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#### **KAIROS**

"Greek term for 'time' denoting a special, significantly critical point in human history when God's will and purposes are carried out, particularly in the coming of Jesus Christ."

-Westminster Dictionary of Theological Terms

Culturally, we have lots of clichés about time:

Time is relative. Time is money. Time waits for no one.

Theologically, the most important assertion related to time is this:

God's time is not our time.

In other words, we do not know the hour or the day when Jesus will return. But, more generally, we do not have the capacity to understand the nature of time in relationship to the "One who is, was, and evermore shall be." We do believe, with the writer of Ecclesiastes, that "There is a time and place for every matter under heaven." And, Jesus himself often spoke about time to the disciples. So, it's not that time is insignificant, it's simply that we aren't smart enough to understand it.

That being said, there are certain times that *feel* Kairos in nature. Pulling from the definition above, this Fall seems to be "a special, significantly critical point." I know many of you have the election in mind as you read this, but it's not just that. This moment feels significant for the Body of Christ Universally and for the Body of Christ here at Hitchcock.




Program Year begins September 8, 2024 - Worship returns to 10:30am


Kairos is open to all Hitchcock adults and friends! <u>Mark your calendars</u> for 6pm-7pm on September 25, October 16, and November 20.



#### COST-BENEFIT ANALYSIS OF DEMENTIA: NEW INTERVENTIONS

Robert J. Brent is Professor of Economics at Fordham University in New York specializing in Cost-Benefit Analysis (CBA). He has lived and worked at Universities in the US, UK and Africa. In 2011, he was a participant of the Copenhagen Consensus Project on HIV/AIDS and was commissioned to write the Guidelines for CBAs of social projects at the Inter-American Development Bank. He has written six textbooks on CBA and published articles on every area of CBA, covering applications in both developed and developing countries. Recently, he has concentrated on evaluating dementia interventions.

# Refugee Partners Update





### PW THRIFT SHOP

#### A 100-YEAR-OLD STORY... AND COUNTING

#### The Beginning

During the Great Depression of the 1920s, the women of the Hitchcock Presbyterian Church and the Scarsdale Woman's Club collectively and individually realized with great concern that there was a growing need for struggling families in the surrounding areas to acquire clothing at a reasonable price.

So the women did something about it to improve their neighbors' plight. Together, they opened a collaborative thrift shop in White Plains. It served a two-fold purpose then (and still does): (1) The shop allowed the less fortunate people to purchase quality clothing at very low prices and (2) Gave the donors the opportunity to declutter their closets and happily receive a tax credit.

In the 1970s, that original thrift shop gave birth to a place that still exists right here at Hitchcock. Open on a mostly regular weekly basis, the PW Hitchcock Thrift Shop continues fully operational today as a vibrant and vital location for customers to come together to meet, socialize, and shop on most Mondays from 10:00 am to-12:30 pm.

It also provides Hitchcock church members and nearby friends who are volunteering in the shop to keep it running the chance to give back to society and to do so with a smile on their faces while voicing a big thank you to the buyers.





#### <u>Down Memory Lane</u>

Long-time Hitchcock Member Joanna Tsuyuki, retired cashier, PW treasurer & board member, often recounts the reasons that Thrift has been so meaningful for her for many years. Tsuyuki recalls, "When I was working as the cashier, I remember a young man needing professional attire for a job interview. He bought a whole outfit, shirt, suit, tie and shoes and ended up paying only \$35." She remembers thinking as he was checking out that "This is the reason I am here!"

#### Where Does it all Come From?

Church and community members donate clothing, household goods and jewelry. . . and receive that aforementioned tax receipt.

#### **Shopping with Dignity**

Customers shop without judgment and buy for themselves or send clothing, jewelry or household items back to families and friends in their native countries. In 2024, just as in the 1920s, everyone can come to shop with dignity and a great sense of security knowing that they are buying quality goods at a very reasonable price.

#### **Shopping with a Purpose**

The church and community volunteers at the shop are extremely proud that there are quality brands of clothing and household items for sale. However, the main purpose has become so much more. The PW Thrift Shop is a space where church members and the community come together to contribute towards a triple bottom line (people, planet and profits) and, in a tangible way, becoming a part of the larger and overall Mission and Outreach of Hitchcock Church.





#### **Triple Bottom Line**

The PW Thrift Shop embodies the idea of the" triple bottom line" with the goal of balancing social, environmental, and economic impacts:

- People & Community Investment:
  - Thrift is a place where the community can come together and find treasures for the whole family.
  - Thrift is a place where volunteers of all ages, backgrounds, and religious beliefs unite to receive, sort, and price clothing and household goods.
  - Thrift is a place that collaborates to help special needs students gain skills and meaningful work: We initiated collaboration with F.A.S.T. (Functional Achievement Skills Training) from the Pleasantville School District nearly two years ago. This program offers skills training for special needs students aged 18-to-21. Students travel by train each week to assist at the thrift shop and to participate in meaningful work opportunities.
  - In June, seven of our students graduated and are now ready to embark on the next chapter of their lives.
  - Thrift has formed a collaboration with the SUNY WCC Fashion Department. Students complete internships every semester that contribute to their associate degrees in fashion.
  - Thrift provides meaningful opportunities for volunteers: Last year, a thrift volunteer began working with the FAST students. She discovered that she enjoyed the work and now works as special ed aide in a local school district. Additionally, another volunteer this spring met some of our fashion interns and is now enrolled in the SUNY WCC Fashion Program for the fall.

#### Planet:

- Reduce the carbon footprint of the planet by preventing thousands of pounds of clothing and household items going to landfills or even worse causing landfills in developing countries.
- Promotes Sustainable Clothing: The fashion industry is one of the largest polluters globally. Thrifting encourages sustainable fashion practices by reducing the demand for fast fashion and promoting the reuse of clothing. Prevents the harmful effects of fashion production. Prof. Juanita Alcena, FIT Professor, says that "if we never produced another piece of clothing we would have enough for the rest of our lives.
- Migrant Shopping Day: we have hosted several successful migrant shopping mornings that served many grateful and happy families with their clothing needs.
- Midnight Run: Hitchcock Church Midnight Run was the recipient of the Saturday Spring Sale that raised more than \$6,000. Thrift regularly stocks the closet with clothing from the thrift shop which contributes to the triple bottom line of thrift and Midnight Run: about 80% of items that fill the closet come from the thrift shop from T shirts, sweatshirts, hoodies, warm coats, pillows, blankets, reusable water bottles and more.

#### Profits

- All proceeds enable the PW of Hitchcock Board to provide grants to local and international nonprofits that support women and children locally and around the world.
- Proceeds also enable PW to partner with the Mission Committee to strengthen and assist Hitchcock Presbyterian Church in its Mission to support causes that make an impact in our community.



The Hitchcock School offers a nurturing and developmentally appropriate preschool program for children ages two to four, as well as a toddler program for 12-24-month-old children. We use The Creative Curriculum in our classrooms which is a comprehensive approach to learning that focuses on exploration and discovery. This curriculum helps teachers interact with children in ways that promote development, foster children's social competence, and support learning through play. Our program focuses on exploration using blocks, dramatic play, toys and games, art, library, sand and water, music and movement, cooking, and outdoor play.

Enrichment Our school offers many enrichment programs and special classes throughout the year such as Gym on Wheels, Yoga, Musical Munchkins, The Greenburgh Nature Center, Mad Science, and The Weinstock Nature Center. Partnering with our active Parents Association, the school has many opportunities for families to be involved! Events like the Halloween Party, Holiday Sing-along, Parents Night Out, monthly Coffee and Conversations, and a Multicultural Luncheon are just some of the ways our community celebrates together.

For the 2024-2025 academic year, we are excited to expand our Toddler Program to 5 days a week, and all our classes are almost fully enrolled. ### **SENIOR INTERN'S REPORT**

Hitchcock was lucky enough to have a fantastic High School Senior do their Senior Option Internship with us. Below is his report.

My name is Sam Kofman and I'm a senior at Scarsdale High School. For the last 6 weeks of school, seniors do internships instead of going to classes, and I chose to do my internship at Hitchcock because I would get to cover a broad range of subjects and focus on the issues I feel most passionate about. In my 6 weeks at Hitchcock, I have done guite a lot!

I started with the Earth-Care Certification which entailed filling out a giant checklist with four categories (Worship, Education, Facilities, and Outreach) and many possible actions per category with assigned point values. The first round of certification requires a total of 100 points with at least 25 points per category which we managed to achieve after creating a new website page about the Earth-Care Certification with pictures of our native plants and our postcard writing event during which many members of the congregation wrote postcards to our senators asking them to cosponsor the A. Donald McEachin Environmental Justice For All Act.



Kids in Sunday School also helped out by coloring in the back of the postcards. Now that all the paperwork for the certification is filled out, we have to wait until the submission window in January to make it official, but we're almost there!

I helped plan and put together a mental health workshop for 5th-8th graders about stress, transitions, and how to healthily cope with all of that. We partnered with Westchester Jewish Community Services (WJCS) and ended up with a 1.5 hour program with a presentation, a hands-on activity, and dinner.

We started an interview project where I interviewed many older members of the church who have been here for decades in order to learn about their history and the history of the church. All of them have led incredibly interesting lives and I was lucky enough to be the one behind the camera getting to listen to all of it.

I also helped organize things for when the asylum seekers came and helped lead them around the labyrinth of halls we have here at Hitchcock.

I've taken hundreds of pictures at many of the events we've had at Hitchcock and organized them all into google drives which have been shared with the office staff.

In my time here, I've learned a lot about what's currently going on with legislation surrounding many issues and I've learned how much it takes to run a church (it takes a lot!). I wasn't aware of how much was done during the week and before services on Sunday to prepare for the service, and it's given me a greater appreciation for all that the church does.



## **Buildings & Grounds**

The Building and Grounds Committee's big project this spring and summer has been refreshing the meeting rooms along the hallway by the Memorial Building entrance to better serve all the different groups and activities taking place here. This included the creation of windows into all the rooms along the hall, providing visual security and convenience, as well as brightening up the hallway by bringing in light from the outside.







The Bob and Marthe Czufin Study Center

Through a generous gift from long-time members Bob and Marthe Czufin, the Library has been turned into a small group meeting and study center with smart flat screen tv and comfortable chairs that are making the room a magnet for youth groups and classes. Taking the building's mid-century date as a cue, the original walnut-stained shelves and cabinets were cleaned, walls painted white, and a long banquette created along one wall. Among some of the treasures found in the clean-up were vintage Bible Study maps. One of these, depicting the journeys of Paul, has been framed and hangs with smaller vintage-style maps of Rome and Jerusalem. With freshly painted black window grids, new gray carpet, and furniture in orange and blue, the space has a cool, mid-century vibe while providing twenty-first century features.

While going through the library books, Revs. Pete and Katherine selected reference materials to keep on the shelves, and old Bibles and Hitchcock memorabilia, such as scrapbooks, were saved.

The Merrell and Lynne Clark Family Room

Considered the "living room" of our congregation, the former Hancock Room was in serious need of a refresh. Several special gifts were made for this room renovation, and the Session voted to rename it after Lynne and Merrell Clark, who have been valued members of Hitchcock for sixty years. In addition to repairs to the woodwork and ceiling, the renovation also remedied water seepage that had damaged the casement windows and the stone surrounds. Our contractor repointed exterior stonework, and painted and restored the windows to functionality. The fresh paint on the walls, new furniture and motorized solar shades give the room an updated yet comfortable feel. The solar shades will bring down the temperature on sunny days and will help darken the room for video presentations. The new carpet tiles will let us replace individual stained areas, keeping the carpet looking newer, longer.

Special care was given to the selection of art in this room. It was our desire to make sure that representations of Jesus, Mary and the Holy Family reflected the entire human family. The result is a wonderful collection of beautiful works that do just that: Haitian American artist Alix Beaujour's depiction of the Holy Family, Paul Gaugin's well-known "Hail, Mary", and 18th century painter Guiseppi Peroni's "Samaritan Woman at the Well". Worthy of special attention is the original print "The Flight into Egypt" by Japanese Christian artist Sadao Watanabe. Watanabe's body of work uses traditional block printing in his depictions of Biblical scenes. Having this print hanging in this room also pays homage to the recently dissolved Japanese Church that worshipped in this space for so many years. Finally, we were excited to find contemporary Ukrainian artist Ivanka Demchuk, whose icons combine traditional and contemporary Christian themes. "The Hidden Life of Nazareth" shows Jesus as a toddler with His loving parents. Please be sure to stop by and read more about each of these artworks. Many thanks to Liz Perrone and Rev. Katherine for help in their selection.

There is still work to do: refreshing the kitchenette, opening the door to the walled garden, sprucing up the entrance to the Lower Children's House. Installing air conditioning in these rooms is also a priority.

# Katherine's PhD Update

As many of you know, I started a PhD in Practical Theology at Claremont School of Theology this past January. Eventually, I hope to write a dissertation about interfaith theology and organizing for women's and LGBTQ+ rights.

In the meantime, I will be completing both hybrid/online and in-person coursework at the Claremont campus in sunny Los Angeles, CA. I enjoyed my first in-person course about Christian Interfaith Formation this past April, which included a fascinating visit to a Jain temple in Southern California.

I am grateful to be enrolled in a program that allows me to do the academic work I feel called to do in the world, while also continuing my call to serve with this amazing congregation. Thank you for your collective support!







## 2024 Mission Summit

Hitchcock is a community that believes strongly in acting out its faith in the world. We know that God is doing good work among us through Midnight Run, Presbyterian Women, Living in America, and other missional organizations and projects in our community.

However, we also know we need to evaluate whether these groups can work together more effectively from the same common values and towards the same common goals.

So this past April, we invited Rev. Larissa Kwong Abazia, a former co-moderator of our denomination and current director of NEXTChurch, an organization dedicated to creating meaningful transformation in the PCUSA, to lead us in a Mission Summit.

Larissa will continue to meet with the leaders of our missional organizations within Hitchcock during this program year to discuss how we can encourage more congregational engagement with outreach in our congregation and build a vibrant future for outreach work at Hitchcock! ## News From Our Committees

#### **Deacons**

The current Board of Deacons comprises 18 members, each elected by the congregation to serve a three-year term. Our responsibilities are varied and fall into three areas: service, social and caring. Our most sacred duty is to minister to anyone who is in need, sick, friendless or in distress. In this we often work closely with the Health Ministry Team and the Hitchcock staff to extend care to the congregation.

#### Annual Deacon's And Elders Retreats:

2024-2025 is going to be a great year and that is in large part due to the wonderful lay leaders of Hitchcock! Our Elders and Deacons volunteer to give of their time, talent and energy to help lead the congregation and care for our members. To kick things off, we will be holding Deacon's and Elder's Retreats in the 13 Walworth Manse on **September 15th** during lunch and dinner, respectively. Please keep these wonderful leaders in your prayers as we begin a new and critical year in the life of the church and in the world.

#### **Health Ministry Team**

The Health Ministry team seeks to promote health and wholeness - body, mind and spirit - in a faith community through activities such as health education and counseling, advocacy, referrals, and pastoral visits in homes, hospitals, and nursing homes.

Jennifer Smith is the Health Ministry team chair for the congregation along with team members David Chong, Rose Garnier, Pete Jones, Kathleen Mahan, Katherine Miao and Dan Smith. The Health Ministry team, the Deacons and volunteers work closely with the pastor to provide a caring community and are available to provide health-related assistance, including rides to medical appointments, to anyone who requests it.

In August, members of the church staff were recertified in CPR and use of the AED devices. There are 2 AED devices in the church – one located in the lower Children's House and one in the flower room (outside the choir room). Multiple doses of Narcan are also available in the church offices. The team also provides weekly health/wellness tips in the church newsletter.

#### **Nominating Committee**

The Nominating Committee plays an important role in ensuring that Hitchcock Presbyterian Church has the continuation of men and women serving as Deacons and Elders and Nominating Committee members. Each year the committee reviews the needs for replacement of those who currently have served their three year terms. Serving on the Nominating Committee, as an Elder or Deacon is an important way to serve our church community and God.

#### **Worship and Arts**

The Worship and Arts Committee is the Session committee that is responsible for many visible aspects of the Worship service. We oversee ushering, flowers, Communion preparation and servers, as well as offering input on musical issues and décor. Our group includes Martha Binder (Chair), Martha Flanders, Kathleen Mahan, Georgia Prince, and Lisa Waterworth. We have returned to conducting services, including Communion, in our usual pre-Covid manner, with masks optional for all. Hymnals and Bibles are back in the pews, singing is encouraged, and seating is no longer separated.

#### We welcome the active participation of all Hitchcock members in the worship services.

Children are encouraged to participate in worship, and are invited every Sunday during the service to come to the front for Time with Children. They are a vital part of the Children's Service, the Christmas Pageant, and in the spring, the Youth Service. Every November and May the youth take over the ushering responsibilities. Also, in addition to our four separate children's choirs, we have an acolyte program for older children.

For adults, serving as an usher is a good way to take part in the worship service, and to interact with people. When coming to church, the first person that a member or a visitor meets is almost always an usher, and for most guests and visitors, this is their first impression of Hitchcock Church. Ushers distribute the Order of Service, and, if necessary, show guests to seats before and during the service, as well as provide information to newcomers or other help. Ushers also take up the collection, prepare the Sanctuary prior to the service and neaten up afterwards. A thoughtful usher makes a huge impact on one's experience at Hitchcock. #### KITCHEN(s) USE GUIDELINES

When a group or committee uses the kitchens, there must be a designated member of your committee to act as Liaison to the Hospitality Committee (prior to and during the event) and be ultimately responsible for making sure that the kitchen is left in good order at the end of the event. This includes the following:

- \* All equipment used must be washed, dried and returned to its proper storage place.
- \*All leftover food remaining from the event is either taken home by participants or thrown out unless it is specifically designated for use at other times (i.e. milk, cookies, etc.).
- \* All laundry (dishtowels, aprons and/or tablecloths) is to be taken home, washed, dried, folded and returned to their original storage area.
- \* Use of dishwasher (instructions on wall by DW). Please dry glasses and silverware after they are washed (this will diminish the water spots left on them) and return to designated cabinet/drawers.
- \* All surfaces, including the stoves, ovens and counters are to be wiped down; food particles and grease should be removed from drip pans under burners, drip plans should be cleaned and replaced.
- \* All lights, ovens and gas burners are to be turned off. Close and lock any doors you opened. Thank you for your attention to these guidelines.

We are all responsible for maintaining the cleanliness of our kitchens!

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#### Eagle Scouts

Congratulations to Zachary Finkel, Janghee Lee, and Noah Millard who earned the rank of Eagle during the 2023-2024 academic year. Amongst other requirements, to attain the level of Eagle Scout, Scouts must earn a minimum of 21 merit badges; the 14 merit badges required are: First Aid, Citizenship in the Community, Citizenship in the Nation, Citizenship in Society, Citizenship in the World, Communication, Cooking, Personal Fitness, Emergency Preparation or Lifesaving, Environmental Science or Sustainability, Personal Management, Swimming, Hiking, or Cycling, Camping, and Family Life.

Additionally, there are numerous subject areas that Scouts can choose to complete the remaining merit badges, such as American Business, Animation, Archery, Art, Astronomy, Backpacking, Bird Study, Canoeing, Chemistry, Chess, Crime Prevention, Disability Awareness, Digital Technology, Dog Care, Engineering, Entrepreneurship, Fingerprinting, Game Design, Gardening, Genealogy, Healthcare Professions, Journalism, Kayaking, Law, Moviemaking, Music, Nuclear Science, Photography, Pottery, Sports, Theatre and many more.

Eagle Scouts must also how leadership by planning and executing, with help from volunteers supervised by the Scout, an Eagle Project benefitting the community. This past year Ronan's painted a world map mural in a high school in the Bronx, Joshua built a bench and implemented a new book organization system for Greenacres elementary school and Zachary built a boot brush/information station and cleared an invasive plant species for a public park in New Rochelle.

#### Troop 4 Background

Troop 4 engages in a variety of activities throughout the year. They include camping, hiking, historical site trips, skiing, color guard presentation at Opening Day of the Scarsdale Little League Season, marching in the Scarsdale Memorial Day parade, Camping on the Green (in Scarsdale Village), and merit badge seminars. CREDO participants may leave feeling refreshed and reinvigorated, with a clearer vision of their total well-being. Ten years after their CREDO conference, participants are eligible to enroll again and benefit from another opportunity to enjoy the CREDO experience and connect with peers.


#### **Sunday Memorial Flowers**


