The disconnect between average wages and median house prices risks killing the Australian dream. In our part of Melbourne, it is almost impossible without some form of family support. Not everyone has that option. Why does this matter?

People move heaven and earth to come to this country.

They do so because they cherish the idea that education, hard work, and courage will be rewarded.

That is why ours is a community where 70% of residents are first or second generation migrants.

I am one of them.

This federal seat is named after Australia's longest serving Prime Minister, Robert Menzies.

At the peak of World War 2, he made home ownership his top priority stating:

"One of the best instincts in us is that which induces us to have one little piece of earth with a house and a garden which is ours; to which we can withdraw, in which we can be among our friends, into which no stranger may come against our will."

Robert Menzies did not just speak of home ownership, he delivered.

Between 1947 and 1966 the rate of home ownership surged from 53 per cent to 71 per cent.

What can we do today to give young Australians hope again?

The first is to recognise the basic laws of supply and demand.

We need to incentivise the construction of quality medium density housing – the type of home that young people will want to raise a family in.

We must also recognise that migration has to be proportionate.

By that, I mean the number must match our capacity to build homes, infrastructure, schools, hospitals, and preserve green space. I commit to you that I will be a constructive voice on this problem.

That starts with recognising that we have one.

Finally, this is my first paper since Doncaster resident Dr Ash Gordon was killed in a violent home invasion.


He was a young man who had committed to serving others.

Warrandyte's Past Has A Home For the Future

The Old Post Office Museum has reopened!

Major works spanning nine months were needed to bring the building back to life, with the scope of the work including addressing problems with the west wall, a re-stumping and, finally, the replacement of verandah timbers.

The site at 111 Yarra Street was first established back in 1876 when local man Alexander Speers purchased the plot from the Crown to build a store.

Having served the Warrandyte community for nearly 150 years, it was an understandable case of the building requiring a little TLC.

The Post Office re-located to Yarra Street sometime around 1900, where it operated

under the stewardship of a number of well-known Warrandyte families until 1972.

Since then, the local post office has traded out of 210 Yarra Street and, more recently, 100 Melbourne Hill Road.

Between 1972 and 1980 the site at 111 Yarra Street was leased to the Warrandyte Lions Club while its future was decided.

In 1980, a Post Office Preservation Group was formed to raise funds to restore the building.

The Old Post Office has proven to be quite resilient over time, surviving a 1934 flood - the water level is still marked inside the building to this day - and a pair of bushfires in 1939 and 1961.

During 1982 the building was almost

destroyed by a suspicious fire, only to be saved by the quick acting Warrandyte Fire Brigade, who just happened to be training nearby.

Once again the community rallied to restore the building so it could remain on its present

After a great deal of volunteer effort and community input, the restored building re-opened in May of 1987.

It is now the Warrandyte Museum, which operates under the name of the Warrandyte Historical Society.

Telling the story of the Wurundjeri Woiwurrung people of the area, the discovery of gold in 1851, artists and domestic life of years gone by, the Old Post Office Museum is open every weekend between 1:30-4:30pm.

The festival was brimming with dancers, traditional costumes, delightful music and delicious cuisine.




In late-2023, the Club, in concert with the state-wide 'This Girl Can' campaign, staged a "Come 'n' Try Footy" day at Domeney Reserve.


