Lara Egger is the author of two full-length poetry collections, *Flop Era* (Pitt Poetry Series, University of Pittsburgh Press, 2025) and *How to Love Everyone and Almost Get Away with It* (Juniper Prize Winner, University of Massachusetts Press, 2021). An Australian native, Egger currently lives in Boston, where she co-owns a Spanish tapas bar.

Helen Fremont is the author of the national bestseller *After Long Silence*, which was named a "New and Noteworthy" book by *The New York Times*. Her second memoir, *The Escape Artist*, was selected as an "Editor's Choice" by *The New York Times* and was named a "Best New Book" by *People Magazine*. Her new book, *Outside the Lines*, was recently published in October, 2025. Helen worked as a lawyer and public defender in Boston, where she now lives with her wife. In 2024, Tracy received the Clarkson Award from Vermont Woodlands for Wildlife for her dedicated support of the natural world. She lives in Concord.
