents Connect group meeting for 10th-grade parents to share resources and discuss topics like stress, anxiety, parenting, and college, and sits on the board of the Punahou Alumni Association of Northern California.

With their whirlwind of professional lives, The Marples balance out work with nightly family walks around their neighborhood, frequent trips to Hawaii to visit Jen's side of the family as well as trips to Mammoth.

For a few generations, Jeff's family has enjoyed owning a cozy cabin by Twin Lakes. The family enjoys fishing, hiking, horseback riding, playing games, and unplugging from life as the cabin has no WIFI, much to the dismay of the kids. As a way of keeping her driven personality calm and centered, Jen practices yoga, which she has done ritually for over 15 years. She jokes that the whole family would be in major trouble if she didn't zen out with her daily flow! Jeff, on the other hand, takes out his stress on the Sonoma Raceway with Lemons Racing. The 24 Hours of Lemons is an endurance race of 150 low-value, beater vehicles in which the car that evades being damaged so far as to be dragged off the track and circles the most laps within the two-day event, wins. He and his teammate of friends race a 1996 Subaru Legacy four-door sedan as their contender. Amongst his other vehicles that bring him joy off the demolition-prone racetrack are a red 1963 Porsche 356S inherited from his father and a 1969 BMW 2002 street legal race car. Rhys has recently caught the car bug too, jump starting his soon to be collection with a 1992 BMW E36 coupe. Jeff is grateful that Rhys has yet to learn how to drive stick, keeping Jeff's prized possessions safe in the garage until further notice!

In a year's time, we will have to circle back with The Marples to see if any new wheels have been parked in the garage and what new businesses Jen's listeners and clients have been motivated to start. With the release of this May issue of the magazine, The Jen Marples Show will have released its 60th episode! To this family that supports each other through all of the hard work and dedication to their crafts, we wish success and commend them for the positivity and motivation that they exude to the universe. The futures of those who cross paths with Jeff and Jen, both personally and professionally, are sure to shine brightly.



Everyclay Colored Gemstones AND ALTERNATIVE ENGAGEMENT GEMSTONE RINGS

History:

Engagement rings have shown betrothment at least since the early Romans. Roman men gave their future wife an iron ring to wear, signaling their commitment. It was worn on the fourth finger of the left hand because it was thought that a vein ran down that finger, directly to the heart. Somewhere around the 4th century, inscriptions inside the band became popular.

Traditionally, diamonds have been the gemstone of choice for engagement rings since the middle 1400s. The diamonds from that period had very primitive cutting, usually ending up without sparkle. Even higher quality diamonds with little to no inclusions looked lack-

luster. Diamonds were chosen because of their hardness (10 on Mohs' scale), signifying a lifelong commitment to each other. To make up for the dull, mostly gray gemstones, goldsmithing took on beautiful, sometimes elaborate designs with royal fleur-de-lis and floral themes.

By the 17th century, diamonds were discovered in Brazil, making them less rare and more affordable to people other than nobility. By the time diamonds were discovered in Africa in the 18th century, lapidaries had started perfecting their faceting. The diamonds were still dull, and usually rose cut and worn as a halo around a center colored gemstone, or as a cluster of smaller diamonds bunched together. During the 19th century, lapidaries had begun to perfect faceting,

learning that light could bounce off facets within the gemstone and have a prism effect with sparkle. Between the improvements in faceting, the rich deposits of newly discovered diamonds in Africa and the industrial revolution, more people could now afford to use diamonds as engagement rings. By the mid-1800s, the diamonds were cut so beautifully that they were now being used alone in engagement rings.

The diamond was the engagement ring of choice for many people until 1981, when Princess Diana chose a beautiful 12 carat oval blue sapphire, surrounded by 14 diamonds in 18K white gold. Diana had become a worldwide fashion leader, and the alternative engagement ring was born. People soon discovered that there were other colors of sapphire – yellows, greens, pinks, purples and reds (rubies) were now becoming fashionable, with red being the universal color of love. Movie stars and other celebrities started wearing colored gemstones, mined from all over the world. Elizabeth Taylor, known for her massive diamonds, was given a huge emerald for an engagement ring from Richard Burton. New deposits of garnets, tourmalines, aquamarines, emeralds, morganites, etc. became very popular gemstones.

It is important to note that colored gemstones vary in hardness, and some are not suitable for everyday wear. At California Girl Jewelry, we have over 34 different species of gemstones, with about a dozen that work well for alternative engagement rings. We offer diamond rinas as well.

Here is a list of some popular gemstones, recommended and not recommended for everyday wear, especially if you are 'hard' on your jewelry:

Recommended:

Sapphire, ruby, tourmaline, spinel, garnet, aquamarine, Oregon sunstone, phenakite, Danburite, alexandrite and chrysoberyl, natural zircon, color changing diaspore, emerald, kunzite, Morganite, amethyst, citrine and topaz.

Not recommended (lower than 7.0 on Mohs' scale of hardness): Tanzanite, moonstone, opal, sphene, pearls, turquoise, coral, rhodochrosite, peridot.


We are seeing a lot of spinels, Morganites, Oregon sunstones, tourmalines and garnets become engagement rings. Most of the colored gemstones above are much rarer than diamonds and come in a rainbow of colors. Garnets, tourmalines, and sapphires for example, each are naturally found in thousands of shades. The rarer the color, the pricier. The padparadscha sapphire is the rarest color of sapphire, and has become popular since Princess Eugenie, the granddaughter of Queen Elizabeth II, received one for her spectacular engagement ring, 'Padparadscha' is the Sinhalese word meaning lotus blossom, as the coloris a beautiful combination of pink and orange, in various peachy saturations.


The rarest of the durable gemstones are copper-bearing and color-changing. Spinels, Alexandrites, sapphires, diaspores, tourmalines and garnets all have rare color change varieties that will change colors in candlelight and incandescent lighting. Oregon sunstones and tourmalines have varieties that are copper bearing. These are rare, and the microscopic copper particles in the gemstones explode in sparkle when sunlight shines on them. The copper-bearing tourmaline is especially rare, also called a "Paraiba" tourmaline and is usually neon blue to green in color.

For people that adore opals, and want to wear them every day, there is one variety that actually is strong and durable – the Mintabie opal from Australia.

If you're looking for an everyday ring, it's best to do your homework and talk to knowledge-able gemologists that specialize in colored gemstones. There are so many choices, it really depends on your favorite color. Newly discovered rare deposits of purple (Bishop's) garnets, neon green garnets, 'purple pearl' amethysts, bright neon fire engine red ("Jedi") spinels, lavender sapphires, platinum spinels, etc. are now popular with gemstone collectors, jewelry designers, and couples looking for something rare, beautiful and different.

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
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The Best is Yet to Come

WAITING IN THE Month of May

If you're an irregular or frequent reader of this column, you may remember the piece I wrote a little over a year ago on Caspian Terns. At that time, I was reflecting on the turning of the New Year and a new project I was immensely looking forward to. The global pandemic ultimately delayed this work an entire year. However, I'm thrilled to now report it is not only back on schedule, but implemented along the eastern shoreline of Aramburu Island. For the first time in my center's 65 year history, we have launched a Caspian Tern Social Attraction Breeding Program.

Caspian Terns are incredible birds. They're quite large in size, stark white and black in color, and showcase a vibrant orange bill. They're also incredibly loud and their gravelly rrrraeu call easily echoes across bay waters. Although a common site in Richardson Bay and nearby shorelines for nearly half of the calendar year, Caspian Terns have always chosen to visit Aramburu Island, but not stay for breeding purposes. Instead they head to eastern and southern portions of San Francisco Bay such as Brooks Island and Eden Landing. Their departure has always been a bit of mystery to me – the Caspian Terns being here one moment, but gone the next. I have yearned for them to stay and raise young on what I assume to be perfect – albeit small – habitat for rearing young. Hence, the inauguration of our breeding program.

It began with handful of unique purchases, as many biological and conservation-based projects do. With the expertise of and support from Mad River Decoys, nearly two dozen bare and unpainted Caspian Tern decoys were delivered to our center's mailbox. We asked local youth in our teen leadership program to help paint them. I was even able to help put the final touches on the decoys. We also purchased a hand-built sound kit from Murremaid Music Boxes, which is a solar-rechargeable call system for seabird attraction. The system includes weatherproof speakers and case, a large solar panel, and a small MP3 player that is preloaded with a repeating cacophony of Caspian Tern calls. With these two very different types of conservation tools and a little people-power, we had everything we needed.

Using decoys and sound systems is a tried-and-true method for encouraging birds to nest in designated areas. Strategically placing life-like decoys and playing realistic colony sounds creates the impression a particular habitat is safe and desirable. As conservation practitioners, we assume our resident Caspian Terns will realize the decoys are not real, but will still be encouraged to perhaps stay longer on Aramburu Island, eventually find a mate as well as successfully nest and rear chicks. If we are successful this year, Caspian Terns will hopefully return year after year, as long as the island remains safe and nesting conditions are satisfactory.

So, how will we know when we've succeeded? This is where the waiting game truly begins. Caspian Terns, when not actively foraging, spend their time resting on gravel shorelines in large colonies. In fact, on Aramburu Island we've counted hundreds of them at one time. Due to the fact the nest of a Caspian Tern consists of no more than the slightest scrape in the ground and the eggs are nearly the same color as the island substrate, it is quite difficult to determine what they're exactly doing. Are they simply resting on the shoreline or secretly protecting tiny floofs from the elements and potential predators?

I suppose it's more than waiting game. It's also like I-Spy and other games of observation and my staff are the patient players. Several times a week the center's biologist and fellow climb the hillside on the property to peek down upon both the real and not-so-real tern colony. There's a perfect viewpoint on this hillside that allows us to watch without disturbing. We won't be kayaking near the eastern shoreline of Aramburu Island or walking near the site for quite some time. We're also asking the public to extend the same courtesy to the Caspian Terns. That being said, I do invite you to view them from the top of the hill at the center. Bring a scope or stop by my office and borrow one from me. I'd love to spend part of my day watching (and waiting for) Mother Nature to do her work.
