Subject: **Budget Support for County Parks and Public Works** for invasive jubata/pampas grass control

Dear Supervisor Horsley:

In May 2016, MCC wrote in support of a coordinated Midcoast area-wide effort to eradicate invasive jubata grass, more commonly known as pampas grass (letter attached). We received encouraging replies from the National Park Service and Granada Community Services District, and participated in discussions on this issue at two County Weed Management Area meetings.

What we hear from County Parks and Public Works is that they have no budget for invasive weed control on an ongoing basis. Various one-time grants do not provide the consistent treatment and follow-up necessary to achieve significant, lasting, area-wide control. Only limited sporadic progress is made, and then lost.

With the goal of protecting our Coastside sensitive native habitats from continuing invasion and destruction by jubata grass, we ask your support for regular annual budget allocations to control this noxious weed in County Parks and in Midcoast public rights-of-way.

Subject: Support for eradication of invasive jubata/pampas grass in the Midcoast

Each year jubata grass, more commonly known as pampas grass, expands its hold on our coastal open space lands, degrading grassland, scrub, and rocky outcrop habitats by displacing native species, and increasing fire risk. Starting in August every year in the Midcoast, jubata grass blooms and produces vast quantities of wind-dispersed seed without even requiring pollination. The seeds remain viable for only one year, which should make control feasible with an area-wide coordinated program to eradicate existing plants and stop the bloom and seed dispersal cycle. We have seen gratifying results of various local projects, but without an area-wide effort and consistent follow-up, the results are short-lived.

The Midcoast Community Council (MCC) supports the goal of eradicating jubata grass in the Midcoast, from Devil's Slide south to the Highway 92 corridor, with a coordinated interagency effort. There is a three-month window now before this year's bloom cycle is upon us. Every jubata grass plant that dies before blooming this year represents many thousands of seeds that are not dispersed in the wind for new plants next year.
