Every year on the last Sunday in October, we celebrate "Reformation Sunday." If you didn't grow up as a Lutheran, you may wonder where this tradition comes from.

The Reformation began in 1517 when the Roman Catholic Church was raising funds to build their cathedrals by the selling of what was called indulgences. An indulgence was a financial contribution to the church for one's sins and as a sign of repentance. If you contributed you received a certificate acknowledging your gift which also promised that you or a loved one would spend less time in the misery of purgatory in the afterlife. This basically amounted to paying to be

forgiven.

A German Monk named Martin Luther posted a list of 95 Theses – 95 reasons that he objected to this practice of selling indulgences. Luther wrote that we are not forgiven because of anything we do – including the buying of Indulgences or doing enough good work. We are forgiven because of God's grace and the gift of faith.

Every Protestant church traces their roots back to this moment in history.

Why Does Reformation Sunday Matter?

Reformation Sunday gives us a chance to re-tell our story — a chance to remember. You will hear about this in the sermon on Sunday morning and the youth our congregation will re-enact the story of the Reformation at our Reformation Picnic. Re-telling the story helps us remember that people, like Martin Luther, risked their lives to bring the church back to the truth of God's Word and to the core of our faith that God continues to shower on us with His grace and mercy.



Come be a part of our Reformation Sunday celebration, join us on Sunday, October 30th at 8 AM or 10:45 AM for worship.

And don't miss the Reformation Picnic at 12 noon in the church Court Yard. There will be fellowship, great German food, live action drama, Lutheran Trivia Contest, pumpkin carving and games for the kids, and live German music by the EDELWEISS Band from the Bavarian's Wirtshaus Restaurant here in Ft. Walton Bch. Let us celebrate The Reformation!

Luther's final written words were: "We are all beggars. This is true."

In order to be free, you must be a beggar. You must be utterly dependent and reliant upon God. This makes us uncomfortable – the way we're uncomfortable when someone gets us a Christmas present when we haven't gotten them one. We feel we owe them. And we don't like being in someone's debt like that.

But what Luther would remind us is that we are all indeed beggars. And we're not just anyone's beggars. We're God's beggars. Christ came for sinners. He came to seek and save the lost. He came to heal the sick and raise the dead. He came for sinners, and He dwells only with sinners.

If we are to be where He is, we must be willing to be counted among the lost, the sick, and the dead. We must be willing to be beggars. We must cry out for mercy, for grace, and for his undeserved love and kindness. We must be dependent solely on Him and what He gives.

And here's the beauty: He gives us everything. Everything. Forgiveness of sins, salvation from death and the devil, and eternal life. This isn't because of any worthiness or merit in us. It is because of His divine goodness, mercy, and grace. On account of Christ's death and resurrection, the Father forgives you, saves you, and is pleased with you. You receive His love, His righteousness, His holiness, His acceptance, and His inheritance. We are all beggars. This is true.

This is the heart and soul of Christianity and the lifeblood of the Christian Church. God justifies us and declares us innocent and righteous by His grace received through faith for the sake of Christ. This isn't because of our works but because of His work on the cross. We, who once were enemies of God, are reconciled to Him and made to be His children.

This is what Luther pointed us to when He took up his pen for the last time and scribbled "We are all beggars. This is true." We are beggars, but we are beggars of the God who does not ignore us and who doesn't pass by us on the other side. We are beggars of the One who descended from heaven to make His dwelling with sinners.

We are beggars of Him who deigns to dwell with us, among us, and – yes – still in us by grace for Christ's sake. For in the bread and cup that we bless we share together with Christ and each other the riches of God's grace. The riches of this grace – the Gospel in sermon and absolution, in Baptism, and in Holy Communion – are so inexhaustible that our cups overflow. We, who are God's beggars, are inexhaustibly satisfied, and we have something to give back in thanksgiving and praise.


On The Homefront
