

WRITER'S NOTE

The story of Sir Hubert Wilkins' life is astounding. From humble beginnings in our mid north, a young Bert Wilkins left home at around 20 years of age in 1908 and took up the pursuit of adventure, first in Sydney, then London before taking on assignments all over the planet.

Following some study into photography at the School of Mines, Wilkins offered himself to whoever might be interested as one of the world's first photojournalists; not that that term was used back then.

Indeed, the combination of a camera, abundant resourcefulness and extraordinary luck, opened up a life of opportunities that he grasped whenever and wherever he went for the following 30 years. As might be expected, even from that introduction, there is too much story to ever hope to encapsulate it in just one theatrical production.

In this, the first part of a trilogy, you are invited to hear and, at times through integration of his own still and film images, see his story in his initial six years on the road. But also, it is hoped, we can start to grasp how these experiences not only shaped his life but exposed his own inherent character and belief system that stood firm and carried him through the struggles and thrills that were to come.

His is a life that needs to be not only admired but a source of inspiration to generations of the age he is depicted in this work. If he could achieve what he did with his level of modesty and decency in times that predate most of the technology we enjoy today, the world will always remain an oyster for us all.

In putting this work together I must make mention of Stephen Scofield, the young man who plays Wilkins. Since he signed on last August, Stephen has shown himself to be a remarkably competent and professional, attending to the tasks involved in not only putting together his performance but also the production with dedication, modesty and attention to detail. Note his name, for theatre goers both here in Adelaide and beyond are sure to be seeing much of him in the years ahead.

Stephen Schofield

Stephen Schofield is an actor, writer, singer, director, and filmmaker. He has worked on stage and in film and television since a young age. Among other shows during his studies at Adelaide College of the Arts (graduating 2019), some of his roles included Patrick in Fury (dir. Jo Stone), Spud in Darlinghurst Nights (dir. Michael Hill), and Brink, Blowpipe, Skin-Lad and more in Road (dir. Chris Drummond). Last year, he reprised the role of Patrick in Hannah Catherine Productions' Bumming with Jane (dir. Hannah Smith). This is his Adelaide Fringe debut. Stephen aims to establish a production company this year.

Josh Barkley is an emerging actor/singer (Baritone) based in Adelaide. He graduated from Adelaide College of the Arts in 2020, while there he worked with various industry professionals including, Chris Pitman, Michael Hill, and Sasha Zahra. 

In recent times Peter has also produced the acclaimed The Eye of Wilkins, the first ever pictorial review of the photography of Sir Hubert Wilkins and a documentary of the same name which showed to sold shows last year's Fringe and is on again this year.

He is also screening at this year's Fringe the film of his 2019 play Arthur Hardy – The Forgotten Hero of the Hills.




He was the founder of Mount Lofty House and the glue that helped hold Adelaide together in its formative years. He would be better known if the town hadn't turned on him.
