





Our International Journey

Introducing the Carnegie Clan

About George and Adina

In 1912 my grandparents **George Nathaniel Carnegie** and **Jane Adina Mitchell** set their sights on new horizons when they emigrated from Jamaica West Indies to settle in Toronto, Ontario, Canada. Many Black families wherever they lived had challenges to overcome both racially and economically. George and Adina decided that Canada would provide new opportunities for them and the family they anticipated having.

Old cargo manifests tell us that family members travelled by ship to New York, where as it turns out, all of George's younger siblings took up residence. However, for him, Canada was the country of choice.

George and Adina were married on January 1, 1913 in the County of York, Toronto, at ages twenty-four and twenty-three. As was common for the times they assumed the traditional roles of husband and wife. George with his grade four education secured a job with Toronto Hydro as a janitor, where he worked for 42 years. His entrepreneurial spirit eventually proved him to be more than an adequate provider for his stay-at-home wife. He became an astute business man by buying and renting properties all over the Greater Toronto Area.

George had a strong sense of family from the beginning, bringing with him his first child Eric born in Jamaica from a youthful fling. Jane Adina lovingly raised that child as her own and she and George went on to have six more children and were known to take in foster children from whom they subsequently adopted two more children. George was strict but fair, while Adina's kind and nurturing spirit resulted in her being adored by all. They were married for 44 years until she became ill and died in 1957.

As their family started to grow, George and Adina moved from downtown Toronto from 5 Federal Street, where my father Herb was born, to the northern suburbs of Willowdale/Lansing. First they lived in a small shack-like home on Parkview Avenue. While there, Grandpa George had a large home built on Empress Avenue later to be numbered 215. This is where he and Adina raised their family from 1924-1936. At that time, there were only a few homes in the area separated by miles of fields, a fast running creek and a dirt road, now a thoroughfare commanding property values worth millions. The early years saw 215 as a hobby farm complete with a cow, chickens, rabbits, vegetable gardens and fruit trees, beckoning neighbours to come by the Carnegie Homestead for milk, eggs and produce. They were the only Black family in the community that we know of at that time.

Although George did not drive, when the boys became teenagers, he purchased a car for the family. Initially my father Herb went to the high school two blocks down the road and attended Earl Haig but when he was enticed with incentives to play hockey at Northern Vocational School located at Mount Pleasant and Eglinton several miles away, my father actually drove to school. Considering the times a Black family owning property and a car would have been a notable feat.

One day my father shared with me that when my grandfather was ready to sell their home in Willowdale all the family were in anticipation of moving to the upscale house he owned in Forest Hill, but their hearts sunk when Grandpa George chose 40 Boswell a row house located at Bloor and Avenue Road. He also owned the adjoining property number 42. Grandpa George held onto those properties until his death in 1973 and rented them out as rooming houses. There is no record of when he sold his many acres of land in Willowdale on which for some years he cultivated orchards of fruit trees. George was no stranger to hard work and his adopted child David King recalled on several occasions he helped him spray the trees from dawn to dusk with his daughter Ethel.

He was also very "frugal" and David said he would walk to and from his work place at Toronto Hydro every day while residing at Boswell rather than take public transportation. He was known to be a strong, healthy and fit man that lived a good quality of life for 85 years.

Even in saying that, Grandpa George lost sight in one eye from a stone that skipped up from a horse drawn wagon delivering coal. Later in life his foggy glass eye made him seem a little scary and unapproachable by his grandchildren. He also eventually developed a cataract in the other eye giving him limited vision for a number of years. He lived to see more modern technology remove the cataract in his advanced senior years.

Grandpa George was certainly a trailblazer from whom there was much to learn. It is my hope that you will enjoy the family stories of this branch of the *Carnegie Clan*. Shared in these pages is the unique heritage of individuals who ventured down new paths and showed their determination to forge ahead against all odds to lead successful and fulfilling lives.


Our Parkview Avenue house was little better than a shack with dark, flat roof, and white and green trimmed windows. It stood on an acre of fertile land with an elm tree at the back where Papa fashioned a swing by attaching a rope and an old car tire to a branch. That's where we played, fought and acted like the kids we were. Just beyond the Elm tree, he planted a garden of corn, carrots, celery, cabbages, beets, onions, potatoes, parsley and more.



Grandpa George moved his family from downtown Toronto to the northern suburb of Willowdale in 1920 when my father Herb was 2 months old and lived at Parkview Avenue.

Then he had this home (Photo left) built for his family in 1924.

Photo to the left is a later picture of the house which was originally on a dirt road surrounded by miles of fields and a nearby running stream. Initially homes did not have numbers and were identified by the family name — this was The Carnegie Homestead later to become 215 Empress Avenue.



Grandpa George was a man of the soil and loved gardening. He planted vegetables and fruit trees on his property and kept a cow, chickens and rabbits to help feed his family. My father Herb told me that when the depression hit in the 1930's they ate well and never went without.



Excerpts from Herb Carnegie's autobiography — A Fly in a Pail of Milk Sharing his father's thoughts about working with Toronto Hydro

My father, a light-skinned man of the soil, worked as a janitor for the Toronto Hydro commission from 1912 until 1954. Pop loved his job as much as a poke in the eye with a sharp stick— in other words, he hated it. But with only a Grade 4 education, his options in life were limited. The horizons of some coloured men fell significantly short of those of their white counterparts; coloured men worked mostly as porters and chauffeurs, and occasionally, as nightclub entertainers and boxers.

Papa hated his job because it was mundane and he was forced to stick with it because he had a large family to support. Frustrated by his own lack of education, he feared that his children

might be trapped in the same position in which he found himself. While we were having fun, he lived in the world beyond, where race mattered. And that reality and that fear explained his regular lectures to us: "Stay in school, get a good education" were almost daily exhortations.

Occasionally, he'd be more dramatic: he'd rise from the dinner table, reach for the broom and toss it at whichever of his children he wanted to impress. "Here!" he would half-shout: "This is what the boss will give you if you don't get an education." Papa's theatrics were so effective on me, I used them later in life with my own kids.







Who is Patrick to George Carnegie?







- ∞ She worked in Canada for a short while gaining entrance into the USA.
- Ferdie came to live with Matthew and Alice at age 8. He went to US on his own as a teenager.

Gladys Mae Carnegie Johnson, moved to Yonkers in 1941. a retired real-estate agent and a longtime Yonkers resident, died Saturday at Lawrence Hospital in Bronxville. She was 98.

Mrs. Johnson was born Jan. 20, 1896, in Manchester, Jamaica, West Indies, to Matthew and Alice Leason Carnegie. She attended schools in Jamaica.

Mrs. Johnson immigrated to New York City about 1920. She

In 1953, she and David H. Johnson were married in New Jersey. Her husband died in

Mrs. Johnson was a self-employed real-estate agent for 60 years who retired at age 95. She owned several brownstone buildings in upper Manhattan.

"(Her work) kept her alive," said her niece, Gwendolyn Turner of Orlando, Fla. "She was extremely sociable."

Mrs. Johnson also enjoyed gardening and traveling, her family

In addition to her niece, Mrs. Johnson is survived by three grandchildren and several other

Her son, Charles Smith, died in 1974.




Matthew William Carnegie father of George

He feels he is coming to the end of his life and is requesting help for his maid that has taken care of his home for six years and is asking for small boots for her child. He sends greetings to Mary, Gladys and Ferdie. He asks for information about *poor Willie* who has become mentally ill. Matthew sadly refers to son Cecil who does not seem to have the time of day for him or give much support in his time of need. Matthew died in 1948 almost four years later. The name was so long it was shortened to Gwendolyn Lillian Goulbourne Gwendolyn was born on January 18, 1926 in Manhattan, New York City. Her Jamaican mother travelled by way of Cuba and Ellis Island settling in New Jersey where she met her Jamaican husband. They worked as domestics, her father later becoming a carpenter. Amazingly they saved up their money and purchased two properties back to back and when she was 1 ½ years old, they moved to 306 W 138 Street to enjoy the fruits of their labour.

After graduating from Wadleigh High School in 1944, Gwen continued to follow her passion of lifelong learning and although she never graduated, attended a number of colleges and universities – Howard University, City College of New York, Hunter College and New York University. Her part time courses in liberal arts, math and legal studies, served her well while employed in a variety of positions. She worked with the United Nations legal department, Girl Scouts of America, U.S. Marine Department, New York University, and with the legal firm of Paul O'Dwyer.

Interestingly, Gwen worked at Ford Instrument Company, a division of Sperry Rand, Inc. from 1962-1969. She was a technical typist and she said that they were always working in secret. Gwen smilingly recalled, "It was only recently that I found out what the projects where that I worked on. While viewing the movie *Hidden Figures* I told my daughter that I used to type formulas just like that while employed at Ford Instrument. She went online and discovered that Ford Instrument Company was working with NASA on the space program during 1962-1969. After all these years I finally knew."

In 1948 Gwen married Van Lester Turner, Jr. and they moved to the Dorie Miller Cooperative in 1952. They became part of history as these were the first integrated cooperative apartments in the United States.

Gwen and Van had three children, Richard, Linda and Jane. Tragically Jane died in 1968 at the age of 17 from Lupus and this drastically altered the course of their lives. Gwen shared that she became so depressed that she had to get out of New York and went to St. Croix, U.S. V.I. She exclaimed, "I threw myself into my job. It was like a new life for me and I felt like a different person. I felt like I was finally home." Her husband born in Tennessee was not prepared to follow her and requested that she come back. Gwen still overcome with grief did not return to mainland U.S.A. until 43 years later at the age of 87 when she realized she wanted to be buried with her parents. While in St. Croix, Gwen was employed by the Hess Oil Virgin Islands Corp for twenty-one years in the human resources and legal departments. She retired at the age of 64.

Gwen says, "I am now 91 years of age and thank God I feel great. I now live amongst my daughter Linda and enjoy my eight grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. Being retired is wonderful. I live in a lovely apartment (East Stroudsburg, Pennsylvania). I go to church, water aerobics, AARP meetings and other social events. God has been very good to me and I appreciate every moment of it!"

Reflections by niece Bernice Y. Carnegie

My Aunt Ethel was a woman of many talents. My older sister Goldie shared with me that she remembers her in her younger years taking her with her to do domestic duties in the homes of the wealthy. She was very creative and went on to become an accomplished seamstress, building a business in dressmaking and owning her own hat shop. When her father, George retired in Jamaica, she also supervised his rental properties.

Ethel was to marry three times. I remember the husband she affectionately call "Benny". They happily spent many hours of singing, him with his guitar and her on the piano. He often captured family memories with his Polaroid photos. Years later after his death she married Clayton Anderson a gentleman from the U.S.A. who dutifully cared for her until the end.

She was a devout church goer, where she sang in the choir and played the organ. I never saw my Aunt Ethel without a smile or a kind word and so you can imagine how sad it was when she professed a serious transgression to family members. Maybe it was to clear her conscience but that resulted in changing our family dynamics for years to come and family dinners were never the same. I guess some things are better left unsaid.



Obituary

Private funeral services will be held in Hamilton, Ont., this after-noon for Ozzie Carnegie, a memoer of a unique hockey line which burned up senior ranks in Quebec for the better part of a decade.

His brother, Herb Carnegie, and Manny McIntyre joined Ozzie to form an all-black line in 1942 when they played at Timmins, Ont. They later joined Shawinigan Falls of the Quebec Provincial League and, from 1946 to 1950, they were the highest-scoring forward line in the Quebec Senior League,

Centre Herb, right wing Ozzie and left wing McIntyre usually finished among the leading senior scorers. They were such an attraction they helped keep both the provincial and Quebec Senior leagues


Ozzie died at his Grimsby, Ont. home Wednesday after a lengthy ill-

ness. At 70, he was the oldest of the three. Herb, 68, lives in Toronto while McIntyre, who will be 68 this year, lives in Montreal.

Ossie and younger brother Herbie spent many hours honing their hockey skills on the ponds of Willowdale. During the summer months they would hit golf balls back and forth in the fields and also became accomplished golfers.

Ossie was the first to pursue a career in hockey and enticed Herbie to join him in the northlands of Perron, a move that stopped Herbie from graduating from high school but lead to an outstanding hockey career.

Ossie lived with Herb and Audrey until Ossie married Eileen. He and Eileen had three children that they raised in Montreal. After his hockey career was over, Ossie was not known for keeping in touch with his family.



Bernice Isobel Carnegie was the first Canadian born Black Registered Nurse to work with the Nova Scotia Health Department in Sydney and the first Black Registered Nurse hired by the Victorian Order of Nurses (V.O.N). Canada was not accepting of Blacks in nursing in the 1940s and to overcome this roadblock, Bernice attended St. Philip School of Nursing, Medical College of Virginia. USA. Three years later she graduated as a fully qualified registered nurse, but she did not stop there. Bernice had done so well in the three-year course that she received a scholarship which she used to continue her studies for one more year, in order to obtain qualifications in public health nursing.

Bernice was a member of the Eureka Friendly Club which is one of the oldest chartered clubs in Canada. She taught Sunday School and participated in local church activities. She also sang in several choirs; North York Community Choir, the church choir, and the Grace Trottman Choir. She was also a volunteer for the Children's Aid Society and was on the executive of the women's section of the United Nations Association, Toronto Branch.

Bernice died of lung cancer on October 23, 1993. She was truly a trailblazer who opened many doors of opportunity especially for Black women.

Nathan was a good provider.

He was in the electrical corps

of the army during the second world war; worked for Ferranti for 40 years. He built the first split-level home in Willowdale in 1948 and invented many household items.

LEGACY NOTE: Made history as a member of the only all Black Hockey line in semi pro hockey; Won 24 golf Championships and 2 national titles; Established the Herbert H. Carnegie Future Aces Foundation and became a philanthropist enriching the lives of countless youth; Has an arena and a school named in his honour; Has received 8 medals for community service including the Order of Canada; Has been inducted into 14 halls of fame.

Herbert Carnegie was born at his parent's home at 55 Federal Street Toronto in 1919. He was a resident of North York most of his life (from youth to adulthood), where he shared a loving partnership with Audrey Redmon for 63 years.

In his youth he was a talented athlete who parlayed his skills into an outstanding career in the Ontario Hockey Association and Quebec Hockey Leagues. He made history by being part of the only "Black Line" in the semi-pro leagues in the 40s and 50s. Following his seventeen year hockey career, he established the first registered hockey school in Canada in 1955. Additionally he is the only Black man to have won twenty-four amateur golf tournaments and holds two national golf titles.

His vision of justice and fair play produced a remarkable code of ethics, called the **Future ACES Philosophy**. This has been used as a character-building and ethics tool in hundreds of schools throughout Ontario and beyond for four decades.

He along with his wife Audrey and daughter Bernice established the *Herbert H. Carnegie Future Aces Foundation* whose initiatives have enriched the lives of countless youth.

A few of his acknowledgements include receiving eight medals for good citizenship, being inducted into fourteen halls of fame, being appointed York Regional Police's Honorary Chief of Police and having a school and an arena named in his honour.

In addition to being a role model to many thousands of youth, Herb was a kind, caring and dedicated husband and father.

My mother always looked stylish and was a talented dressmaker, a skill she passed on to me.

Ross Carnegie was the youngest child of George and Jane. Ross revealed through many conversations that there were strained relations between him and his father. As a result, Ross sought to leave Canada and go to the **USA** to live independently from his family. Because of his young age, his father's signature was required for him to get a green card.


Ross was 19 when he left home to go to New York. He said: "It is a day I would never forget. My father walked me to the door, admonishing me that if I had been a nice son I would not be leaving like this. I walked out of the door, got into a taxi and got on the train. I cried all the way here (US) and it was a twelve hour trip. When I got off the train, I was really, really scared to death and wondered what I would do next. Everything worked out so beautifully and everyone was so good to me." Several of father George's siblings lived in New York and Ross cultivated friendships with his Aunts and Uncles. Ross went on to say, "After a while I did miss my brother and sisters and mother and father too. I was a good son once I was in New York. I would call frequently and was back in Toronto at least once a year."

This was the beginning of a new life for Ross. He left behind a father that he felt did not love him and a child from a brief relationship with a girl friend who shortly afterward severed contact with the Carnegie Family.

Ross married teacher Elise King July 1, 1950 and had their only child Adina two years later. Elise very knowledgeable, had a Masters Degree and Ross admits he did not appreciate all that she had to offer. Ross became a savvy business man, following in his father's footsteps of buying rental properties. He continued to develop his musical skills and became a multi-talented Bandleader, Master of the Hammond Organ and a Piano Stylist. He became a valued mentor to many musicians both young and old.

Now in his twilight years, Ross admits he could have been a better father and husband. He feels he is now making up for that in his second marriage to Norda. He affectionately calls her *Precious*. They met back in 1994 where he played and she sang at a wedding. Years after both their spouses passed on, they rekindled their friendship to become soul mates. Ross truly has learned to value each moment in time and through kindness, a caring heart and loving spirit understands that every moment with *Precious* is precious.



LEGACY NOTE: "Little" Arthur King was a Canadian professionalfeather/light/welter/middleweight boxer of the 1940s and 1950s who won the Canada lightweight title, and British Empire lightweight title, his professional fighting weight varied from 126 lb (57 kg; 9 st 0 lb), i.e. featherweight to 151 ½ lb (68.7 kg; 10 st 11.5 lb), i.e. middleweight, he was managed by Dave Yack (pre-1948), and Frank "Blinky" Palermo (1948-52), he struggled with his health for many years. Arthur King was elected to the Canadian Boxing Hall of Fame in 1987 and inducted into The Boxing Hall of Fame on May 5, 2018.





Reflections from his daughter Kim Kenny ...

In addition to working a fulltime job with Dominion Store in the evenings my father voluntarily taught boxing to young boys for about 15 years. It was his way of giving back. He always said, "If they are with me learning boxing, they're off the street ... safe."

Reflections from his brother David King ...

Arthur was an amazing musician on the organ and many other instruments even though he could not read music. Piano sessions saw Ross playing the chording while Arthur played the melody.

On the one hand Arthur had a mean streak and that is what made him a great boxer. On the other hand he taught me a lesson by not allowing me to go into boxing. He said they would butcher me.

Arthur ended up going to the U.S.A. but signed up with the wrong person. They made him fight against opponents that were 35 lbs heavier even when he was hurt. He was forced to fight to eat.

Arthur adopted a boy, Wayne King, who at the time was in need of special attention. He said Wayne reminded him of himself and he wanted to give back the way Mr. Carnegie had.

The last fifteen years of his life he suffered from brain damage caused from boxing and died at 84 from pneumonia.

How Arthur and David became part of the Carnegie Clan as related by David King — June 28 2017

The parents of Arthur and David were Arthur Augustus King (from Barbados) and Louise Augustus Brown (from Panama). They met in Toronto, married and lived on Augusta Avenue in Toronto where they raised their five children, Gwen, Phyllis, Arthur Jr., David, and Harold. Arthur became a butcher — a profession that ultimately resulted in his death from a knife cut, causing yellow jaundice. At that time David was 3 years old. When Arthur died, Louise, a homemaker, moved in with her cousin who helped support and keep her family together. Sadly four years later Louise died of breast cancer leaving their family orphaned.

The two girls, Gwen and Phyllis, were teenagers and old enough to go on their own and the youngest Harold was placed with family members. Arthur and David were sent to children's aid where they struggled with abusive behaviour — beatings and name calling (nigger) for several years as they were moved from one home to another, until they were placed with George and Adina Carnegie. David recalled that their stay was supposed to be temporary but in the end George and Adina embraced them into their home at 42 Boswell Avenue and three years later adopted the boys but insisted that they should keep their family name. David stayed with the family for 10 years until he married at age 21.

David said that they never called George or Adina mom or dad, always Mr. and Mrs. Carnegie but thought of them as second parents. David recalls Mr. Carnegie saying that he would never lay a hand on them but they would be disciplined by being sent to their room. He said that Grandpa George was good to his word and treated them fairly. He remembers that Mr. Carnegie always gave them good advice. David fondly recounted memories of Mrs. Carnegie and emphatically said, "I loved that woman!" When she became very ill, David made a special trip to visit her in the hospital before she died much to the surprise of daughter Ethel who expressed that she did not know he cared about her that much. His final visit to see Mrs. Carnegie was a testament to their nurturing spirit as foster parents. David lamented, "Where would we be today without Mr. and Mrs. Carnegie. You never know what would have happened to us."

About David: Interviewed by Bernice Carnegie June 28 2017

David enjoyed the security and stability of the Carnegie household. He became a functioning member of the family and on weekends would accompany Mr. Carnegie and his daughter Ethel from their city home to Mr. Carnegie's property in Willowdale. He helped tend and spray several acres of their fruit trees.

Like the Carnegie boys David loved hockey and eventually played in the WHA (World Hockey Association) and was drafted by Pittsburgh where he incurred a serious back injury that landed him in a body cast for three months as part of his six month hospital stay. They thought he would never walk again. It was ten years before David was able to lace up his skates.

David recalled, "By fourteen I had a part time job and Mr. Carnegie taught me how to manage my money. At seventeen years of age I started to work with Photo Engravers and Electrotypers and that became my profession for 42 years." While there he played hockey and coached for the company team. David embraced the lessons of Mr. Carnegie and bought and sold six homes during his lifetime augmenting his working income and providing a comfortable lifestyle for his family.

By coincidence, while at Photo Engravers, David ran into Herb Carnegie, who happened to be working as a binder for three months during the off season of Herb's hockey career. When Herb became a Financial Advisor with Investors Group, they would again connect. David invested \$20,000 through Herb. \$25,000 had been negotiated with the help of Mr. Carnegie when David slit his arm on the TTC during an accident. Small world.

David married Shirley Anne Hazel in 1950 and had three children, Brandy, Debbie and Erron. At the time of this interview David was 88 years young. Although dealing with the challenges of prostate cancer, he had a smile on his face, spoke with a youthful voice and looked 20 years younger than his real age. With a family that has had a history of passing on much too early, David views the world optimistically and said he was grateful for his life experiences.

LEGACY NOTE:

The Carnegie family was the only Black family in their area of Willowdale in the 1930s.

The community stayed mostly White even into the 60's where Herb and his sister Bernice chose to reside. They built homes and raised their families on Empress Avenue and Kingsdale Avenue respectively, their children eventually attending the same local high school — Earl Haig High School.

Legacy Note: Three generations of the Carnegie Clan attended **Earl Haig High School** starting with George and Adina's kids at which time they were the only Black students in the school.



Reflections of Goldie by Sister Bernice

Our parents eloped in 1940 and a year later a few days before their first anniversary, Goldie arrived in the desolate community of South Porcupine Ontario. Mom and dad did not know anything about babies and she was their number one test case.

Goldie was a sensitive individual and frequently tears come to her eyes when she revisits memories of her childhood. She was always known as the pretty but aloof child who admits she lacked self confidence and struggled through school. Others would recognize her amazing gifts. She demonstrated the family love of sports and became a track and field champion in high school. She also followed a family tradition of playing the piano and she would wake the household to her beautiful classical music, a talent she exercised into her adulthood.

The dreaded school days were over and Goldie saw herself moving on to Teacher's College until BANG . . . we were in a car accident. I was 16 and she was 20. I was spared irreparable injury but Goldie had her leg broken in two places, something that would plague her for the rest of her life. I marvel at Goldie's courage for dealing with doctor after doctor and the excruciating pain that only got worse into her senior years. Goldie learned to shut up and put up with the hand with which she was dealt. And more hard times came her way when her husband Lionel of 13 years died prematurely from a heart attack at 38 years young and she became the only parent to raise their son Kevin.

I marvel at Goldie's courage having been a homemaker and with no business skills, she found a way to get on with life. Within two weeks and with the help of a friend she was employed. Her keen sense of money management enabled her to hang onto her home and provide for her son. After 12 years on the job she finally took a bold step to apply for a receptionist's position that would ultimately change the course of the rest of her life. She performed this job to rave reviews from staff and clientele that saw her emerge from smothering her talents in a cocoon to becoming the self confident and beautiful butterfly she deserved to be.

Goldie retired at age 58 to successfully deal with breast cancer. Then stepped in to care for our aging parents until they passed on. We did not realize until much later that all the while she was suffering from depression.

Although Goldie continues to live in pain, she now feels free and content to live with what she calls an uncomplicated and simple life. She has a strong relationship and counsels a handful of special friends; enjoys her trips to the casino affectionately dubbed *The Bank of Woodbine*; engages in our mother's favourite pastime of reading; and relishes in countless hours of competition playing SCRABBLE with me!



Our Canadian teenaged "Herbie" became Dr. Dale Carnegie graduate of the Ohio College of Podiatric Medicine. Through focus and hard work Dale put himself through school with the unconventional job of assisting with autopsies.

The family was thrilled when at the graduation, he was selected by his peers to receive *The Gafford Ethics Award* for his proficiency in Forensic Medicine and for the demonstration of such deportment, honor, and moral concepts as are most consistent with the highest code of professional ethics.


Little did Jackie and Dale know what was in store for them. Within months of graduation, Dale was called up to serve as an officer in the United States Army, utilizing his new skills as a podiatrist in a US army hospital.

In 1970 Dale moved on to opening his own podiatric practice and even designed the office himself. After 25 years, he closed his office due to changes in the US rulings around insurance compensation and began fulltime work at Denver Health Hospital where he stayed until his retirement in December 31, 2007.

As a resident of the U.S. Dale continued to play recreational hockey for 30 years and still enjoys regular rounds of golf. The love of both sports was learned through the teachings and coaching of his father.

Dale nurtured two sons Darren Phillip and adopted son Christopher Lynn. He remarried in August 21, 1976 to Pharmacy Assistant Connie Sesto. They have enjoyed forty-one years of married life, living comfortably in the suburbs of Denver Colorado.



Bernice married Granville Chambers of Jamaica December 2, 1967 at the end of Canada's Centennial Year. After 12 years as a stay at home mom, Bernice's depression precipitated the end of the marriage, resulting in new beginnings. She became a working single mother for the first time and re-educated herself by becoming a Financial Advisor with Investors Group. She has survived enough bumps along the way to appreciate her many amazing life experiences, especially enjoying a very close relationship with her three adult children, Vaughn, Brooke and Corey.

I could hear the smile in Nate's voice as he recalled his mother emphasizing that he was born in the old Mount Sinai Hospital in Yorkville Toronto in **Room No. 8** on March 12, 1949. He was my closest cousin as his parents lived on the upper floor of our home while his father built their own home on Kingsdale the next street over.

Nate went to McKee Public School and remembered participating in a community Fun Fair. He was excited with his entry of an Avro Arrow model plane, when a man pointed out to him that the wings were on backwards. His interest in planes would eventually catch up with him. He said he really enjoyed high school, a second generation family attendee at Earl Haig S.S. but his real passion showed up at Air Cadets where he was a stellar student and received his private pilot's license at the age of 17. A year and a half later he was off to Seneca College for Commercial Air Pilots Training. He was one of 30 students selected from 300 applicants to take the course. But commercial piloting was not to be — he failed the course.

In 1970 he married Heather Held and went to work for her father as a Production Manager at his gasket company for two years. The union with Heather ended and so did his desire to work at the gasket company.

Nate had an entrepreneurial spirit and when he met Phyllis Fast he was ready to explore new horizons. She had an inactive company called Attic Typesetting. It needed a sales person and so they joined forces; flipped a coin to see who would become president and Phyllis won the toss. Together they started their own business and became the second company in Toronto to develop a computerized typesetting system in 1974.

After two years Nate became president of the Toronto Typographers Association and then joined the international branch which led to doing typography lectures around North America. Their mainstay was book publishing eventually landing their largest account with Harlequin romance novels. Nate recalled, "In 1991 Apple MacIntosh did us in. The typesetting industry came to a halt and clients started typesetting their own jobs."

Nate has a gift for creating new opportunities and as clients started to buy their own equipment he made a career shift by helping them make the purchases and by providing typesetting training. He then branched out into the self taught business of servicing and repairing computers. It was a client's party that led him to meeting the second Phyllis in his life, Phyllis McIntyre, resulting in a twenty year loving partnership.

Phyllis was introduced to gliding and loved it. This rekindled Nate's old passion for flying. They could not wait to get into the air. The sale of a family property made it possible for them to buy their own aircraft. They bought a Pipistrel Sinus Motorglider and Nate even went to Slovenia with Phyllis' niece to see the last stages on the production line. One week later he had the thrill of test flying his new toy.

Sadly Phyllis died June 27, 2016 a couple of months before the plane could be shipped to Canada. She never did see it. Although Nate misses his bright, articulate and spunky partner, he has been filling his days with travelling the globe and on clear days is found high in the skies. Now retired, his lifelong dream of piloting brings him solace and joy.

First of all I would like to say what a great childhood I had. I am the youngest of four siblings who paved the way by breaking my parents in. Thank you guys. Also by the time I grew up, my father was progressing in Investors Group and my lifestyle was more affluent than my siblings.

I was always active in school activities be it the orchestra, cheerleading, basketball, gymnastics or track and field. I was determined to do everything my sisters had done and even more if I could. However as friends went, even though I had them, I always felt I was on the outside.

In Grade 12, a friend asked me why I didn't date my own kind? That was really an epiphany for me when I realized I was different. So I immersed myself in the "Black" culture by joining a group called the Black Youth Organization (BYO) where we learned about Black culture and joined with other groups (The Black People's Movement of York University and The Black Student's Union of U of T) and formed another group called the Black Education Project or BEP. This organization tutored Black youth around Toronto and with the help of Black owned businesses took them on outings to further their education about Black people in Ontario, visiting historic cites in Dresden and Buxton (Black settlements near Chatham).

It was through this organization, that I met my first husband, Maurice Rhodd, a York University student. We moved to Jamaica in 1972, when Michael Manley became Prime Minister, as my husband wanted to be part of the change to improve the living conditions in his home country. Our children (Kalimah and Tamu) were 18 months and 6 weeks at that time. In Jamaica, I voluntarily worked with youth at the YMCA, danced with two dance troupes and played netball with two teams. I also attended the University of the West Indies taking Social Work for one year. Five years later, we separated, and I returned to Canada with my daughters.

Upon my return I had a variety of jobs – mostly in the Administrative field. While working at Markel Service Canada Ltd. as the Secretary to the Secretary Treasurer, I met and married my second husband, Barrington Palmer. We had one son, Rane Carnegie.

A lot of my working career was political in nature and I worked as a legislative assistant for the New Democratic Party caucus, then as the logistics officer for the leaders tour during the 1990 provincial election which we won. I then worked in the Premier's office as a general assistant in the Executive Director's Office then was promoted to Special Assistant to the Premier, working directly with Premier Bob Rae. I also worked with Stephen Lewis who was appointed Advisor to the Premier on Race Relations after a number of Black men/youth had been shot by police. Although the job was stressful, it was very rewarding.

I went on to work as an Organizer and Campaign manager for the NDP both provincially and federally in Ontario and Nova Scotia. One real growth experience for me was to run for MP in the riding of Willowdale.

I am currently an Education Consultant at the Herbert H Carnegie Future Aces Foundation where I proudly work with school communities implementing my father's Future Aces Philosophy in both elementary and secondary schools across Ontario.

I am the proud mom of three children who have blessed me with seven grandchildren. All three children are happily married.



Remembering Adina Carnegie

I just learned today, three months after the fact, that on May 17, 2017 my cousin Adina took her leave from this world. I had known for many years that she had been struggling with various drug addictions that resulted in her estrangement from the family. Why am I writing this . . . because she **was** part of our family and deserves to be remembered.

My contact with her was all too brief as she was born and raised in New York and I in Toronto. My memories are of a bright, happy girl, full of life. My last encounter was about twenty years ago when I was 50ish and my boyfriend and I unexpectedly dropped by her home while we were vacationing in Boston. I knocked on the door and when she came and saw me standing on the other side of the screen she opened it and we laughed like the long lost cousins we were and hugged and hugged and hugged some more. This would be the last time I saw her.

I talked with my Uncle Ross at length today and he was brave enough to share his feeling about some of the missed opportunities he would have liked to have had with his daughter. Like all parents do when things go awry for our children, we ask what could I have done differently? My Uncle was in that time and space and confided he wished that when she was in her early teens that he had spent more time with her rather than developing his career as a musician, a profession for which he clearly excelled. I could hear the pain in his voice when he said, "I have now learned what I needed in a marriage and back then I did not handle it well. I was not a nice guy and when you do not have a loving situation the children pay the price."

If we blamed our parents for everything that went wrong in our lives it would be a very sorry world. Ultimately each of us must take responsibility for our choices. My Uncle and Aunt did what they could – moved her back home, helped her to receive treatment and spent many thousands of dollars hoping it would make a difference. But drugs have a way of taking you down the rabbit hole and the sadness of it all ends up being shared by our friends and family.

Adina married Donald Mathis in the early 1990s a union that lasted only a few years. Unfortunately their use of drugs ended up being their undoing. While healthy, Adina was a Deputy Commissioner of a prison. My Uncle told me his daughter was smart, sharp, had a talent for figures and a head for entertainment. In a perfect world he would have loved it if they could have worked together.

His world now includes memories of what could have been with his daughter and late wife Elise but from these experiences he has shown the kind of human courage we all seek -- to learn from our past and discover how giving love to others lifts our spirit in untold ways. Happily I can say that my Uncle Ross has found the true meaning of love in his second union with his wife Norda.

Her hard work and perseverance paid off. Despite the long process of completing the basics of school, she advises our next generations to keep achieving their dreams no matter how long or painful it may seem. To that end, Denise went on to George Brown College and found it rewarding to earn honours with a Certificate for "Introduction to Sociology".

Denise has an office background and after high school worked as a typist and data entry clerk, later becoming an assistant physiotherapist. True to the Carnegie tradition, Denise has always enjoyed music. She received several certificates from the Royal Conservatory of Music from the University of Toronto and presently works as a music teacher, teaching piano and theory.

Denise recalls that life has not always been pleasant. She has occasionally had bouts of illness with depression and a weight problem caused by anti-depressants. Being a woman of faith, she prayed hard to fight back her feeling of having no reason to live. She said that her trust in God has helped her to take a more positive approach to life. She feels that she has been blessed to grow up with the love of her aunts and uncles who encouraged her to keep striving towards the goals that she had set for herself.

Denise has always been known to have a kindness of spirit and shows great empathy for family and friends, frequently revealed through her phone queries and willingness to administer prayer. Her devotion as a daughter has not gone unnoticed as she has patiently cared for both her father and mother throughout her adulthood.

Denise is an ardent church goer and her participation in the church choir and the Catholic Women's League are two of the many ways in which she makes a positive contribution to her community and reinforces her belief in God. Philippians 4:13 is one Biblical verse that continues to have special meaning in her life, given to her by her mother one day when she was studying for an exam.



Brooke Chambers is the eldest granddaughter of Audrey and Herbert Carnegie. Although born in the big city of Toronto, she was raised in the farm lands of Newcastle where she and her brothers were the only Black students in their elementary school.

Hard working, determined and athletic by nature, she was an accomplished Ontario Track and Field Competitor who also became an Ontario Junior Amateur Body Building Champion.

Towards the end of her first year at Ryerson University she was recruited into policing and became the youngest officer hired by the Ontario Provincial Police in 1989 at age 19, as well as being the only "Black" female. She was dedicated and passionate throughout her nine year career, serving in many capacities — breath technician, coach officer, high school liaison officer, mediator, investigator for the fraud squad, policy developer for Correctional Services and Trainer at the Ontario Correctional College.

Brooke left policing when her only daughter Kyla was born and became an astute financial advisor. At the height of her financial career she managed \$60 million in assets for approximately 800 personal clients. During this time she was diagnosed with Bipolar Disorder. Having severe health challenges Brooke left the financial world to take care of her health. It took more than 15 years for her to find the right balance of nutrition, exercise and lifestyle in order for her to feel that she was able to contribute to the world again. Brooke's friends say, she is an amazing coach and mentor they can count on for excellent advice.

She enjoys travel, constantly engaging in projects that provide learning opportunities and uplifting debates, and spending time with family and friends.



Revisiting past memories with my niece Tamu brought a smile to my lips when she spoke of our family gatherings for Easter, Thanksgiving and especially Christmas. All the grandchildren would sleep over with grandparents Audrey and Herb. Each child was about a year apart and she recalled how she and her young cousins would have friendly fights mixed in with the excitement of opening gifts and a big family dinner. It was never the same she said when Grandpa sold the family home on Ravenscroft Circle because that was the one place she felt was home. And so when she and her husband Mike and kids would come back to visit Toronto they stayed there – it was home.

She recounts, "During my teenage years there were a lot of troubles but I was strong enough to overcome those obstacles. I had goals -- to finish school and become a police officer." Later she said, "I could see everyone was doing better than us and I wanted to have a nice home and a husband that treated me well." And that is what makes Tamu so remarkable in the eyes of her family. She persevered and moved on to reach her goals.

Tamu was featured as the VIP guest at the A.B.L.E. (Association of Black Law Enforcers) Ball June 8, 1996. Her strength of character was clearly evident when at eighteen she started applying to various police forces as a cadet or constable but kept coming up disappointed. Still determined she began studying law enforcement at Seneca College and working for various security companies. With help from some A.B.L.E. members, including her cousin Brooke, Tamu applied to the RCMP in April 1994 and was accepted a year and half later.

Quoted in the program Tamu said, "The training was challenging and rewarding. I learned a lot about life. But the hardest thing about being there (Regina Saskatchewan) was being away from my family and my fiancé Mike."

Nothing much has changed about Tamu's values. I could hear the smile in her voice on the phone when she said, "I am proud of the fact that I have been married for 20 years and we have made a beautiful life for ourselves with our boys. It was always my dream to become a police officer and I actually still get excited when I get into the police car. I still love the job and what it has brought to my life.

I do not think I would have been happy if I did not make it. I had to cry a lot of tears and change a lot of things in my life. I certainly paid it back and this job has been more rewarding than I ever thought it could be."

The empathy Tamu learned on the job even fending off PTSD led her to continue to stay closely in touch with her grandfather even though she was the grandchild farthest away. He loved her for that; we all do too!

Tamu married Mike Bracken and has three children, Kyler, and twins Blair and Trevor. Mike is also employed as an RCMP officer.



EULOGY

<u>CATHERINE DOROTHY CROLE</u> affectionately called "Mother", was born of Thomas Carnagie and his wife Mary at the district of Allison in the parish of Manchester on April 24, 1896, almost 101 years ago - she was the last of eight children.

She received her early education at the Mizpah Elementary School and the Zion Hill Baptist Sunday school.

After leaving school she was sent to North Clarendon to learn the skill of dressmaking. This did not work out lucratively and so she desired to be trained as a nurse but her parents would not send their young daughter to the vile city of Kingston.

As an industrious young lady she used her dressmaking skill along with other gainful employment to make a livelihood. She met and fell in with Samuel Spurgeon Reid, of the district of Bombay and was joined in holy wedlock on the 27th of June 1925. The union brought forth four children; John, Leslie, Joyce and Edward. (Leslie has since deceased). Her husband, Sammy, after a short illness died in 1941. She was left alone to care for her children. It was difficult for her but with a grim determination she settled down and brought them up second to none in the district.

Some years later another gentleman fell in love with her and so she and Jeremiah Crole got married on December 21, 1946, who helped her with the brought up of her children. This union brought forth no children. Along with her four children Mother Crole took in and helped other children who were less fortunate. Brother Jerry pre-deceased her nine years ago.

Mother Crole was savedby the Grace of God, and had an unflinching faith in Jesus Christ. She was a member of the Zion Hill Baptist Church were she served as Sunday School teacher, Deaconess,, lay-preacher, organist and indeed in nearly every activity of the Church. She had a sure and steadfast testimony and her life was a living sermon. In May of 1990 she was recognised by the Church for long and faithful service.

She will be longed remembered as a community worker. Although she was denied the opportunity as being trained as a nurse, she became a self-styled nurse of no mean order. People sought her advice and help for all kind of ailment and she helped many. She was the Mid-wife for the area for up to three generation. When she attended to a mother who delivered triplet and brought them in to the Mandeville Hospital the Matron and nurses were amazed and commended her highly for her skillfulness. Dr. Logan honoured her by giving her a Certificate of Midwifery.

Mother Crole had the pleasure of visiting Canada and United States spending time with her children. One of the high points of her visit was to visit the "White House", when she sat in the President's chair, she was heard to say. Is Catherine Crole this President Nixon's chair?

She was a charming, earing, generous, loving and Godly lady. "She had done what she could:MK. 14: 8.

Last year April she celebrated her 100th birthday, the queen sent words of congratulation and the Governor General paid tribute.



Carnegie Clan History

In 1358, Walter de Maule made a grant of the lands of "Carryneggy", at Carmyllie, in south-east Angus on John de Ballinhard, who, the transaction having been confirmed by David II, took the name Carnegie of that Ilk. This line expired in 1563. However, the style "of that Ilk", meaning "senior of the Name", was restored by the Carnegies of Kinnaird towards the end of the 16th century.

Duthac de Carnegie, second son of John de Ballinhard, witnessed a deed of sale in Aberdeen in 1383, and from him and his son John de Ballinhard, descend the House of Southesk and the House of Ethie. Duthac was killed at the Battle of Harlaw in 1411. His son, Walter Carnegie of Kinnaird, fought under the standard of James II at the Battle of Brechin in 1452.

In 1513, John Carnegie of Kinnaird died fighting for James IV at the Battle of Flodden. His son, Sir Robert, a member of the College of Justice, was sent to England to negotiate the release of the Earl of Huntly, Chancellor of Scotland, who had been taken prisoner at the Battle of Pinkie in 1547. Sir Robert's son, John, was a loyal supporter of Mary Queen of Scots. He died without children, so the family estates passed to his younger brother Sir David, who, in 1616, was created Lord Carnegie of Kinnaird, then in 1633, Earl of Southesk. In 1662, the earldom of Northesk was assumed by his younger brother John, who in 1647 had been elevated to the peerage as Earl of Ethie, but preferred the Northesk alternative.

The Carnegies were fervent Jacobite supporters. The 5th Earl of Southesk took part in the 1715 Uprising and was attainted, his estates forfeited to the Crown. Sadly predeceased by his children, the Southesk title passed to Sir James Carnegie of Pittarrow, descended from a younger son of the 1st Earl. In 1885, the attainder was reversed and the titles restored.

In 1923, the 11th Earl of Southesk, when Lord Carnegie, married her Highness Princess Maude, granddaughter of Edward VII. Their son, as well as being heir to his father's earldom, and being Chief of Clan Carnegie, was made Duke of Fife. The Family Seat is Kinnaird Castle at Brechin, in Angus.

The 6th Earl of Northesk (1716-1792) became an Admiral in the Royal Navy; his son, the 7th Earl of Northesk (1758-1831) was third-in-command under Admiral Lord Nelson at the Battle of Trafalgar. Andrew Carnegie (1835-1918) was the son of a Dunfermline-based linen weaver who emigrated to Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, USA in 1848. Through working in the iron and steel industry, he became one of the richest men of his generation and gifted over \$350million dollars to charitable causes, including the town of Dunfermline.

Places of Interest: Kinnaird Castle at Brechin in Angus, seat of the earls of Southesk and dukes of Fife. Skibo Castle, Dornoch in Sutherland, dates from the 12th century. In 1898, it was purchased and remodelled by the tycoon Andrew Carnegie. Today, with its 18-hole golf course, it is run as the exclusive members only Carnegie Club.

Surname distribution in Scotland: The Carnegie surname is most commonly found in Angus (Forfarshire), Dundee City, Aberdeenshire and Forfarshire and Kinross (Perthshire and Kinross-shire).
