Our Community's Challenge

1085 people experiencing any type of homelessness were counted on September 21, 2021.

412 people living rough. (Living in encampments, on the street, or staying in their vehicle.)

335 people experiencing hidden homelessness

191 people in Emergency Shelter.

84 people in transitional housing.

63 people in institutions. (Hospital, Police Custody, Women's Crisis Services.)


Housing First

Housing acts as a foundation. When people have a home, they can live their lives more fully in community.

Housing First - is a recovery-oriented approach that supports our community members dealing with the reality of homelessness by providing independent and permanent housing along with additional supports and services. An integrated model of common spaces and supports builds a community that generates roots and connectedness.




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Who We Are

Since 1982, The Working Centre has been developing and providing a wide range of supports for residents of Waterloo Region. Our network of different projects allows us to connect regularly with those who are homeless, at risk of homelessness or street involved in various supportive settings. From St. John's Kitchen to our emergency shelter to our Job Café, we work to develop the trust and mutual respect that is necessary to create a strengthened community where people pitch in, where friendships develop, and where people help each other during both good times and hard times.








A Trusted Formula

The Working Centre has experience doing this in many spaces - University Ave, King Street, Charles Street, Queen Street - and now we can make this happen for 44 more people at NinetySeven Victoria.



Where We Are Now

97 Victoria has long been a gathering place for those who are experiencing homelessness, are at risk of homelessness, or are street involved. St John's Kitchen receives over 1000 unique visitors per month, who come in to have hot, nutritious meals free of charge, and to access drop-in space, laundry, showers, washrooms and strategic problem-solving supports.

Life in congregate shelters, congregate drop-in spaces does serve basic needs in the short term. However it becomes unbearable over time as people lack privacy, rest and a place to feel secure.



Medical clinic, with public-access washroom, shower and laundry facilities on first floor.


New modern building for St. John's Kitchen with glass front exterior and solar panels on roof.

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Victoria Street Exterior Rendering

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
REINVISIONING NINETY SEVEN VICTORIA

The Working Centre has committed the land at 97 Victoria Street North to the project, valued at approximately \$6,000,000.

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


Philosophy of Working Centre Housing
