THE MEMORY PROJECT EXHIBIT

BACKGROUND Around 1942, 17 year-old Anna Huberman shared a small bed with her younger brother in a stranger's home in Ozarow. The two Jewish teens had separately fled from Warsaw in an attempt to escape starvation and almost certain death in the Warsaw ghetto. They hoped their food rations would help sustain the family members they left behind in the ghetto. After a month Kalman left to work for a farmer in exchange for food and a place to sleep. Anna was captured in a roundup and taken to forced labor camps where she worked in ammunition factories—first in Skarzysko-Kamienno and later in Czestochowa. She met her future husband, Jakub in camp. After Liberation they reunited, started a family and moved to the United States. She is the only member of the family in Poland that survived.

What became of Kalman is a mystery. But through Anna's stories and The Memory Project, Kalman's identity has been reclaimed and transformed into a work of art.

THE EXHIBIT The core of the Memory Project is a combination of nine painted portraits and a video that shows those paintings being made. You'll see artist Roz Jacobs creating portraits of Kalman, her mother's beloved younger brother who vanished during World War II. With each of Jacobs' brushstrokes, her mother shares the experiences she and Kalman had as Jewish children in Nazi-occupied Poland. The Memory Project reflects on feelings of loss, love and memory. It's also about the resiliency that enabled this family to lead a rich happy life in spite of trauma and loss.

TIP Look back and forth from the video to Panel 1, "The Memory Project." You will see that the images on the screen correspond to the paintings on Panel 1. For example, in the bottom left corner of the screen you see the painting on the bottom left being made, etc. This lets you observe the process and the end result of each painting, entering into the creative process along with the artist.

PROJECT

Each painting was inspired by one family photogray. The video represents two voices: Jacobs revealing the creative process as she discovers her lost uncle Kalm through paint, and her mother Anna beinging.

ABOUT THE MEMORY PROJECT IN POLAND

The Memory Project in Poland is brought to you through a partnership between The Memory Project Productions and the Galicia Jewish Museum. The exhibit will travel throughout Poland accompanied by screenings of the documentary *Finding Kalman* and workshops on art and memory.

The goals are to:

- promote awareness and remembrance of Holocaust victims, survivors and rescuers.
- encourage communication about the Holocaust among people of different backgrounds, ages and nationalities.
- bring people closer together by sharing each other's stories of loss and resilience.

The Memory Project exhibit will travel throughout Poland from 2012-2014.
