




Find the treasure!

Instructions


Print out both parts of the board game and tape them together. You will need a figurine for each player. If you don't have them, you can use small pasta, pebbles etc. Instead of a dice you can also use six pebbles which you paint on one side. The pebbles that turn to the painted side when you throw them represent the dots on a dice.

To start, all the players throw the dice. The player with the highest number starts first, the player with the second highest number starts second etc. The players then roll the dice and move forward for as many fields as there are dots on the dice (or painted pebbles). When they reach a field with special instructions, they may be sent forward, back, ordered to wait one or more rounds or throw the dice again. Whoever reaches the island with the sea shells first wins the game.

For parents

The board game can be the starting point for a number of discussions to have with children. It's an opportunity to talk about friends and how they make our lives richer and better. Another topic this board game touches upon is the sea, sea creatures and sailing. Perhaps this is also a chance to make plans for your next travel once the lockdown is lifted and life returns back to normal. ©
