





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Dear Tiyya Community:



The last two years have been pivotal for The Tiyya Foundation as we maneuvered a global pandemic and revitalized our services in the community. After government budget cuts to refugee resettlement, I found myself in 2019 as the only employee at The Tiyya Foundation. In 2020, I launched a brick-and-mortar restaurant, Flavors from Afar, as a way to sustain our programmatic efforts – 40% of proceeds go back to The Tiyya Foundation. Unprepared, our opening date was the same week as the 2020 stay-at-home order. Today, we are recognized as the top 101 Restaurants in Los Angeles, voted by the LA Times.

While establishing this initiative, Tiyya cared for clients through a severe global pandemic. Refugees were excluded from government aid and faced intense food insecurity, social isolation, and employment challenges. Our donors rose to the occasion, and together we provided regular food deliveries, direct financial aid, and consistent programming to our community through the toughest of times.

I'm incredibly grateful for how we came together to care for one another. I'm also proud to report back that we have a thriving programming staff that supports the rehabilitation of families after experiencing displacement. Our programs include Case Management / Educational Access, Career Placement, Community Engagement, and Workforce Development. Our families are designated to various cohorts within our programs such as

Women & Mothers, Teens & Young Adults, Economic Advancement, and Community Development to ensure that they receive undivided attention. We are also securing funding to on-board a Housing Specialist soon to help identify housing in the Los Angeles and Orange County areas.

I thank you for believing in our mission to support families of immigrants, refugees, and displaced indigenous communities. Can you imagine being housed, checked on, set up with a job, and part of the community after something so traumatic? This unique and streamlined process has taken me 12 years of trials and tribulations to refine.

The Tiyya Foundation was founded by refugees and women of color for the places we live and the communities we serve. We embrace the strengths and beauty of our different histories to build spaces and experiences where all discover belonging.

Thank you for being part of our transformative work. As the media updates us on world tragedies, it can feel paralyzing. I'm so grateful to be working alongside you to create a tangle rehabilitation process for families starting anew in our local communities.



Program Design in 2021

Tiyya conducted a comprehensive needs assessment for all clients in March 2021. By identifying what levels of challenges our members were experiencing, we also analyzed our communication to the larger community. Resources we provide to each member is made possible by our donor base. Our donors, who were also experiencing the challenges of the pandemic, needed a better understanding of how to help Tiyya's clients. The relationship is symbiotic. Data we collected allowed us to redesign Tiyya's programs to provide more engagement for both audiences. This higher level of community engagement increased social interaction, employment opportunities, and led to the design of four new cohorts.

This integration of the donor and client community is witnessed successfully at Flavors from Afar, where refugee chefs are praised for their talents. It is also demonstrated at Tiyya's mixers where clients and donors are able to develop meaningful relationships.












Track 1: **TEA AND TOTS**

Once a month, Tiyya families and our general donor base are both invited to a casual playdate at the park or community centers to break bread and enjoy a variety of international teas. Youth ages 0–7 are gifted with diapers, toys, and school supplies. Mothers also receive pop–up workshops as it pertains to career development, practicing conversational English, and parenting in America.

Track 2: COFFEE AND CONVERSATION

Refugees already experience intense amounts of isolation upon arrival to the United States. We now see how social isolation exponentially magnified for them during 2020. To help assist mothers as society opens, Tiyya plans to host Coffee & Conversation gatherings to help them feel acclimated with socializing again. These gatherings will offer opportunities to practice conversational English skills, cross cultural communication, and relationship building facilitated by Tiyya's ESL Instructor.



Track 1:

YOUTH CULINARY ACADEMY

Since launching our brick-and-mortar restaurant, our refugee chefs have requested opportunities to work with Tiyya's youth and community members. As this would be a great opportunity for Flavors to merge closely with our programs, The Tiyya Foundation has decided to launch a Culinary Academy for ages 7-12. During these sessions, youth will learn how to make a variety of dishes from around the globe while also immersing in academic skills-building. Our curriculum will include easily transferable lessons in the kitchen such as time management, mathematics, project management, and other skills that will help students learn how to retain information in their school environment.

Track 2:

LIFE SKILLS PROGRAMS

Over the years, our educational programming consisted of our College Preparation which provides workshops and one-on-one mentoring to prepare middle school and high school students. To upgrade this program, we plan to meet monthly and include outdoor activities to encourage movement. Activities will include hiking, soccer, and enjoying other outdoor activities while planning for college.

A portion of our Life Skills Program will be dedicated to financial education. Participants will learn more about debt management, credit scores, managing bills / expenses, and other financial basics so they can prepare for the real world.



COHORT 3

Economic Advancement

Track 1: CAREER PLACEMENT

Our economic advancement activities help any client over the age of 18 to find and maintain employment. Our dedicated Career Placement Specialist works with local employers to place clients directly into jobs. Tiyya prioritizes serving women to address gender economic equity, but no one is turned away from services. Unique to Tiyya, our career placement staff work with clients not just to find entry level employment, but to become recertified into the professions they held in their home countries such as medical doctor, dentist, and engineer. We also offer traditional Job Coaching that teaches clients basic job search skills, resume building, networking on LinkedIn, and interview techniques.

Track 2: FLAVORS FROM AFAR

Our social enterprise Flavors from Afar hosts our Culinary Program. While the general public gets to experience global cuisines each month designed by former refugees and asylum seekers – our clients equally benefit from on the job training, and receive a portfolio of food photography, headshots, and a personal bio. This package is designed to professionalize their work so they can pursue long-term employment in the culinary field and/or establish their own catering businesses. Our unique mission and revolving menu have earned us significant media attention. From Buzzfeed, Los Angeles Times, Eater, Food52, Institute of Culinary Education, and more. Yelp reviewers continue to praise our level of quality, hospitality, flavors, and commitment to community. The LA Times has voted Flavors from Afar as Top 101 Restaurants in LA County, 2021.



COHORT 4

Community Development

Dedicated to engaging individuals who identify as BIPOC and/or 1st & 2nd generation immigrants, our Executive Director has begun cultivating meaningful relationships by hosting private dining experiences at Flavors from Afar at select private locations. Community members are invited to attend curated conversations and participate in focus groups. These events have given us invaluable feedback and insight from new and long time supporters.

Track 1: COMMUNITY CONVERSATIONS

The Tiyya Foundation has noticed a lack of personalized stories in the immigrant narrative. Many times, these narratives are often told by people removed from the experience. We are working with Mythos One Media to share unique stories of migration and how second-generation immigrants preserve parts of their identities while navigating the United States, as first hand accounts.

Track 2: COMMUNITY SALONS

Select community members are invited to attend curated conversations. Data acquired from these private conversations help inform how best to engage with our often-overlooked sector of the community.

Track 3:

COMMUNITY EVENTS

Since 2010, Tiyya has facilitated seasonal community events to help fundraise for our programs. These activities take place quarterly to sustain our program initiatives, while allowing clients and donors to develop meaningful relationships.

COVID-19 in 2020







The pandemic proved to be an extremely challenging time for our organization. Families served by Tiyya were facing intense food and financial insecurity, minimal access to public transportation, unavailable school and childcare centers, and an increase in mental health challenges. Additionally, in March of 2020, we took a leap of faith and launched our social enterprise restaurant, Flavors from Afar in Little Ethiopia of Los Angeles, as many establishments around us were forced to close their doors.

Throughout the pandemic, we regularly paused and listened to our youth and families; quickly pivoting to what we learned as high priority needs during multiple lockdowns. By leaning on our volunteer and donor network, together we were able to accomplish the following as a community:

- Tiyya raised \$25,000 to support families with financial emergency relief by assisting with utility and rent expenses, academic supplies, and gift cards for groceries. Over 51 households were able to pay late overdue bills and avoid eviction.
- Flavors from Afar offered a one-for-one campaign where purchases made by restaurant patrons provided food items to our clients, lasting them up to two weeks. This allowed 140 families to receive bi-weekly grocery assistance.
- Offered free virtual weekly tutoring sessions for 35 participants, led by volunteer educators.
- Modified our college-prep activities to be hosted virtually. This service included FAFSA applications, basic understanding of scholarships, and financial aid opportunities.



Through Tiyya and Flavors from Afar, 40 individuals, of which more than half are refugee women, found solid employment.




Tiyya secured housing for 5 newly arrived Afghan families.


