

Spotlight: Jimmy Lynn



Jimmy Lynn is the co-founder of Kiswe, a Washington, D.C. - based company that <u>focuses</u> on bringing livestream and interactive events to fans from sports, music, and other events. He also teaches at Georgetown University.

For the last 30 years, Mr. Lynn has worked to <u>raise the profile</u> of the Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) communty - and provide mentorship to young people - most of whom are from minority backgrounds. He has helped students with jobs and paying for college, raising money to send kids to basketball camp, and many other way that provide kids with opportunities.

Mr. Lynn's service and dedication to the AAPI community has been w<u>idely</u> recognized. His work has earned him an award from AA Lead, an advocacy organization; Time Warner's prestigious "Andrew Heiskell Community Service"; and the D.C. Mayor's outstanding community service award.

Mr. Lynn is <u>bi-racial</u>; his mother is Japanese and his father is Irish-American. He moved to D.C. from Japan when her was 16.

National Museum of Asian Art, "Krishna and his family admire a solar eclipse," 1775-1870




By Gene Luen Yang Age: 8+
