## A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

Happy summer to choral music fans, and welcome to The Summer Singers 2024 Spotlight concerts!

After a thrilling first season with the organization in 2023, I found myself reflecting on the stories to be told surrounding "summer" and "music" – rather obvious in hindsight, but at least I got there. I was intrigued by the idea of the Summer Solstice as a mostly universal celebration of the changing seasons. Further research revealed that the two largest Summer Solstice festivals in the world (by attendance and, I would argue, cultural import) are "Midsommar" in Sweden; and the First Nations Indigenous Solstice Festival in Ottawa, Canada. Music is a primary component during festival time in both the Scandinavian and North American Indigenous cultures, and blending these two musical expressions feels vital and an authentic reflection of our Minnesota melting pot. Perhaps well-known but lightly performed is the deep well of shortform Swedish choral music by late Romantic composers Hugo Alfvén, Wilhelm Peterson-Berger, and others. Less familiar to our ears but certainly enjoying new audiences in a broader exploration of native and indigenous classical music is the work of living composers Sherryl Sewepagaham, Andrew Balfour, and more, particularly in their native Canada. Today's concert is an amalgam of these uniquely 'summer-y' Solstice sounds from two distinct points on the globe.

As The Summer Singers look toward our upcoming 30th anniversary season in the 2026, it is natural for a new modus operandi to surface. This season, we have endeavored to spread the "sounds of summer" further more broadly with a professional Ensemble of 20 voices performing more Outreach and Family concerts than ever before. To properly embrace the institutional core of TSS, we've invited back Alumni (and some new faces) to add 30 more voices to this expanded Summer Singers experience. Frankly, I'm tickled to hear all these voices on this exquisite repertoire from around the world, and I know you will feel and hear the joy, warmth, and passion of The Summer Singers in this new model.

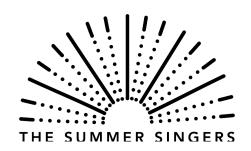

#### The Earth Adorned (Psalm of Summer)

Waldemar Åhlen (1894-1982)

The "Sommarpsalm" from Åhlen has become a much-loved Scandinavian hymn tune, sung in praise of the natural world. The lilting dance of the melody is given a lush harmonic bedding to best articulate this wonderful text translation. Åhlen, considered one of the leading Swedish organists of his generation, spent his long career at St. James Church in Stockholm. "Sommarpsalm" has featured in several film scores, and was played at the wedding of Swedish Crown Princess Victoria in 2010.

The earth adorned in verdant robe sends praises upward surging, while soft winds breathe on fragrant flowers from winter now emerging.

The sunshine bright gives warmth and light to budding blossoms tender, proclaiming summer splendor.

From out the wood, the birds now sing and each its song now raises, to join with all the universe in voicing thankful praises.
With hope and joy their songs employ a rapturous exultation in praise of God's creation.

O God, amid these joys of life, creation's glory beaming, grant us the grace to keep your word and live in love redeeming.
All flesh is grass, the flowers fade, and time is fleeting ever;
God's word remains forever.

#### Sommaren Kommer

sung in Swedish

Wilhelm Peterson-Berger (1867-1942)

A collection of short-form choral works by Wilhelm Peterson-Berger, a leading figure in Swedish classical music at the turn of the century, showcases his twin abilities to effectively paint a visual scene in the music, and imbue a sense of drama with each vocal line. Peterson-Berger, a pianist and later an influential music critic, revered the dramatic compositions of Richard Wagner, and would go on to write Arnljot in 1910, which claims the status of a Swedish national opera. Echoing Wagner's use of the leitmotif, rich characters within each piece rise to the surface of the music, even in strophic work, like "Sommaren kommer."

Sommaren kommer till skogar och lunder med sina himmelsnycklar så blid, ropar: vak upp till ljuvliga stunder allt som förtvinat om vintertid! All kreatur i mark och i bur fröjdas nu, vart efter sin natur. Solen går fram med segrande glinder, hjorten vid källan möter sitt viv. Skönaste platser, grönaste marker, blomstriga ängar, den mjuka slätt väljas till lek i de lummiga parker, fagraste jungfrur där svinga sig nätt. Tröttnar ändå de fötter så små sitta de neder vid floderna blå.

Summer comes to forests and groves with his heavenly keys so gentle, cries: wake up to lovely moments all that withered about winter time! All cattle in the ground and in the cage rejoice now, each according to its nature. The sun advances with victorious glimmer, the deer at the spring meets its viv. The currents wander without hindrance, all the little flowers now catch life. Giga and dance can be heard in many places around the bar with ribbon and wreath. Most beautiful places, greenest lands, flowery meadows, the soft plain chosen to play in the leafy parks, fairest virgins there swinging pretty. Still tiring those little feet they sit down by the rivers blue.

Mother Earth

Sherryl Sewepagaham

sung in Cree

Okâwîmâw Askiy (Mother Earth) began as a vocable song and Cree words were added to bring more meaning. The intention of the song is love, hope and standing in unity to take better care of our mother earth, Okâwîmâw Askiy. A first-person plural perspective is intentional for us to speak directly to her as we sing to her as her children: Mother Earth, we are your children. We love you.

Okâwîmâw Askiy (Mother Earth) is intended to be performed outside on the land, using the gifts of the land (such as leaves) in performance. If performing inside, it should be performed without shoes to have a softer sound and paper leaves can be made to simulate the sound of leaves falling on the forest floor. Body percussion is to be used instead of a frame drum to symbolize the peoples' connection to the land.

#### Traditional Cree Teachings About the Earth and Land

The Elders teach us that as Cree people, we have a reciprocal relationship with Mother Earth. She teaches us many things and our responsibility is to protect and care for her. The land and rivers are to be shared among all humans; we do not own Mother Earth or parts of Mother Earth. The land provides us with all that we need to survive and thrive such as water, air, food, shelter, medicines, and fire. Mother Earth has given every living being a purpose on the earth, be they swimmers, crawlers, winged ones, two-footed creatures or four-footed beings. Creation stories speak of humans as the last to be created. We all need to share the responsibility of taking care of our mother earth for future generations.

Northern Lights

sung in Latin

Ola Gjeilo (b. 1978)

"Northern Lights" describes something serene and heartbreaking, a "terrible beauty," according to Norwegian composer Ola Gjeilo; one that is captured in the essence of the aurora borealis. "Looking out from an attic window one Christmas close to Oslo, over a wintry lake under the stars, I was thinking about how this 'terrible' beauty is so profoundly reflected in the northern lights, or aurora borealis, which, having grown up in the southern part of the country, I have only seen once or twice in my life. It is one of the most beautiful natural phenomena I've ever witnessed, and has such a powerful, electric quality that must have been both mesmerizing and terrifying to people in the past, when no one knew what it was and when much superstition was attached to these experiences."

#### Uti Vår Hage

sung in Swedish

Hugo Alfvén, regarded as Sweden's national composer during his lifetime, reflected a deep relationship with the Swedish landscape and countryside in his music, and his national romanticism was a "stronghold of Swedish folk culture." A composer of significant symphonies and other orchestral works, it was his work with the choirs at Uppsala University, in particular the incredible Orphei Drängar Male Chorus, where he honed his compositional voice and embedded his music with and in Swedish folklore. A master of counterpoint and tone color, Alfvën's choral music brims with vitality and serenity.

## I Furuskogen sung in Swedish

Qilak Andrew Balfour (b. 1967)

Inspired by travels in Baffin Island in 2009 and a collaboration with Iqaluit folksinger and songwriter Madeleine Allakariallak, Qilak was composed as part of a concert project for Winnipeg-based Camerata Nova entitled Medieval Inuit: Stories of the North. The theme of the concert explored the early contact between Scandinavian explorers and the Inuit 1000 years ago. Balfour tells us: "Qilak is about the northern sky which is so breathtaking up in the Arctic. I loved the open space, the Inuit's relationship with the land, and the musical sound of Inuktitut."

The aesthetic of the piece reflects the expanse of sky and the shimmering reflection of sun on snow. Balfour's composition hints at influences of Inuit throat singing and hauntingly echoes the vocables of traditional Ayaya songs of Southern Baffin Island. A heartfelt thank you, Elder Fred Ford, for your teachings on the Inuktitut language, and to Piita Irniq for your teachings about Ayaya songs. - Andrew Balfour

Vision Chant Andrew Balfour

sung in Ojibway

Vision Chant incorporates the Ojibway word, "babamadizwin", which means "journey". Based on an Indigenous chant style, this work is striking for both its stillness and its intensity. The journey that is evoked begins and ends with a soprano melody, at first divided and then, symbolically perhaps, unified. What takes place in between these musical bookends is the vision itself. The vision described in the title and painted in the music is somewhat fearsome at its climax. For comfort, Grandmother (Nokomis) and Grandfather (Mishomis) are called upon. By the conclusion, there is resolution, and perhaps of awakening to a sunrise. - Andrew Balfour

Ute Sundance is a song of renewal sung by the Ute Tribe at the beginning of the new year and is one of the Ute's most important rites of passage. Debts, misunderstandings, and grudges are forgiven, so that no one needs to start the new year with old negativity. The younger people enact a difficult dance, personifying the release of the pain experienced in the community during the past year. -Ethan Sperry

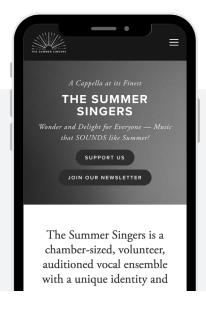
