600 SAMPLE – REGISTERED VOTERS**

JUNE 21, 2022

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METHODOLOGY

The Glengariff Group, Inc. conducted a Michigan statewide survey of registered voters. The 600 sample, live operator telephone survey was conducted on June 15-18, 2022 and has a margin of error of +/-4.0% with a 95% level of confidence. 26.0% of respondents were contacted via landline telephone. 74.0% of respondents were contacted via cell phone telephone. This survey was commissioned by Secure Democracy USA.

KEY FINDINGS

66.6% of Voters Believe Michigan Elections Fair and Accurate

- * By a margin of 66.6%-25.1%, Michigan voters trust that the process for counting votes in Michigan elections is fair and accurate.

47.3% of voters strongly trust the count while 19.3% somewhat trust the count. 14.0% of voters strongly distrust the count while 11.1% somewhat distrust the count.

- * There is a sharp difference based on partisan affiliation. Democratic and Independent voters have overwhelming trust that the system is fair and accurate. But only one third of Republican voters believe the count is fair and accurate with a majority of Strong Republican voters distrusting that the count is fair and accurate.

72.5% Believe Michigan’s Overall Election Process is Fair

* 72.5% of Michigan voters believe the entire election process in Michigan is fair. 17.8% of voters believe the process is unfair.

A majority of all partisan affiliations believe the Michigan election process is fair. But again, there is a sharp difference with Republican voters compared to Democratic and Independent voters. One third of Republican voters do not believe the Michigan election process is fair.

* The sharpest difference comes among voters that say they are more supporters of Donald Trump than they are supporters of the Republican Party. ‘Classic Republicans’ believe the Michigan election process is fair by a margin of 59.2%-24.6%. But ‘Trump Republicans’ believe the election process is *unfair* by a margin of 64.3%-28.6%.

64.1% Believe Election Laws Treat Both Parties Fairly and Equally

* 64.1% of voters believe that Michigan elections laws are fair and equal to both parties.

18.6% of voters believe that election laws favor the Democratic Party and 8.5% of voters believe that election laws favor the Republican Party.

Again, the sharp difference comes by party affiliation – specifically with 47.9% of Republican voters believing election laws favor Democrats. But even 21.7% of Democratic voters believe Michigan election laws favor Republicans.

* When asked why they think the process favors the Democratic Party:

- 24.1% Trump won 2020 and it was stolen from him
- 14.3% Democrats control the state
- 10.7% Democrats control everything
- 9.8% Voter fraud in 2020
- 9.8% Crooked politicians are cheating
- 5.4% Issues with mail in ballots

* When asked why they think the process favors the Republican Party:

- 31.4% Gerrymandering
- 11.8% Voters suppression efforts
- 11.8% The GOP blocks/un does Democratic efforts
- 7.8% GOP controls the legislature

5.9% Michigan laws lean conservative
75.0% Confident 2022 Results Will Be Counted Accurately

- * By a margin of 75.0%-21.0%, Michigan voters are confident that votes cast in November will be counted as voters intended. 50.2% are very confident while only 8.0% are not confident at all.

Again, the sharpest demographic differences were by party affiliation.

- * ***A majority of classic Republican voters are confident by a margin of 57.7%-34.6%. But Trump Republicans are not confident by a margin of 69.0%-23.8%. 69.0% of Trump Republican voters are not confident the votes will be counted accurately.***

Voters Have Great Faith in Their Community Election Leaders; Republicans Skeptical of Other Communities, State Election Leaders

- * Voters have high confidence in the people running elections in their own community but they have considerably less confidence in people running elections in other communities.

Voters were asked to rate on a one to ten scale their confidence in how fairly four different groups of people will do their jobs in the upcoming election. The higher the score, the greater the confidence of fairness.

8.6	Poll workers in your local community
8.5	Clerks that run the polling places in your local community
7.0	Clerks that run the polling places in other communities
6.6	Michigan statewide officials that run elections

Democratic and Independent voters gave scores above 7.0 to all four groups. Republican voters gave high scores to their local workers and local clerks. But when it came to clerks in other communities or statewide officials, Republican voters gave significantly lower scores below 6.0 with ‘Trump Republicans’ giving scores below 4.5.

Elections Seen As Free, Accessible, Clean, Fair and Accurate

* Voters were read fourteen different words and asked on a one to ten scale how much they thought the word applied to Michigan elections. The higher the score, the more the word applies to Michigan elections in the voter’s opinion. These words are ranked from highest rated to lowest rated.

- * Despite strong correlation to rankings between Democratic and Independent voters, the word rankings change significantly when you look at Strong Republican voters, Classic Republican voters and particularly Trump Republican voters.

Among Strong GOP voters the top rankings include:

7.5 Accessible
 7.0 Free
 6.5 Open to Fraud

Among Trump Republican voters the top rankings include:

8.0 Accessible
 7.9 Open to Fraud
 6.6 In Trouble

- * Three words in particular showed the greatest disparity between ‘Trump Republican’ voters and Democratic and Independent voters: Secure, accurate and honest.

69.4% Support Seven Days of Early Voting: Big Divide Between Classic and Trump Republicans

* By a margin of 69.4%-22.9%, Michigan voters support a proposal to allow seven days of Election Days style early voting hours, including the weekend before the General Election.

47.8% of voters STRONGLY SUPPORT this proposal while only 18.6% STRONGLY OPPOSE this proposal.

Only Strong Republican voters are split on this proposal with a major difference between ‘Classic Republicans’ and ‘Trump Republicans’.

71.7% Support Early Processing of Absentee Ballots

* By a margin of 71.7%-24.8%, Michigan voters support a proposal to allow local clerks to verify and process absentee ballots during the seven-day voting period to help ensure final results can be called sooner on or after Election Day.

46.9% of voters STRONGLY SUPPORT this proposal while 15.1% STRONGLY OPPOSE this proposal.

Even ‘Trump Republicans’ support this proposal by a margin of 57.1%-32.3%.

76.7% Support Online Website Reporting Absentee Updates; Uniform Partisan Agreement

* By a margin of 76.7%-18.0%, Michigan voters support a proposal to require an online government website that regularly updates the number of absentee ballots that have been requested, the number of absentee ballots yet to be returned and on election night reports exactly how many votes remain to be counted.

51.2% -- a majority of Michigan voters – STRONGLY SUPPORT this proposal. Only 9.7% STRONGLY OPPOSE this proposal.

Unlike many of the other questions asked, there were only minor statistical differences by party affiliation.

79.0% of Voters More Confident with Bipartisan Election Bill

- * By an overwhelming margin of 79.0%-12.6%, Michigan voters have more confidence in an election bill that is passed with bipartisan support from both parties compared to those passed by the party they support.

The most support for a bill passed by ‘the party they support’ comes from base voters on *both sides* of the aisle. But only 17.2% of Strong Democratic voters prefer a single party bill and 15.5% of Strong Republican voters prefer a single party bill.

61.6% of Voters Say Little to No Fraud in 2020, Republican Voters Disagree

- * Voters were read four statements and asked which one most reflected their feelings about the 2020 election results. 61.6% of voters said there was no or only minor fraud in the election. 32.1% of voters said there was major fraud.

- 32.6% There was almost no fraud in the 2020 election.
- 29.0% There may have been very minor fraud that had no impact on the results.
- 7.5% There was major fraud, but it still would not have changed the results.
- 24.6% There was major fraud that changed the results of the election.

There were major differences among Republican voters compared to Democratic and Independent voters. But it is ‘Trump Republican’ voters that nearly universally believe there was significant fraud associated with the 2020 election at 95.2%.

73.5% of Voters Want to Get Past 2020 Election

- * By a margin of 73.5%-24.3%, Michigan voters say it is time to move on from the 2020 election and focus on the future. 24.3% of voters believe charges of fraud should continue to be investigated.

The most glaring statistical difference is between ‘Classic Republican’ voters and ‘Trump Republican’ voters.

By a margin of 66.9%-29.2%, ‘Classic Republican’ voters believe it is time to move on from the 2020 election.

By a margin of 71.4%-26.2%, ‘Trump Republican’ voters believe charges of fraud should continue to be investigated.

59.6% Believe Senate Republican Investigation Over Trump Claims; Trump Republicans Unanimously Behind Trump Claims

- * By a margin of 59.6%-22.6%, Michigan voters believe Republican Senate leaders over former President Trump and his campaign. Democratic and Independent voters strongly side with Republican Senate leaders. Republican voters, however, support President Trump over Senate Republican leaders by a nearly two-to-one margin.

While ‘Classic Republicans’ are split between Senate Leaders and Donald Trump, ‘Trump Republicans’ again are nearly unanimous in their support of Donald Trump.
