



Nevada Election Administration: Key Findings 2024

Key Dates for Counting + Certification

- Preprocessing of Mail Ballots Begins: October 21, 2024
- County Canvass and Certification Deadline: November 15, 2024
- State Canvass and Certification Deadline: November 26, 2024

Potential Vulnerabilities

Nevada law includes protections to safeguard its election processes. However, we have identified <u>potential vulnerabilities</u> in the state's processes that are important for the pro-democracy community to be aware of:

- Hand-Counting Ballots: Counties in the state have the discretion to choose to hand-count ballots instead of using tabulation equipment. This can only be done, however, if a hand-count plan is filed at least 90 days before the election and approved by the the Secretary of State.
- Threats to Certification: Though certification is non-discretionary, a number of county officials have attempted to undermine the certification process.
- **Delay Tactics**: Minimal requirements for requesting a recount or contest of an election create the potential for these processes to be misused as delay tactics.
- Audit Standards: Counties that do not use ballot machines with a VVPAT attachment are not subject to uniform standards of post-election auditing. Instead, these counties create their own parameters for their audits.

Key Findings on Election Officials

We conducted vets of Nevada's 91 county commissioners and county clerks. Of those researched, 30 officials (33%) expressed some form of election skepticism.

- Seven officials publicly denied or questioned the 2020 election results
- Six officials opposed election certification
- One official served as a fake elector in 2020
- Six officials pursued extralegal hand counts
- 16 officials expressed skepticism about election fairness
