FROM THE CO-PRESIDENTS

The VT Mission to Israel



What an honor it was to have travelled with our rabbi and fellow congregants, on a mission to Israel, to bear witness, learn, volunteer and connect with fellow Jews. Our hearts were broken as we met with families of hostages still being held in Gaza. We were in awe hearing from the heroes who saved hundreds of people at the *kibbutzim* and the site of the Nova festival, and we were inspired by stories of civilians coming together in countless ways to help each other pick up the pieces and keep moving forward.

We met with thought leaders, journalists, and military experts who shared their perspectives on how, given the long history of the Jews, we've gotten to where we are and thoughts on where we go from here in both Israel and the United States. We also had the opportunity to celebrate a *bat mitzvah* on the site where David conquered Goliath, to celebrate *Shabbat* with a

congregation in Tel Aviv, *havdalah* and *Purim* with a congregation in Modi'in, and to help pick strawberries in the fields where the workers have all been called up to serve.

A Spiritual Home and Legacy Created

“If they asked me I could write a book...” That’s how I feel as I try to write about the decades I’ve spent serving The Village Temple. So many members and families have supported and nurtured me, and joy has been gifted me by the hundreds of children who’ve been in our children’s choir. So many clergy and staff members, too, have shaped my understanding of our work and have shared compassion

and encouragement as we navigated what it means to keep a spiritual home alive. Because that is what VT has been for me—A Spiritual Home. Sitting at the piano on Tuesdays, looking up at the eternal light, I’ve had quite a few conversations with God, as I struggled with writing a new song or to find a way to give children wings when they are depleted and exhausted by long days or world events. How to help a child feel that they matter, that they can make a difference, and leave feeling lighter and more joyful than when they arrived.

The first day I walked into The Village Temple in 1986, I was about to be married and promised our Cleveland Rabbi to be a *“card-carrying member of a NYC shul and raise my children to be educated Jews.”* I passed this cute little shul many times, assuming it was conservative or orthodox, just by its look. One day I read on the marquee outside that it was Reform, so in I went in and met Rabbi Math, told him I got paid next to nothing as an adjunct professor at NYU, but my father had been a cantor, and I could offer music services as my dues. And that was it. I started right away doing Sunday afternoon concerts with my sisters who did cabaret shows with me. Before long I was playing piano for services and singing harmony with Cantor Levine. When my daughter turned 5, she asked at a *Rosh Hashanah* service if she could join the children’s choir. We approached the wonderful director Joanne Loewy, who said “Sure! Just come next week and sing with us on *Yom Kippur!*” And she did, and not too much later, Joanne got work in Pennsylvania and asked me to take over the choir. At first I hesitated, but with the help of a wonderful songwriter/song leader,

Adam Feder, I took on the choir as a beautiful collaboration. Adam wrote one of the choir favorites, *Maccabee Funk*. For the next 38 years I would write 14 songs with the choir, 16 Purimspiels, and compose music for services, at which I was honored to play and sing with Lisa Loren and a band of young musicians Rabbi Koster and then President Julie Salamon encouraged me to form. Soon Broadway friends (André DeShields, Chuck Cooper, Rebecca Naomi Jones) sang for MLK *Shabbat*, and a composer friend brought his oratorio *Book of Job: 911*.

Together, we also experienced some of the most cataclysmic times in NYC. After 911, the choir went to Ground Zero and sang at the one restaurant that stayed open 24/7 for essential workers. It was *Chanukah*, and the workers cried as the children sang. And I’ll never forget the rehearsal right after Hurricane Sandy when little Dakota Williams said with a sigh *“it’s been a rough week.”* During the covid pandemic, stalwart choir members stuck it out on Zoom, writing songs and even doing our *Wickedspiel* in the freezing cold on 12th Street against a backdrop of howling winds, blasting sirens, honking cars, barking dogs, screaming babies, and shouting traffic police. Only a year before that, they’d triumphed in *Esther of a Hamletown*. But having braved the worst, the next year they blasted back with *West Side Spiely*, followed by *Hamantasch Encanto* and this year’s *Little Purimaid*. Like our congregation, our choir has always been diverse, with children of all colors, ethnicities, and disabilities—Rebecca Dorzback being our Deaf ASL interpreter during her years, singing in the “key of Rebecca.” Susan Rosenberg Jones and Ron Weiss captured these marvelous children through such extraordinary times, with help from the Oppenheimer, Hodorov, Williams and Wilkinson dynasties!

Recently I received a Facebook message from two choir alumni. Julia Elmaleh-Sachs and Eli Seidman, now in their 30s, both effectively practicing *tikkun olam* in the world, sent me a video of themselves singing the choir’s first original song: *If We Sing Together*. And as they exclaimed at the end *“WE REMEMBER ALL THE WORDS!”* I realized that something amazing has occurred. Something my father actively pursued in his brief 48 years on earth. Something my mother continues at 91, supporting libraries, nature centers, and cancer research. A Legacy. As my daughter Holland

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SOCIAL ACTION AT THE VILLAGE TEMPLE

Meals + Miscellaneous for Migrants (M+M4M)

The Village Temple Social Action Committee (SAC) members have been spending afternoons volunteering in the kitchen at PS 11. On our first visit, on a drenching rainy spring day, we assisted lead chefs Jenny, Margarita, and Karina as they prepared Venezuelan chicken stew, potato beet and egg salad, rice, and a carrot and cabbage slaw. Jenny, who is from Venezuela, decided on the recipes, and Margarita, who is from Colombia, and Karina are chefs. Watching them cook was a treat. Many in PS 11's new immigrant community do not have regular access to cooking facilities, so this is a meaningful, enjoyable, and delicious activity.

This partnership between The Village Temple and PS 11 Programs, a 501C3 that runs after school and a camp program at PS11, was developed by SAC chairperson Rachel Glube and Debbie Osborne, Director of PS 11 Programs. The Village Temple and PS11 have many community members in common, and M+M4M was built on this foundation. During COVID, Rachel started donating toys, children's books, and warm clothing. The opportunity to do more

arose when UJA-New York developed a program offering grants to local synagogues and Jewish organizations in the New York metro area who were already engaged in the work of supporting families who had crossed the US/Mexico border. As Rachel started writing the grant proposal, she counted the number of congregants who have PS11 graduates in their families, and the number of PS11 parents who are currently members of The VT board of directors—33% of current VT board members were PS11 parents at one point in time.

The UJA wants to involve more congregants in welcoming migrants and asylum seekers in our communities, and Rachel developed a program to build upon shared experiences of congregants, deepen the relationship, and experiment with the goal of working together in the future. The Village Temple was awarded a grant, which is funding a social worker, after school care for the children of mothers in the program, and food for the sessions. The *“goal is to create an environment where each participant is treated with respect and dignity. The hope is that this program will yield deeper understanding among all participants and continued partnership between these two organizations in the future.”*

On April 17, Village Temple teens were in the kitchen!
