
11. Old San Pedro Mountain Road Trail


The Old San Pedro Mountain Road Trail counter was installed on March 18 and recorded a total of **24,906** users in 2015. This included 16,999 pedestrians, 7,119 bicyclists, and 788 equestrians*. The busiest day was Wednesday, May 27 with 305 users. The slowest day was Monday, March 23 with 21 users. The daily average was 87 users. 


Figure 2.4. San Vicente Creek Watershed Land Use and Monitoring Stations






