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



- 1. Pennichuck Water Works, Inc. Regulated Water Utility
- Established in 1852 serves 11 cities and towns. Serving approximately 28,000 customers, which comprises approximately 10% of the households in NH.
- 2. Pennichuck East Utility, Inc. Regulated Water Utility
- Established in 1998 serves 19 cities and towns; located throughout southern and central NH, approximately 7,300 customers.
- Pittsfield Aqueduct Company, Inc. -Regulated Water Utility
- Acquired in 1998 serves the town of Pittsfield, NH, approximately 650 customers.

Pelham does business with Pennichuck East Utility (PEU).

Pennichuck will be restructuring their corporate structure to be one entity – in-

We were told that this consolidation will not include any computer upgrade or any change in personnel. Apparently, it is only corporate. They believe that this merger will reflect in a decrease in rates as they will be leaning out their processes. All of the hearings are held in front of the Public Utilities Commission.

A Consolidated Rate Case hearing will be set shortly. Pennichuck will be releasing notice to all customers at that time, along with a list of frequently asked ques-

We have seen an increase in fraudulent online activity. Protect your devices by keeping the software up-to-date using complex passwords or two-factor authentication. Do not click any links or download attachments unless you're confident of where they came from. Another very important tip, that many people don't think about is to save your online shopping and mobile banking for when you are at home or on a friend or relatives' trusted Wi-Fi. Do not shop or enter banking or credit card information when using a public Wi-Fi connection.

Scams and phishing are a real problem when it comes to online browsing. Social media marketing uses formulas to target their audience, based on your search history or even how long you hover over ads. The information is gathered to narrow what you see or what is advertised to vou and can also be known as "clickbait." Although there are many small businesses that are great to shop with online, many others could be scams. We just hope to bring awareness for shoppers to slow down and pay attention to the signs. Before providing any personal or financial information, make sure that you are interacting with a reputable, established vendor. Be smart, stay safe, and have fun. Lucky winners also had the opportunity to indulge in a pickleball lesson for four, personally conducted by pro, Michael Messier. 
# **SWEDISH APPLE PIE**

- 1 cup flour
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts
- Pinch of salt

#### **Directions:**

Mix all ingredients and let the mixture sit while peeling and slicing enough apples to fill a pie plate (I suggest mixing Macintosh, Cortland, and Granny Smith apples). Spray the plate with nonstick spray first. You can squeeze a little fresh lemon juice and add to the apples but that's optional.

# If it's Light, it's Right – a Mantra for **Psychic Guidance and Clarity**

Do you find yourself overanalyzing and complicating your decisions or daily routine? Would you like to tap into a place of light when a decision and clarity is needed? Do you wonder what this place of light might feel like?

This light-providing guidance goes by many names, such as higher self, higher power, intuition, sixth sense, spirit, psychic ability, or gut feeling, to name a few. They are all synonyms of the same lighted realm.

Just as we have human senses, we also have spiritual or psychic senses. Our five human senses are seeing, hearing, tasting, smelling, and touching. Our psychic senses are called "clairs," and they detect spiritual messages by energetically seeing, hearing, tasting, smelling, and knowing what is being communicated.

For example, if you asked a question and heard the word "yes" in your thoughts, your strongest clair might be hearing thoughts. If in response to your question you see a green light, that may indicate your visual clair is strongest. We generally have one clair that receives energetic communication more clearly, so identifying your dominant sense can help you know what to pay more attention to.

When moving into a lighted realm, it is of the utmost importance to clear yourself of earthly chatter, noise, and your own thinking as much as possible. Thinking can create confusion when you need lighted guidance. Almost like the proverbial lightbulb going off, lighted information darts right into your awareness via a clair. It just arrives. If you are busy thinking, you may miss the flash.

# **Suggestions To Move Into Lighted**

There are no rules or standard steps to follow to access a lighted space. Move with what feels right. Always take what you need and leave the rest. Here's a few simple suggestions.

- 1. Find a comfortable setting, a place free from distractions.
- 2. Clear your thoughts. Play relaxing instrumental music with no words. If you meditate, move there. Light a candle and stare at the flame. Set your intent by saying the words "clear now"

- 3. Ask a question or for general guidance. Trust what comes right back. Lighted messages are received instantly.
- **4. Trust.** This may be the hardest step. Use the mantra: If it's light it's right.

#### **Examples Using the Mantra**

Using two very different examples of a simple question and a more complex one, both examples show thinking vs. light responses. When you seek out a light feeling, you trust it is the right choice, how-

**Example:** Do I walk my dog tonight at 6pm or 6:30pm?

Thinking response: Will something bad happen if I choose the wrong time? Lighted response: 6pm feels light. – Trust

**Example:** My job is moving out of state. Do I follow or look for another job?

Thinking response: I always make the

Lighted response: I have been needing a change, and it feels light to walk towards this opportunity. – Trust – I will keep my clairs open for more signs.

So, how do you find needed guidance and clarity when emotions, such as fear and worry, try to infiltrate? Trust the light that already exists within you during times of difficulty. Practice with simple questions to build your awareness of this lighted information, then give yourself the clarity you seek concerning your decisions by asking, "Does this feel light"? Trust the answer you receive. Acknowledge it, hold it, treasure it. If it's light, it's right.

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



# Ask Lydia Earthwise 🛞



Dear Lydia, Thank you for all of your articles. I love each one of them. Are there trees here in New England that can withstand drought, absorb extra water, and absorb pollutants? - Wishing for it all

Dear Wishing:
I am glad that you enjoy my articles. In New England, you can find trees that possess a combination of traits: the ability to absorb water, absorb pollutants, and withstand drought to varying degrees. While it's challenging to find a single tree species that excels in all three aspects, you can consider a mix of trees to address these needs. Here are some tree species that can meet these criteria:

- 1. Eastern redbud (Cercis canadensis): Eastern redbuds have a moderate tolerance for wet conditions, can help absorb water, and are reasonably drought-tolerant once established.
- 2. White oak (Quercus alba): White oaks have deep root systems, making them effective at absorbing water. They drought conditions.





You may even find suet with mealworms which is always a delightful and nutritious treat. Bluebirds are partially migratory; some will go to lower climates and nowadays, with mild winters, the majority stay local. The most important things for the ones that remain are food, shelter, and water. Make that available and they will come.





Our primary mission is to give back, and we achieve this by donating 100% of our proceeds to nonprofit organizations that serve veterans and their families. While we have an online store, most of our sales come from our participation in local fairs and events. In addition, we donate pet treats to the weekly food pantry at Veterans Northeast Outreach Center, serving multiple counties in New Hampshire and Massa-

Our team is small but dedicated. I the founder, handle all the baking, while family and friends assist with packaging and labeling for events. Our board is comprised of veterans and animal lovers. Operation Biscuit is about more than just dog and cat treats; it's about building a community of people who share a love for animals, raising awareness for local organizations that support veterans, and ensuring that pets in need have access to high-quality, all-natural treats.

#### Can you share how you came up with the idea to start Operation Biscuit and its transformation into a philanthropic venture?

Operation Biscuit was inspired by my picky dog, Vivienne, who was particular about the treats she would eat. The first time I made homemade biscuits for her, I struggled with the process, but she loved them. This led to more batches and giving them to friends, and eventually, I received requests for more treats. That got me thinking about turning this into a charitable endeavor. I wondered if I could sell the treats and donate the profits. This is how Operation Biscuit came to be.

Coming from a military family and being a staunch supporter of our veterans and troops, I decided to focus on the local at-risk veteran population. I reached out to a local veteran food pantry to see if they'd be interested in including pet treats, and after a survey with their population, I received a positive response. We've since developed a strong relationship with them.

# What is the primary mission and goal of Operation Biscuit in producing dog and cat biscuits, and how do these products support your mission?

The main mission and goal of Operation Biscuit is to give back. I strongly believe that every dog or cat should have access to unprocessed, chemical-free treats. We wanted to ensure that it's not a luxury but the norm. We conducted research on how homeless and low-income individuals were accessing pet food and treats and how they were taking care of their pets. We wanted the guests at the food pantry to be able to bring something home for their pets as well.

In addition to the sale and donation of treats, we've designed a baking program and have brief chats. We've learned so that will involve veterans and local children and teens in supporting our mission through baking and packaging treats. For veterans with PTSD, this program will serve a therapeutic and purposeful activity. It will serve as a creative outlet and a means to relieve stress. It will also promote camaraderie and laughter when friends and family get involved.

For local children and teens, the baking program will serve as an avenue for community service while teaching them how to give back in a non-conventional way.

We're also exploring expansion beyond the sale and donation of treats to specifically cover the costs of veteran's pet care, including generalized care and unexpected medical needs.

#### Tell us about your ingredients, and where do you operate from.

Our ingredients are all-natural and organic, when available, with natural preservatives, such as Vitamins E and C, and rosemary. We have a variety of recipes, including peanut butter, pumpkin, and double cheese, and options for special diets such as grain free, nut free, egg free, and flour free. Before packaging, treats are dry-baked for several hours, removing any moisture to extend shelf-life. As with anything unprocessed, proper storage is required to ensure longevity of the

# Can you describe the impact and benefits of your dog and cat biscuits for pets and the local community you serve?

When someone purchases our treats, they are making a significant difference. Every dollar goes toward our selected nonprofits that serve veterans. We've had

the stories we hear from veterans and their families who share their experiences and talk about their pets. These interactions are filled with laughter and sometimes tears, but most importantly, they offer support. Operation Biscuit is about creative volunteer work and the enthusiasm we receive from the public confirms that we're on the right path. The wagging tails and happy paws that we encounter are truly rewarding.

The highlight of our week is the food pantry drop-off. This is when we get to see our local veterans on a regular basis much about their pets and their deep attachment to them. Many of them consider their pets as family, sometimes as their only family. Our treats have fostered these relationships and serve as a means for communication and connection, which is what this is truly about.

# What are your current distribution channels, and do you have plans to expand the reach of your products to a

Currently, you can purchase Operation Biscuit treats online or at local fairs. We would like to expand our distribution channels by partnering with local businesses that share our philanthropic goals and can offer our treats for purchase.

We also support our local community and veteran/military organizations by donating dog lovers' raffle baskets, which include an assortment of dog treats, toys, and human-related items.

# How can individuals or businesses best support your nonprofit's biscuit-making efforts, whether through donations, volunteering, or other means?

We are currently doing as much as we can with the resources available to us. Operation Biscuit is self-funded and relies on donations when they come in. Donations can be for specific purposes, such as a week of pantry treat donations, a raffle basket for a nonprofit event, purchase of ingredients and supplies, or they can be unspecified and put toward any necessary operating expenses.

We believe in the potential for growth, but that can't happen without donations and volunteers. # If someone gave your organization \$500,000, what would you do with it?

With a generous donation of \$500,000, we would launch the Operation Biscuit Veteran Pet Care Program. This program would ensure that every veteran with a pet has the means to care for them in the way they deserve. It would cover generalized pet care expenses, including food, water, treats, leashes, harnesses, shampoo, brushes, beds, training pads, poop bags, pet ramps for elderly dogs, and more. It would also provide emergency funding for unexpected medical or surgical needs. For many veterans, their pets are not just animals; they are their family and often their only companions.

Now, the focal point of Woodmont Commons, the 603 Brewery, is more than just an adventure; it's a lifestyle that so perfectly fits into the model of work-live-play developments. Some of the key highlights - the restaurant is beautiful with a brand-new post and beam barn feel with floor-to-ceiling garage doors that open up onto the patio. The patio has its own bar, some TVs and a number of gas firepits. During that warm spell in late October, we were delighted to be dining outside. Every Wednesday is "Thank God It's Wednesday" (TGIW), where the chef prepares a new sandwich, for that night only, that gets paired with one of their many beer offerings. What a wonderful midweek treat. During the winter, they offer brunch on Sundays and serve folks in outdoor igloos to maintain that nice patio vibe. The food is top-notch with different twists, such as Korean and BBQ and their beer has put New Hampshire on the map. One item to note – when ordering beer or food, you have to go up to the counter as there isn't waiter/waitress service. Long live NH's area code.

#### It's Your Democracy

Editor's note: Thank you to Lisa Smart, NH State Representative, Belknap District2, Meredith, NH, for sharing her grandfather's thoughts and writings posthumously. "It's Your Democracy" was a letter to the editor written by her grandfather, H.S. Robbins, during the Vietnam War. It is the original so it still has his typos. Robbins, who enlisted in the cavalry in 1915 at the age of 17, mentions dogface soldiers which was a term used for the Cavalry Infantry back during World War 1. It's of note because President Joe Biden called some reporter a "dog-faced pony soldier" and was made fun of for it. It was, in fact, a common term during WW1. It refers to the lowest ranking cavalry soldier, which is where Robbins started. The other piece titled, "Along The Ourca" was from a writing contest he entered for which he won first place. Both pieces are reprinted here verbatim, with no editing. - Fred Young, Editor, The Evergreen

I'm tired of all arm-chair strategists...no matter whether they sit in the U.S. Senate, behind editorial desks of newspapers, radio, and television, or on college and university campuses of today.

None know very much of what they are talking about.

Sure, War is Hell. Every soldier from the lowest dogface to the highest ranking general will tell you that. But the history of man's inhumanity to man has been filled with war ever since the world began. There is not much reason to think it's going to

It's been more than 50 years since I saw war in its rawest sense. I served with the Rainbow 42nd Division in WW1. Our strength was 27,000 men. We suffered more than 60,000 casualties counting replacements necessary after every encounter from the Somme to the Marne.

Not until you've trudged up a war-torn road at night and witnessed whole lines of families, weary, cold and hungry, some pushing all their worldly possessions in a wheelbarrow with small children clinging to the handles, can you know what war is about. They are just trying to escape from a war that demolished their homes and blanked out everything they could think about except survival.

Not until you've seen such lines night after night and day after day can you really

know what war is. And not until you've thanked God each time that this wasn't happening to your loved ones at home can you really know what you are there for. That is what made every weary footstep worth while.

America has never known war at home. Today it is many times more terrible than anyone can even imagine. Every soldier has at one time or another, either consciously or sub-consciously, prayed that this would never happen to his own loved ones.

These are the reasons why those charged with this nation's defense have tried to keep war away from these shores. That's why they constantly gather information from every source, try to gather the right information far enough in advance to prevent war from happening here. That information comes from patrols that penetrate enemy's lines, from captured documents and from news broadcast in foreign lands. Only those in top command have access to all information, arm-chair strategists do not.

And don't forget the enemy does the same thing. They listen to the dissident cries from our politicians, our college campus heroes, and our arm-chair strategists. They base their strategy on what they hear. Recently, some of the information they have obtained couldn't have been written by them in more encouraging words. Many things are being said in this country today that make our enemies very happy.

Most military objectives have a military value based upon those intelligence reports.

They cannot be dispensed publicly. To do so would soon put an end to those sources of information. That's why I say our arm-chair strategists don't usually know what they're talking about.

There should be little doubt that the capture of Hamburger Hill was necessary. It was captured with the loss of good American lives, but it probably saved a good many

Those who cry for freedom of speech, freedom of assembly, and assert their right to build a park on someone else's land should all be thanking their maker they are not the ones called upon to lay their lives, their most precious possession, on the line. That those freedoms are still available in this country today.

There's only one reason why we still have those freedoms. That's because a good many American lives were spent in keeping them....and keeping war away from

America's shores. Perhaps those who seek to espouse radical causes under the guise of those freedoms should conjure a picture of what a war in the future might mean, perhaps a nuclear war. Thousands of lives snuffed out, whole cities devastated, roads blocked, whole families wandering wearily through a worthless land. At the same time a new contingent of arm-chair strategists, blaming those in charge of our national defense for allowing such things to happen.

So, perhaps those of us who aren't called upon to don a uniform should be willing to forgo placing obstacles in the paths of those who are willing to fight and die for their country. Perhaps we should all remember they are fighting for our Democracy.

And remember too, when each and every one of those lives are snuffed out...that particular individual has very little Democracy left, that is unless it is yours.

#### Along the Ourcq

In the tomb of the Unknown Soldier there is a body. To me it can only be that of

It happened in August, 1918, three days after the Rainbow Division had taken the wheat covered slopes of the Ourcq River banks. The first battalion of the 166th Infantry had established headquarters in an old chateau, 200 meters from Sergy.

Runners, observers and men lost from their outfits huddled in groups on the floor. There had been a lull in the fighting that day. The strain, lack of food and no sleep had extracted a toll from these men.

It was just getting dusk when a white faced runner burst through the door. His eyes were panic-stricken and his fear was infectious, "They're coming through!" he

A movement of fright stirred through the room. Each face told of it's owners first thoughts...to escape. But a tall, lanky soldier arose from their midst. "Men," he said, "you know damned well they're not coming through as long as there's anybody left

The exact word that followed are forgotten...they wouldn't describe what he meant now anyway. But he finished with "I'm going up to the line." When he went out they

Sergy changed hands nine times that night, and I passed through the survivors at dawn. Not many were left, and none was as tall as that soldier, who still haunts my

- The newest Market Basket will open in North Conway 10/27/2023, according to the family-owned grocery chain. The grand opening plans for store No. 94 at 80 Barnes Road were revealed on social media Sunday. Construction of the 70,000-square-foot Market Basket started in March 2022, according to the Settlers Green website. The project was stalled for years after Bellevue Properties, the owners of the North Conway Grand Hotel, filed lawsuits against the project, which was approved by the Planning Board in 2018. The Market Basket is part of Settlers Green Streetside Phase II, a \$30 million expansion project.
- State and federal officials are celebrating an announcement by the President Joe Biden administration Monday designating 31 technology hubs across the United States including an area in New Hampshire dubbed "ReGen Valley" that includes Manchester and Nashua — to help spark innovation and job creation. The 31 regional tech hubs were selected from 370 applicants, making the areas eligible for \$500 million in federal funding. The \$500 million comes from a \$10 billion authorization in last year's CHIPS and Science Act to spur investments in new technologies, including biotech, artificial intelligence, and quantum computing.
- As the Salem Planning Board continues discussions on Tuscan Village's proposed 300 additional residential units and Whole Foods to its property, the board advocated for diverse recreational spaces to accompany them.
- The formerly vacant 5-Star Cinema in Derry is morphing into the newest northeastern location of CHI Overhead Doors. The building is undergoing a complete renovation inside, with new loading docks being added to the rear, increasing the size by 13,000 square feet. This redevelopment will bring 20 new, good-paying jobs, new taxable commercial value, and new life to the commerce park.
- Salem, MA-based Carfive Realty, LLC bought the Diesel World Truck Sales property at 87 Plaistow Road in Plaistow for \$2.35 million.
- Work is underway on Phase 2 of the terminal expansion and upgrades at Portsmouth International Airport at Pease. The upcoming improvements to the airport at Pease follow a \$19.5 million Phase 1 terminal expansion project unveiled in early 2021. The Phase 2 work — which is expected to cost more than \$9 million — is focused on what will become the new 5,200-square-foot Pease Arrivals Hall, according to the Pease Development Authority's Board of Directors and project documents.
- More than 111,000 people moved to New Hampshire in 2021 and 2022 compared to 93,000 who left the state during that time, offsetting the state seeing more deaths than births. Nearly 44% of those migrating to New Hampshire came from Massachusetts during those two years compared to 37% in 2018-19, according to research from Kenneth Johnson, senior demographer at the University of New Hampshire's Carsey School of Public Policy.
- Today, outdoor recreation is a tourism driver in a state with an abundance of natural landscape and access to it, contributing roughly 3% of the state's economy each year. New Hampshire is one of the nation's top 10 states for enjoying the outdoors, and it's behind only Colorado in percentage of employers who allow employees to work remotely full- or part-time, according to the state's Business and Economic Affairs Commission.







The Salem Town Forest is located on Shadow Lake Road, across from Shadow Lake. Parking is adjacent to the NH Department of Transportation salt storage shed.




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
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
