

# **Veronica Margaret Hess**

Veronica was born in West Vancouver on October 14, 1947. While still an infant her family moved to the Town of Mount Royal, a suburb of Montreal. She attended Mount Royal High and went on to graduate with a BA in philosophy and honours English in 1969 from McGill University.

She married Graeme Shelford on May 24, 1969. A year later, the couple moved to Ile Perrot 30 miles from Montreal. Posted overseas for Graeme's business, Veronica spent her time designing a Habitant-style house, which, on returning, they built themselves without a contractor on the waterfront of Lac St Louis. Veronica also worked for Concordia University vetting student teachers

In 1979, the couple moved to Richmond BC where they converted a typical Richmond bungalow to an attractive West Coast-style house. Veronica took up pottery, selling many pieces and became a respected potter in the Richmond Pottery Club.

In 1988, the couple bought land on Thetis Island and later visited it by boat nearly every weekend. Once again, Veronica designed a house that fitted in with the land. Michel Poirier began construction in 1995 and the couple moved in during the famous snowstorm of Christmas 1996. Veronica joined the volunteers supporting the Thetis Island Quarterly in 1997 and was editor from 1998 until her death.

She loved design, and in addition to designing her own house, she designed her brother and sister-in-law's house at 165 Pilkey Point Road and an investment house that Graeme built at 187 Pilkey Point Road.

Veronica was an active member of the Thetis Island Volunteer Fire Department from 2000 to 2001, but finding its demands beyond her physical strength, joined the Rest and Rehab Auxiliary supporting the TIVFD, later taking on the additional role of supporting the chief with computer work, including the TIVFD website and online burn permits applications.

Veronica was very active in the community serving on the boards of both TICA and TIRRA. She developed and published the informative Thetis Island phone book, the visitors' guide, websites for the TIVFD, TIID, TIVFS, and the community information website thetisisland.net.

Many Thetis Islanders were introduced to Thetis by staying at the Cufra Cliffs B&B which she and Graeme opened in 2002.

Clearly Veronica loved the Thetis Island community and the community reflected that love back to her in many ways.

Veronica died of cancer at Cowichan District

hospital on August 12, 2025. She is survived by her husband Graeme, brother Matthew Hess, sister-in-law Claire Hess, nephews Jeffrey, Michael, Stephen Hess and Carl Dashfield, and nieces Karen and Barbara Dashfield.

I first met Veronica by accident, as they say, in about 1998 or '99 when the TIVFD responded to the Shelfords' half-finished house on Moore Hill for a table saw incident. This tall, imposing, and seemingly unflappable woman from thence onwards became a huge supporter of the Thetis Island Volunteer Fire Department and my great friend.

In fact, Veronica supported the TIVFD so much that she decided to volunteer and was enrolled in our ranks in January 2001. Veronica pulled hose, climbed ladders, wore the heavy SCBA (the tanks were not fibreglass back then), and trained with the rest of us, despite her fire turnout pants and jacket being designed to fit a shorter stature.

Veronica retired from the fire department the following year to take up Auxiliary FD roles in Rest & Rehab, Emergency Scene Traffic Control, and Base Station Operator. She also took on the mundane but extremely necessary jobs as fire department website administrator, the Fire Permit administrator, the TIVFD-sponsored 'Flu Shot Clinic registrar, annual photo inserts into Cowichan Valley newspapers for Fire Safety Week spreads (she even flawlessly photoshopped missing members into the picture) and a myriad of other communications duties over the years that the Fire Chief threw at her. She caught every request with commitment and finesse.

She did all this whilst designing a home for her brother and sister in law, Matt and Claire, taking part in philosophy meetings, TIRRA meetings, TICA meetings, making beautiful pottery, editing The Quarterly newsletter, publishing the Visitors Guide, compiling the TI Phone Book every two years, gardening veggies, rescuing cats, dog-walking, and running a B&B with Graeme. She had travel adventures to far-away from Thetis lands with Graeme and Matt & Claire, and many boat adventures because inevitably their boating sojourns resulted in drifting whilst repairs were made.

In other words, Veronica jumped in, joined in, and kept her life interesting and full until her final day. Her droll sense of humour, despite the cruelty of her illness, was with her to the end. Our late Marge Armstrong sums up one of Veronica's many contributions to Thetis Island life best in her Acknowledgements page of Marge's book A History of the Thetis Island Volunteer Fire Department (2007, cover images by Veronica Shelford): "A very busy Veronica Shelford said she'd proof-read for me. She took my loose-leaf style history and made it into this beautiful book, including collecting (and occasionally taking) the photographs. Everything you see in this book, her hand has touched. Veronica, I am most grateful for your expertise,

guidance, and time. You too, were there for me and I treasure our friendship."

I too, treasure my friendship with Veronica and thank her for her many kindnesses, support and compassion over the quarter of a century I was honoured to know her.
