



# "Time for \$20" - \$20 an Hour State Minimum Wage






## Deadline: July 31, 2024

<b>Senate Bill <a href="#">S.1200</a>:</b> An Act Relative to Raising the Minimum Wage Closer to a Living Wage in the Commonwealth	<b>House Bill <a href="#">H.1925</a>:</b> An Act Relative to the Minimum Wage
<b>S.1200/H.1925</b> would raise the minimum wage in Massachusetts to \$20.00 an hour by 2028, phasing in increases each year for five years. A unique feature of this minimum wage legislation is that after 2028, it ties further increases in MA's minimum wage to the rate of inflation based on the consumer price index, ensuring that the purchasing power of the minimum wage does not decrease over time.	

**The Joint Committee on Labor and Workforce Development** has until **May 8th** to move the bills forward for a full vote in the House and Senate. (They could also extend the deadline, or let it die for this session).

**Let's get the \$20/Hour Minimum Wage Bills Out of Committee & Up for a Vote!**

## SAMPLE CALL SCRIPT

"Hello! A \$20/hour minimum wage, as well as annual increases indexed for inflation, would make a huge difference for so many people."
