Good morning, Len,

It was good talking to you. We talked awhile and covered a lot of ground, but to summarize our conversation as you anticipate questions regarding this project:

- The bridge replacement requires bank stabilization of the bluffs adjacent to the bridge to protect the abutments that support the bridge.
- We are coordinating closely with the Granada Community Services District to ensure that
 continuous sewer service is maintained for the existing sewer line that crosses the Arroyo
 de en Medio Creek (inclusive of both temporary transmission lines during construction
 and permanent facilities post-construction).
- We have evaluated the option for relocating the bridge, including consideration of the
 more immediate need to replace the bridge and the issues associated with relocating of
 the bridge (including environmental permitting with respect to new construction over a
 riparian habitat).
- Finally, we are planning on holding community meetings, but it is too early in the design process to do so; and my initial email was prompted by a grant application we only recently became aware off that requested information on any known public support we

might be aware of. In that regard, we felt it important to indicate MCC's general support for this project.

I apologize for the short notice and greatly appreciate your efforts in providing a letter for us to include in the application packet.
