But that's not true for everyone. I recently attended a presentation on homelessness in the greater Lansing area and I learned that one of the most important shelter programs may have to close this summer.

Advent House Ministries in Lansing is the ONLY shelter in the area that is open on weekends. It is a low-barrier shelter, meaning people who are suffering from mental illness or substance abuse issues are not turned away. But they do so much more than simply shelter people in need.

For over 30 years, Advent House has helped people move from struggle to stability. They have adapted and evolved to meet the changing needs of the community. Advent House is dedicated to treating all people with compassion, dignity and understanding. They connect individuals and families with services and resources, including housing assistance, case management, and food assistance. Advent House is all about equipping and supporting people in a way that leads to long-term success.

Federal and State funds for programs like Advent House were plentiful in the wake of the Covid-19 pandemic. But now, funds are drying up. The shelter's finances are precarious, and it seems likely that the program will need to close during the summer months. I suppose this is better than closing during the winter months, but it is still a problem for our most vulnerable citizens, people for whom the livin' is never easy – summertime or wintertime.

The Peoples Church generously supports Advent House through our Community Engagement Ministry. But there is only so much we can do within our finite resources. We have many organizations that need financial support. And so I turn to you, the church.

So before we head to the lake this summer or take off on a well-deserved vacation, perhaps we could consider making a donation to Advent House Ministries? No one gift will save the day, but together, we can do amazing things! Just as many hands make light work, many small gifts make a big difference.

FROM OUR ASSOCIATE PASTOR

For years, I rolled my eyes at the thought of owning an e-reader. I snobbishly maintained that people who owned e-readers actually didn't like reading all that much. Who in their right mind would dare call themselves a book worm while willingly abstaining from the musty aroma of old paper? What kind of a book enthusiast didn't actually love books themselves? I, on the other hand, was a genuine lover of the written word with piles of vintage paperbacks to prove it.

I started to change my tune a bit when my best friend Martha bought a Kindle for her honeymoon. She and her husband Greg were going to spend two weeks in Greece, and a Kindle meant not having to lug an extra 20 pounds of paper around Mykonos. Over time, other benefits came to light. Martha and I were in a book club together and she'd often get her eBooks from the library



weeks before I ever got my hands on a physical copy. Martha always read more than me, but suddenly she was outpacing me by a book or two a month. All this made me curious enough to set aside some of my pretensions. So on Amazon Prime Day last July, I finally bit the bullet and bought a reduced-price Kindle Paperwhite.

Reader, I was an instant convert. The Kindle fit perfectly in my purse, which meant I could always read on the go. Library books popped up on my home screen in a matter of seconds. The battery took weeks and weeks to die. I was doom scrolling less and reading more books than ever before. Before I knew it, I was a full-blown evangelist. Anyone who dared ask me what I was reading lately could count on one hand the number of seconds it took for me to throw my Kindle in their hands and delightedly exclaim, "see how light it feels!"

I recently got lunch with a fellow clergy colleague. During our conversation we beleaguered the challenges of evangelism in today's church. "It's easy to invite other people over for dinner or to a basketball game because we're excited about those things," my colleague said. "The problem is we sort of look at church like it's a chore, like something we have to do."

I know I'm guilty of this. I'm sometimes a bit sheepish about my faith. When I tell people what I do for a living, I immediately start naming all the ways I'm "not like other Christians." I've become so worn down by fire-and-brimstone televangelists and Christian nationalists that I've lost some of the joy and excitement that comes with the life of faith. I've become so bogged down by the challenges of the church today that at times I've forgotten that the Good News is, indeed, good news worth sharing with people.

The truth is, the Good News has done more for me than any piece of technology ever could. I am a more empathetic, open hearted person because I believe with all that I am that God truly loves my neighbor as much as God loves me. My life is fuller because I believe the very best things in life are gifts that are never earned. My relationships are deeper because I'm part of a faith tradition that asks me to consider the needs of others above my own.

I hope you share your faith with the world because you're excited about it. I hope you share through the witness of your everyday life. I hope you talk about your faith because your relationship with Jesus means something to you. I hope you tell people about the ministry of this church because the work happening here makes you come alive. I hope you do all of this because you know that faith is a gift that can't help but be passed along.

EARTH STEWARDSHIP

Ways to Save on Use of Energy that Protect the Environment

In this second part of our climate impact series of reflections, Earth Stewardship invites all of us to focus on the daily activities we engage in that involve use of energy. By looking at these activities there may be some small or big steps each of us can take to reduce the impacts we may be having on the environment.

A member of our Earth Stewardship committee received a report that highlighted "individual actions" that impact climate change. He shared his report with our earth stewardship committee. The report compiled its findings from several well-known climate and sustainability research studies.

The report offered several different steps we can take to reduce our energy consumption (footprint). Various constraints such as renting versus owning your home and available access to electric, gas, and solar sources of power can play a role in our capacity to save energy. But as is the case with other climate saving strategies, there's always something we can do or do a little bit better to improve our climate. Here are just a few suggestions offered by the report:

- If you own your home, have an energy audit done and follow up on the recommendations. In our area, both BWL and Consumers Energy offer this service.
- Increase and/or improve the insulation in the walls, attic and crawl space of your home.
- Use less electricity from the fossil grid: unplug appliances with power strips; switch to LED lightbulbs; turn off lights when you leave a room.
- Purchase energy efficient appliances.
- Use an electric tea kettle to warm water.
- Decrease the use of gas as much as possible by converting to electric or induction stoves, and convert to an electric or heat pump dryer and water heater.
- Plant trees around your home to increase shade.



COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Due to the generosity of The Peoples Church, Community Engagement has been able to make an annual donation to one of our international focus missions - FSIL Nursing School - for the last twenty years. This school was the first in Haiti to offer a baccalaureate curriculum in nursing. It's been ranked as the top nursing school in the country by the Ministry of Health, known for its high standards of nursing education. The school was founded in 2005 through a partnership between the Medical Benevolence Foundation (medical mission arm of the Presbytery), the Presbyterian Church and the Episcopal Diocese of Haiti. Community Engagement was first introduced to FSIL by former church member, Dr. Jerry Veldman, who was instrumental in establishing the school in 2004-05. Dr. Veldman made numerous trips to Haiti as a Board member in FSIL's early years, often met at the airport by an armed guard to ensure he arrived safely at the school. To date, more than 13 classes have graduated, totaling 250 students who have pursued a Bachelor's degree in nursing or an advanced degree to become a Family Nurse Practioner FNP. Community Engagement is able to donate \$4,000.00 each year to FSIL, which covers a scholarship for 2 students. Those who receive scholarships are required to commit to two years of service in Haiti after graduation.

As many of you are aware, Haiti is experiencing extremely unstable times, yet an email communication from FSIL to Peoples Church has confirmed that "classes are still running. Campus is still a safe haven of learning for the students who are lucky enough to attend." The school is grateful for our dedication over the years, and stated it has been "truly transformational".

The Community Engagement Ministry has been blessed to receive \$86,000 in this year's budget (\$14,000 of which pays for the Wed. night Community Dinners) to give to those organizations who need our help. Because this money comes directly from pledges made by our congregation, we want to ensure you know how we're allocating this money. Thank you for your continued support!


