


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Fundraiser Steps:



Dear families,



Nonfiction Reading Response

Directions: Read about the importance of early childhood literacy and charitable organizations working to close the preschool word gap. On a piece of lined paper, summarize the main ideas and relevant details from the text.

The achievement gap is the disparity in academic performance (grades, standardized-test scores, dropout rates, and college-graduation rates) between students from low-income and high-income households.

Why does reading and teaching vocabulary from birth matter? On a typical day: preschool children living below the poverty-line hear about 616 words; children of middle-class families hear 1,251 words; and children of upper-class families hear 2,153 words. By preschool, children from high-income homes have heard 32 million more words than children from low-income homes. By four-years-old, most children from high-income homes know about 1,100 words, while children from low-income homes know just 500 words.

Why is four-years-old too late to close the achievement gap? The preschool vocabulary gap widens exponentially from birth through high school. While high-income children start preschool knowing about 600 more words than their low-income peers, they will start 10th grade knowing 15,000 more words. Between grades 1 and 3, low-income students learn two words a day, while high-income students learn eight words a day. A low-income student reading below grade level in 3rd grade is six times less likely to graduate on time. By 4th grade through high school, low-income children are three to four years behind their high-income peers in reading ability.

What are the consequences? 23% of low-income students will be "held back" and not graduate high school on time, compared to 10% of high-income students. Only 14% of low-income students will go on to graduate from college. On any given day, 10% of male dropouts between the ages of 16 to 24 are incarcerated. 80% of all incarcerated men are high school dropouts. Overall, high school graduates have better health, higher income, and longer life expectancy than high school dropouts.

The most accurate predictor of whether or not a child will graduate from high school on time is the number of words they know when they start preschool. This is true regardless of household income, parent education level, access to quality schools or environmental factors. No school-age intervention has ever closed the preschool readiness gap or achievement gap because reading must start from birth.


What happens when every child learns 1,100 words by preschool? Every child masters the foundational reading skills they need to succeed through high school graduation; Household income does not define a child's long-term success; We close the preschool readiness gap and achievement gap before they start.

Many charitable organizations help to close the preschool readiness gap. Programs empower parents to read aloud from birth to teach children 1,100 words before preschool – regardless of limited time, money and other socioeconomic barriers. 


