BIGGLESWADE UNITE

Real Bedford clinched a 5-1 victory over Biggleswade United thanks to two stunning goals late on under the Tuesday Night Lights.

First-half goals from Ben Stevens and Joey Evans were accompanied by incredible efforts from Josh Setchell and Charlie Smith in the second half, alongside a late goal from Tom Hitchcock to seal the win on the road.

Bedford completely controlled the game throughout the first half, ensuring the home team couldn't get a shot on target throughout the 45 minutes. Instead, all the action took place down the other end of the field. Fifteen minutes in, a low cross from Josh Setchell found Tom Wood at the back post, but the captain mistimed his shot, and it flew over the bar from close range.

Moments later, there was more trouble for Biggleswade as Corbit's deflected cross found Evans in the area; however, the striker couldn't get the right touch on it to open the scoring. Still, Real Bedford searched for a goal, as Lee Watkins fired one towards the target from outside the box, only for it to steer wide off the outside of his boot

The Pirates soon found their opening. Biggleswade defenders initially blocked shots from Ben Stevens and Claston Gordon but only as far as Evans, who took the time to find the back of the net off the rebounding ball and get the visitors off the mark.

Moments later, Real managed to double their lead before the break. A long throwin by Lewis Burgess was parried away but only as far as Stevens, who struck the ball on the half volley, nestling it into the bottom left corner from just inside the area, doubling The Pirates' lead heading into the break.

The home side entered the second half with more fight, creating better chances

in the final third. The game sat poised, with Biggleswade looking for a goal to half the deficit and launch a comeback. However, Josh Setchell had other ideas. The winger picked up the ball inside the Biggleswade half before taking on Anthony Leslie and curling a shot past Caleb Chandler in goal to send the away fans delirious. A superb solo effort from many yards out that could end up being an early contender for goal of the season.

Biggleswade weren't down and out, and the referee awarded them a lifeline in the 73rd minute for an apparent handball by Lewis Burgess in the area. Jesus Mendoza slotted it past McGregor to keep the home side in the game.

As Rob Sinclair brought on the experienced heads of Tom Hitchcock and Luke Knight to see out the game, Real Bedford resumed control of possession, limiting chances for Biggleswade to launch attacks in the final 10 minutes. With the clock in the red, Bedford showed defensive resilience to win the ball back in their half. As Charlie Smith received possession in the centre circle, he caught Chandler off his line, producing an inch-perfect shot over the keeper and into the back of the net in incredible fashion.

Real Bedford were not done and quickly launched another attack late on. Josh Setchell picked up the ball on the flank before delivering a cross towards Tom Hitchcock, who found the back of the net at the far post to seal the deal for the away side as Biggleswade fell apart. A late off-the-ball tussle saw former Bedford FC midfielder Connor Inskip receive a straight red card, not that the game was affected as the referee blew his whistle shortly after.

FROM THE BOARDROOM

I am delighted to welcome every one of you to McMullen Park for today's match against Stansted.

Today is pretty special for me as we are joined at our meetup by Jameson Lopp. For those unfamiliar, Jameson is a highly respected Bitcoin OG, a software engineer and the CTO of Casa. I had the privilege of interviewing him in 2017 as the 3rd ever guest on my podcast. After just two shows, I contacted Jameson and requested an interview. He agreed, so I jetted to America, recorded a show, and we have remained friends since. Having him come to Bedford is quite surreal for me.

He is not the only special guest today; the new Mayor of Bedford, Tom Wootton, is in attendance. We are also excited about the many activities planned for Bedford Park Rangers, the local boys group we partnered with last season.

The team has put in immeasurable work to put this day together. The meticulous planning and logistical coordination have two primary objectives: to ensure that Rob, his staff and the first team have everything they need to give us the best chance of victory and that the fans have a great day out.

This occasion is a perfect opportunity to spotlight Real Bedford's progress since I took over the club. From the outset, my mission has been unequivocal: bring league football to Bedford. We're a sleeping giant, and there is no reason we can't rub shoulders with teams in League 2, and maybe higher.

The original goal was to achieve this within a decade, but our aspirations have now broadened to include ladies' football, where I believe we can get them into the third tier of their pyramid.

On the pitch, after clinching a league and cup double in their debut season, our men's team currently sits second in the league, with four games in hand on the league leaders. Real Bedford Ladies have also had a great start to the season, having won every game and still in the FA Cup.

Crowd attendance, a vital aspect of our club's growth, continues to grow. I remember the days we averaged 40 fans a game after I first took over the club. This season, we set a record with 364 fans in attendance on a Tuesday night for our opening game. The ladies have also seen growth, with over 200 fans attending their first home game and setting record average crowds.

Internationally, our fanbase continues to grow. Real Bedford's reach, extending from Argentina to Australia, Lebanon to Canada, has



placed Bedford on the global map. Just last week, I was at Pubkey, Real Bedford's official supporters' bar in New York, where I watched us beat Biggleswade with a bunch of Pirates.

My recent trip to LA and New York was to meet with some of our American sponsors, where I went to update them on our progress. All of them are committed to supporting our long-term vision, which enables us to focus on excellence in men's, ladies' and youth football.

We are committed to nurturing young talent through Real Bedford girls and Bedford Park Rangers boys. We have over 60 teams in our group and have begun initial work on our plans for supporting disability football in Bedford. This season, we have increased funding for youth coaching and grown our hardship fund, ensuring no child is deprived of football due to economic constraints.

Our plans to grow our infrastructure, including constructing a new ground, training centre, academy, and sports excellence facility, are underway but our expansion plans transcend football. We are working on building Real Bedford netball and an eSports team, highlighting our commitment to fostering all sports in Bedford.

I want to congratulate our neighbours, Bedford Town, for their fantastic start to this season. It is a source of pride that all three teams, Bedford Town, Real Bedford, and Real Bedford Ladies, are challenging for their respective leagues.

The essence of rivalry and competition is intrinsic to driving excellence. It inspires investment, hard work, and growth. Sport is no different from business. Without competition, you can get lazy and stale. I want all Bedford teams to win, though I want us to play Bedford Town, too. Just imagine that day out.

Despite our early success, this project must be sustainable. While I can secure sponsors and drive merchandise sales, you, the fans, play an important role.

I love Bedford, and I love our underdog position. I can't wait for a big club to come here and play us, and lose.

Onto the game today where we face Stansted. I appreciate your support and you for coming down to McMullen Park. I hope you have a great day and we can secure three more points.

This week, we sat down with Tom Wood, the ever-present defender who has captained The Pirates on multiple occasions this season, having established himself as one of the first names on the team sheet since his arrival last year. We talk about his time at the club, his role in the dressing room, and the support from his family on and off the pitch.

The team are coming off the back of two solid wins in the league. What have you taken from these last two games?

The boys are full of confidence at the moment. We really feel like we are finding our flow. Relationships on the field have strengthened massively over the last few weeks as players settle into their roles. These last two performances have been some of our best yet, and we know we can build on them and achieve much more.

Real Bedford put eight goals past Colney Heath in a dominant performance at McMullen Park. A hat-trick for Joey Evans and Josh Setchell, alongside goals from Matt Clifford and Tom Hitchcock either side of half-time, was enough to dispatch the London side in front of a lively home crowd.

The Pirates had the majority of chances, especially in the first half, with the first opportunity coming moments after the whistle. A long throw-in from Lewis Burgess caused issues for the Colney Heath defence, and Tom Wood was able to get a free header; however, the captain couldn't get enough connection on the ball to steer it home.

Moments later, Bedford came even closer to finding the back of the net. A Colney Heath defender steered Charlie Smith's indirect free-kick towards the back post; however, Matt Clifford's deflection flashed across the face of the goal in agonising fashion.

The Pirates soon broke the deadlock. A looped pass from Eddie Corbit was well-weighted down the right flank towards Josh Setchell. The winger then showed his skill by stopping and starting in front of the Colney defenders before slotting it past George Irons in the Colney Heath goal from a tight angle.

Two minutes later, Bedford doubled their lead. Quick thinking from Ben Stevens and Charlie Smith from the corner allowed Smith to whip in a tempting cross towards a huddle of Bedford and Colney Heath players, with Evans getting the lightest of touches to guide it over Irons and into the back of the net.

The Pirates continued to turn the screw scoring their third goal inside 10 minutes. With complete control of the midfield, Mo Ahmed found space to lay the ball off to Matt Clifford, who, from 30 yards out, released a powerful shot which deflected off Jamie Welling and into the back of the net.

Just before half-time, Real Bedford got their fourth. Eddie Corbit, working hard down the right flank again, drove towards the byline before making a direct pass to Joey Evans at the back post, who tapped it in for his brace just before half-time.



Second Half

Real Bedford similarly started the second half and soon extended their lead. A cross from Matt Clifford was initially blocked by Welling in the Colney Heath defence, but Josh Setchell picked up the ball at the back post and smashed it past Irons on a tight angle to get his second goal of the game.

Setchell continued to cause mayhem at McMullen Park, and moments later, from a short corner, he managed to get a shot away outside the area, which fired inches right of the Colney Heath goal. However, The Pirates' winger was soon rewarded for his hard work. Joey Evans played a short pass to Setchell on the edge of the area, who took a touch before smashing the ball into the bottom right corner of the goal to complete his hat-trick.

Ten minutes later, Colney Heath managed to find a consolation goal. The Pirates initially dealt with a short free-kick routine; however, Jamie Luniss managed to pick the ball up on the right flank as he slipped a low driven cross past Clifford and Burgess before finding George Sippetts, who toe-poked it home for Colney Heath's only goal of the game.

However, it didn't halt The Pirates' momentum, as they were soon back on the scoresheet. Luke Knight played a ball across midfield to Charlie Smith before Smith played a lobed pass to Tom Hitchcock. The replacement smashed the ball into the back of the net on the half-volley for his first goal of the season.

Bedford wasn't done there, and with just over five minutes to go, Claston Gordon managed to dribble his way towards the byline before crossing the ball into Joey Evans; despite the striker being under pressure from Colney Heath's defenders, he still managed to smash the ball into the roof of the net to make it three goals for him on the day.

LADIES CHAIR: JILL UPTON

Bedford Ladies and Girls Football Club was founded in 1996 as part of a boys club called Kempston West End. It soon became apparent that the objectives of the boys' and the girls' football were very different, and we wanted to focus on the needs of the girls, so Bedford Girls Football Club was born.

At this time, we had just four teams. When our Under 16s team had won everything in 2003, we registered our first adult team and became Bedford Ladies and Girls FC. Over the next few years, the Ladies' team steadily progressed through the County League divisions and was promoted to the Eastern Regional Women's League Division 1 in 2007.

It took the next seven years to win promotion to the National League, but sadly, we only retained our place for two seasons. In 2013, we were part of a lottery bid, and we received £126,000 from the Council to renovate Allen Park, which has been our home ever since; this has allowed us to grow from six girls teams to the 18 we have today, from under 8s to under 18s.

In partnerships with several schools, we run after-school clubs for girls interested in the English National Women's team and excited to play with other girls.

We take players as young as six into our under 8s, and it's super to watch their enthusiasm and joy in playing the game, and the youngsters love being team mascots for the Ladies.

We train as a group twice a week, concentrating on having fun whilst developing skills, promoting a healthy lifestyle, and improving fitness and wellbeing. The older girls are encouraged to mentor the younger ones, take up coaching and refereeing, and run teams themselves. Parents are encouraged to get involved, giving the



Club a unique family atmosphere.

The Club is the longest-established, largest and most successful all-female girls' and ladies' Football Club in Bedfordshire, and we aim to develop girls to play at the highest levels within our Club. The Club is run by volunteer Club Officials, Coaches and Parent Helpers.

In 2013, the Women's National League expanded to include the four Combination Leagues, which became tier three and four of the pyramid; this was the same year our Ladies won promotion to the National League at tier four, the South East Division.

Since the 2016/17 season, we have played in Tier Five, the Premier Division in the Eastern Regional League. Still, we could not attract a manager with the passion and drive to get us into the one promotion spot available each season. In 2021, we met Peter McCormack from Real Bedford, and he was very keen to embrace female football within Real Bedford Football Club. His enthusiasm to support the ladies and help us realise our ambitions was very appealing. So this season, we have changed our name to Real Bedford Ladies and Girls, with all 300 girls wearing the Pirates badge.

With Peter's help, we have recruited Dean Perrett to Manage the team, and he has built a great squad to start this new journey. So far, we have won 7 from 7 in the league and are through to the next round of the Women's FA Cup.

The future looks very bright.

THE AWAY TEAN

At the end of 2018 – 19 season many Stansted followers (The Airport Army) were reflecting on what had been the most successful club season we have had for many years. To be able to display not just one trophy, but three because as well as collecting the League cup and the Gordon Brasted Memorial Trophy we also received the Shield for our Second place finish in the League. The club were not considered by many to be in contention for any honours after the experience of the previous season when the club won a late reprieve from the FA and avoided relegation to step 6 status. That made the success even more remarkable and was great testament to the hard work put in by the whole coaching staff and players.

With the Essex Senior League now in its 52nd season of competition we are proud to still be able to promote the club as being one of the Leagues founder members, although prior to the success of 2018 - 19 season our only other honours were a League Title in 2009-10 and two League Challenge Cup wins in 1983-84 & 2010-11, therefore the club are now hoping to build on these latest achievements.

Operating a football club at this level in the FA pyramid is extremely challenging. What with financial burdens, player expectations and the need to compete with other major sports organisations in our geographical area a great strain is placed on all the volunteers associated with the club.

Records show that the club goes back as far as 1892 and although success has mainly been confined to the League and Cups, our club name still stands proudly in the FA



Handbook as winners of the FA Vase when in the 1983-84 season the players and fans made the trip to Wembley and in front of a crowd of 8,500 beat Stamford 3-2, a memorable occasion where the memories of a great day are portrayed in the Club Committee Room.

There was however a period of dark days when in 2012-13 the future of the club looked bleak where lack of leadership at the helm of the club led to a situation whereby outstanding debts meant there could have been a distinct possibility of the club folding. However a new committee of fresh faces was found and under the stewardship of Glyn Warwick the club managed to see off the threats of the bailiffs knocking at the club door. The new motivated Committee members were able to put plans in place, and over

several years has attracted both new sponsors and supporters to the club, thus ensuring a brighter future.

Further evidence of that was the introduction of Over 45's Veterans Football which has introduced an avenue for those ex-players who thought their playing days were over and in season 2021/22 competed in the Premier Division of the Greene King Essex Veterans League after gaining promotion the previous season.

In 2020 - 21 season the club embarked on a new adventure with the introduction of 3 Junior teams at different age groups competing for us, which we hope will kick start the clubs long term plan of having a pathway in to Senior football but at the same time bringing junior football to Stansted.
