

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
















## WHY I LOVE RED PANDAS

They are not mean




They are red like my favorite color.

### WHAT DO RED PANDAS EAT?


That is a good question! Red pandas eat 90% bamboo and then they also eat things like fruit. Do you want to know what Mow Mow's favorite snack is?

## HOW DOES THE ZOO'S CAROUSEL GIVE THE RED PANDA MONEY?



African Lion 4. African Elephant 5. Polar Bear 6. Radiated Tortoise



Mei and Ren each had the opportunity to speak with Jerica Tullis, a zookeeper at Utah's Hogle Zoo. She works in the Asian Highlands area with red pandas! She was wonderful! Many thanks to her and to Marilyn Hsiung and Bob Cisneros for arranging everything. This is Mei's interview, and her questions are in bold. Ren's interview appears on the previous page. ## I THINK RED PANDA FACES ARE CUTE. SO I WAS WONDERING, DO ALL RED PANDAS HAVE THE SAME RED FUR AS MOW MOW?

They do all have the same red fur. So that actually blends into this moss that comes on the trees where they [live] in the wild. But they can all have their own individual pattern on their face. So they are all the same color, but their markings might be a little different.

## OH, OKAY! ON THEIR FACES. OKAY, IS THE FUR SOFT? OR DOES IT JUST LOOK SOFT?

It kind of looks soft [but] they have more of a course fur. So if you have a rabbit at home, or if you've ever petted a rabbit, a rabbit is softer.

#### OH. THAT IS INTERESTING.

It is interesting.

## WHAT TOYS DO THE RED PANDAS LIKE?

Oh, that is a good question. So everything we give out here at Utah's Hogle Zoo is species specific. So that means that a toy that a tiger might have might not be suitable for a red panda. So Mow Mow gets a lot of smaller things. He likes things like coconuts—and we can do a lot of things with coconuts—I mean we can drill holes in it and put his food and biscuits in it, so he has to kind of knock it around to get his food [from] it. And he also really loves smells. So he gets things like perfume and lotion.

## (MEI LAUGHS) THAT IS REALLY FUNNY!

Yes, it is kind of funny, but he really likes them because he really like to smell it.

So if he were to, let's say, climb on a tree and accidentally get out we could maybe bring his crate out and he might just go back in because he has a really great relationship with us. So every animal is different. They all have a different thing. So we might use some of his favorite treats to kind of coax him back to us.

It is a good question.


#### WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE PART OF THE ZOO?

My favorite part of the zoo? Well, the red panda is pretty cool. But I like the whole Asian Highland animal area. My favorite animals are snow leopards. Hi, I'm going to tell you about **JANE GOODALL!** So I read a book about Jane Goodall, which I love it, so I'm going to tell you about it, okay! So Jane Goodall, she **LOVES** chimpanzees they're her favorite animal. She looks for them all the time in the morning and she plays with them sooooo much. And y'know she just LOVES them. So let me tell you my favorite part of that story.

So she was just sitting quietly on a rock not moving, when one of the boy chimpanzees arrived on the tree. It came closer and closer. And then the chimp BONKED her on the head with a stick! And she was just sitting there and didn't move. Okay, that's my favorite part of the story.

Okay, I'm going to tell you another thing about Jane Goodall. So Jane Goodall she just loves animals so much that she got a job for animals. And she is still alive, and she still works for them. ## I WAS WONDERING IF YOU COULD TELL ME ABOUT WHEN YOU MADE BIRD HOUSES AT THE LAKE?

Yes, so when I was in scouts, I had an Eagle Scout Project to do. And you're required to essentially do a community service activity or a project. Anyway, I wanted to build something. So I reached out to Lake Thunderbird State Park in Oklahoma about any projects that needed to be done & one thing was BIRD HABITATS also known as BIRD HOUSES. Now, that appealed to me because I already enjoyed bird watching & had bird feeders as a kid.

I had heard of a [type of bird called a] Purple Martin & when they make nests, often other birds will drive them away. So they've kind of been suffering—they've been declining in population. But there's a special design of bird house especially for Purple Martins. The difference is that the entryway to their house is not just a circle, instead it looks more like a half moon shape.

#### wow!

Yes. And apparently Purple Martins their wings kind of fold differently so they can go in versus another bird or a predator who'd try to get in & hurt them.

So when I designed the bird houses with my Dad, Lowell Allen, we made sure we had holes that are perfect for Purple Martins & we also designed it so the roof could be removed & you could clean it out.

### OH SO THEY COULD DO THAT!

Another cool thing is that it is two stories—a two story bird house. So imagine six bird houses all glued together & then on top of that another six bird houses.

## SO IT IS LIKE A BIRD HOTEL ©

Yeah, a bird hotel! We also designed it for air flow. So that air could escape & it wouldn't get too hot & uncomfortable for the birds in the summer—there was venting on top of the roof. We used cedar wood to build the bird houses. Then we used these tall aluminum poles—15 feet tall is what they ended up being—to mount them on.

It took a lot of work to make, & build, & install them. But they came out really well & they looked good, & they are still there over 15 years later. That's pretty good!

- 3. Gardens just means there's a lot of flowers.



The Utah Conservation Corps gives young adults from across the U.S. the opportunity to come to Utah for three, six, or nine months at a time. They mainly live in tents while they are here. They do some of the hardest work in our National Parks, National Forests, and other public lands. They've been doing this for 20 years!

More than 2,500 people in the past two decades have shared their time and energy to help build trails and help make sure that people can continue enjoying nature in Utah for decades to come.

But first we should talk about the word, "conservation." It might have different meanings, depending on what is being talked about. When we talk about the Earth and the environment, it has a very specific meaning. It means "the wise use of our planet." The land. Fresh water rivers and lakes. The ocean. The air we breathe. Plants. Animals. You know, "wise use" instead of "abuse."

If we go back a hundred years, we'll go back to where this concept of conservation crews (much like the ones we have today) all began. By the year 1922, many states within the U.S. had begun developing state parks to allow people to enjoy nature. Before this work could spread to all states, our country entered "The Great Depression." People could not find jobs, which meant they couldn't afford to pay for houses or buy food for their families. The building of state and national parks came to an end.

Then in 1933 Franklin D. Roosevelt was elected president, promising to make things better. One idea for helping people who couldn't find jobs was to create a national Civilian Conservation Corps. The corps volunteers would go out across the entire nation to help build roads, bridges and parks that would be very important for state and national parks. The work was hard. The first group to arrive in Utah built a camp for other Civilian Conservation Corps volunteers in American Fork Canyon. They lived in tents until they could build their own barracks (buildings to live in.)

Here in Utah, nearly 50,000 young men from our state and across the nation worked during the next nine years. Crews in Utah built 116 separate camps during those years. These hard-working people built trails, campgrounds,

cabins, bridges, even phone lines! Most of the early roads giving access to the Wasatch Range were also built by the Civilian Conservation Corps. The work of these crews helped start Zion and Bryce Canyon National Parks.



parks here in Utah, you will sometimes see a sign marking the location of an "Old Civilian Conservation Corps Camp." And you'll see a lot of older buildings and bridges made almost entirely of stone and rough wood. These, too, are the legacy of the Civilian Conservation Corps. On the same trip you might run across a group of five or ten young people working on a trail. They'll have hardhats on and uniform shirts that have "UCC" on them. These young people are also part of the legacy of the Civilian Conservation Corps. They represent what people all around the world call "America's Greatest Idea." They are talking about our state and national park system! And just maybe, during the summer after you finish high school or while you are in college—maybe you'll decide to join the Utah Conservation Corps and help make our parks and public lands better!

Each crew member received pay of \$30 a month which is




Modern day UCC Crew Members building a trail.






"Oh, I never knew this existed. Wow, I think it is awesome that young people volunteer to help make our National Parks looks nice."




This photo shows the necklaces and bracelets on the branches. It will be fun to add more things over time!
