# The ALLURE of NATURE

Two private island destinations hide sustainable secrets beneath their sparkling surface.

In 1977, Norwegian Cruise Line made a long-term commitment to The Bahamas with the acquisition of Great Stirrup Cay, and thus became first in the industry to offer a private island experience exclusively to its guests. Forty years later, the innovations continued, as the \$400 million Norwegian Edge investment program brought enhancements like expanded beaches, new dining venues, upgraded oceanfront bars, and improved cabanas, as well as a new sister destination—Harvest Caye in Belize—all with an approach that respects the idyllic

nature of these unique environments.

Great Stirrup Cay's 270 resort-style acres amid a forest of coconut palms offer white sand beaches and crystal blue waters with a wide array of vibes and recreation. From buzzy Bertrand to siesta-perfect Fiesta, guests can go on Wave Runner, kayaking, and stand-up paddling adventures, take eco tours of the coral reefs and, explore the underwater sculpture garden, swim with pigs, snorkel with stingrays, or ride the ever-popular zip lines that run from the island's circa-1863 lighthouse for a bird's-eye view of it all. And food and drink are never far away with three dining options—Jumbey Beach Grill, Abaco Taco, and the Tropic Like It's Hot sandwich truck — and four bars where you can even use your on-board beverage packages within reach of every beach. In 2019, Silver Cove added an upgraded experience: an exclusive





enclave with a priority tender from the ship to a private lagoon hosting 38 luxury villas plus a Mandara Spa featuring the most incredible open-air, ocean-view treatment rooms, a new Moët & Chandon Bar, and the Silver Cove Restaurant.

Best of all, a stay at Great Stirrup Cay needn't be a guilty pleasure. In addition to being the first major global cruise company to eliminate single-use plastic water bottles, straws, plates, and cutlery, Norwegian Cruise Line partners with Nova Southeastern University to establish a coral reef restoration initiative that reduces the effects of natural and human stressors on the surrounding coral reefs.

Already in 2016, the company raised the level of its civic ambitions with the

opening of Harvest Caye, a 78-acre resort-style destination in southern Belize. In addition to its seven-acre white sand beach with abundant water sports, the island hosts a wide variety of attractions for guests, including a 15,000-square-foot swimming pool with a swim-up bar, a saltwater lagoon for water sports, 3,000 feet of ziplines, a ropes course, and suspension bridges from the 136-foot tall "Flighthouse."

Part of efforts to preserve wildlife and further education, Harvest Caye is also home to a wildlife sanctuary under the care of Tony Garel, an esteemed Belizean naturalist and wildlife expert. Guests can enjoy the butterfly garden, reptile terrarium, rescued birds of paradise aviaries, a manatee watch, mangrove eco tours, and lagoon nature walk. All exhibits are operated by the Harvest Caye Conservation Foundation to promote wildlife preservation and education. Further afield, rainforest river excursions let you float down a slow-moving, crystal-clear river fed by mountain springs. Take in the spectacular rainforest scenery while listening to the ambient sounds of the jungle as you pass through a picturesque mountain gorge and look for keel-billed toucans, Belize's national bird.

Harvest Caye also offers guests access to the Belize Barrier Reef, the world's second largest. Norwegian Cruise Line team members participate in protecting and monitoring one of the few nesting sites for endangered hawksbill turtles to help baby turtles get a good start on survival each year, and partner with Friends for Conservation and Development to fund an anti-poaching program to protect wild scarlet macaws. Finally, they work







closely with the Clearwater Marine Aquarium Research Institute to protect manatee populations in the most critical areas of Belize.

From Harvest Caye, culture vultures can ride to the archaeological site of Nim Li Punit, a Mayan ceremonial site, or follow a Mayan herbalist and traditional healer on a guided walk along a canopied jungle path used to gather their medicinal plants and herbs. At Mango Creek and Independence, guests can witness local village life, with a detailed history of how the villages got their start in the 1940's as sawmill settlements, and visit a Pioneer Home to see how one of the first settlers of Mango Creek lived and raised a family.

before Happy Hour, in time to watch the lights come on above Broadway and the sun set beyond the Hudson. As your ship glides gently toward the harbor, Lady Liberty waves you on to the Verrazano Bridge, where the engines pick up the pace and the ocean opens to absorb the lilac light as you lift the last of your Prosecco, telling you it's time to dress for dinner.

A first night at sea always tingles with excitement. Explore delights on your palette, whether in ship's company in the towering Manhattan Room, in one of the two more intimate main dining rooms, Taste and Savour, more casually at the Garden Café buffet, or Local Bar & Grill (or even more intimately with room service delivered to you while still in your robe and slippers). When Christopher Columbus set sail

from the Iberian Peninsula, it marked the turning point from the region's last vestiges as a Moorish vassal to an emerging imperial power of its own. For earlier that same year of 1492, Columbus' Spanish patrons, King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella, had ousted Emir Muhammad XII from Granada, completing the Reconquista that brought more than 700 years of Islamic rule on the European continent to a close.

Those seven centuries, however, give this westernmost reach of the Eastern Hemisphere its uniquely cosmopolitan character. From a base of Roman relics and Gothic genes, the Moors' influence rises like the sweet, spiced scent of orange blossoms in fanciful spires and soaring inflections of flamenco and fado, and place names from the Algarve to the birthplace of the Man of La Mancha.

Near Granada, at one end of the Costa del Sol, lies Málaga, your embarkation point for one of Norwegian Cruise Lines' shorts but richest adventures—a journey in its own right or the perfect anchor to start or end a








European tour. A dinnertime departure leaves you all day to explore ashore, even as far as the legendary Alhambra, once-palace of the Emir. High on their victory, Ferdinand and Isabella took up residence, and it was here that they heard Columbus pitch the expedition that would bring him America.

As the ship sails, meet your shipmates in one of the main dining rooms or delight in gourmet discoveries in the specialty restaurants, from steakhouses to French bistros, Italian trattorias, sushi bars, and more. Then settle into a sports bar or cocktail lounge, a seat at the casino, or for a tour of World Beats to hear percussive Irish tap dancing, the soulful cadences of New York City streets, and haunting drums from Africa.

In Spain, you will have learned to stay up late, so wander up on deck as you transit the Strait of Gibraltar, flanked by its eponymous British exclave lighting up the shore to starboard and its Spanish equivalent, controversial Ceuta, glittering on the Moroccan shore to port. On a moonlit night, the shadowy headlands of Africa and Europe tower over you just eight miles apart and plunge 3,000 feet below your keel. As Mediterranean meets Atlantic, look left for Tangier.

Cadiz will spoil you with options. From its gulf, Columbus sailed to circle the globe, and 50 years later, Magellan left to finish what he started. Set off for Seville, an hour inland, where the Alcazar will dazzle with intricate tile-work and extravagant gardens, while the streets bustle past bar tables of tasty tapas. Or stay local to see a city said to be the oldest in Europe, founded by Phoenician traders, dominated by a domed cathedral. Walk the waterfront ramparts, hanging gardens, and cobblestone alleyways that hint at Old Havana.

Last stop: Lisbon. Head for the hills of this pastel-hued city to see sweeping water vistas, and quaint, crooked streets. Portugal's heyday as Spain's great rival during the Age of Exploration ended abruptly in 1755, its capital devastated by an earthquake and tsunami whose effects remain in the whale bone carcass of Carmo Convent and the regimented avenues of downtown Baixa, built by martial law. From here, it's only a short trip to the Algarve's alluring beaches, Sintra's fairy-tale castles, or the Douro River's wine-covered banks-to discover the country that discovered the world.

#### 2. GEORGE TOWN, GRAND CAYMAN

Grand Cayman has become known as one of the top culinary destinations in the Caribbean with an ever-expanding array of top-tier restaurants. Says Grand Cayman-based chef Dylan Benoit, "We are very close to Miami and we get several cargo flights per week so the quality of the ingredients we can tap is off the charts." A favorite midday spot on the island is the Grand Old House, a former plantation that has been transformed into a top-tier eatery overlooking the water. Think colorful farm-to-table and sea-to-table dishes that will surprise and delight, such as conch fritters with a local mango salad and seafood curry rich with lobster, shrimp, mussels, and more. And, oh, the charming seaside-facing terrace! Note that the restaurant's wine list has over 2,400 selections so be sure to partake of a lovely vintage as you lunch in style. grandoldhouse.com



### 3. ORANJESTAD, ARUBA

A 15-minute walk from the cruise terminal will carry you to the West Deck, a charming al fresco eatery built over the beach with stunning waterside vistas. Embrace the "sandy, salty, happy" mantra tacked onto the restaurant's wall and you'll fall under the eatery's easy-breezy, kicked-back vibe. The West Deck is essentially a cool beach bar but with food and service that really elevates the experience. Order a potent cocktail from the "booze" menu (try the strawberry colada!) then sample the island coconut shrimp paired with a tango mango chutney, followed by island fish cakes drizzled with a curried cream. As the balmy trade winds kick up and a steel band plays in the distance, you might just discover your new happy place. thewestdeck.com



## 6. WILLEMSTAD,

**CURAÇÃO** 

Unpretentious, easy, unassuming, and perched smack over the sea, De Visserij Piscadera packs a punch with its ever-changing daily assortment of fresh-caught fish and seafood. Dive into a stunning basket of grilled shrimp peppered with wedges of tangy lime accompanied by a side of fries and a bucket of Dutch beer. A super-friendly staff and knockout views round out a fun, relaxed meal. But be forewarned. As one fellow diner informed us, "Do not leave the restaurant before trying the tuna tartare. De Visserij serves the best we have ever tasted. Anywhere."



#### 5. RED HOOK, ST. THOMAS

Gwenn and Mark Snider, the owners of Lovango Resort + Beach Club sandwiched between St. Thomas and St. John, suggest heading to the bustling American Yacht Harbor in Red Hook for a blissful afternoon on the water. Disembark in Charlotte Amalie, wander a bit, then jump in a cab and head for the eastern shore of the island and the bustling marina that looks onto a dreamy bay and far-off St. John. The harbor's Tap & Still restaurant is straightforward and easy and offers, per their slogan, "Burgers. Booze. Beer." If that's your kind of thing then this is your kind of place. Lunch on a quarter pounder burger loaded up anyway you want and served on wax paper, or try Korean-style chicken wings accompanied by fresh-cut fries. A great, accommodating staff, too. After your meal, explore the marina's shops before zipping back to port. tapstill.com







The martini is having a moment. Over-forties sip them, and millennials fit them in-between trips to Whole Foods. So what's the appeal? "Martinis embody everything elegant about cocktails," says Brooklyn barman Ray Sakover, who crafts an especially inspired variety. "A martini is meant to be savored from the first drop to the last. What I love most is that everyone has their preferred one, which makes it both universal and personal." Here, Sakover pours his five favorites—dynamic, sophisticated, and easy to DIY.

### Bamboo

"The Bamboo is an early 20th-century variation on the 50:50 martini that swaps in sherry for gin. This is a low abv martini that is dry, slightly nutty, and silky smooth."

From dining and beaches to shopping and cocktails, here is an insider's guide to the magical, pastel-hued island of Bermuda. Style guru *Elaine Murray*, a longtime Bermuda resident, welcomes us to her favorite island finds.



### A tropical, pale pink-hued oasis

smack in the Atlantic Ocean, Bermuda celebrates tradition and history with its eyes firmly fixed upon the future. Think Anglo-influenced nods paired with a throw-care-to-the-wind whimsy. Immaculate, pink-sand beaches and spot-on dining. Charming towns brimming with history and postcard-perfect architecture. Stunning vistas, luxurious resorts, and a relaxed elegance. Palms sway, balmy breezes blow, and your workaday cares quickly dissipate. Order a potent rum swizzle

cocktail and fall under the pastelcolored spell.

But, specifically, where to go and what to do in Bermuda? Where to eat? And where to kick back with that tempting rum swizzle? Say hello to Elaine Murray.

Along with her Bermudian husband, Murray is the American-born co-owner of long-running, exquisitely edited Torwood Home boutique in Hamilton. A Bermuda resident for over three decades, Murray offers up her favorites finds on what she calls "this small slice of paradise." As Murray says, "Bermuda is like nowhere else in the world and yet somehow it feels so familiar, like you're coming home despite a three-day ocean crossing. Bermuda is a place of relaxed sophistication offset with a large dollop of a don't-take-yourself-too-seriously approach to life. I tend to laugh more in Bermuda, and isn't that the key to life?"

Here, Elaine Murray's Top Ten List of her number one picks, from eateries and fun shops to yummy cocktails and more.

### 1. START THE DAY LIKE A LOCAL

I begin my day just like every local on the island perusing the Obituaries page of our local newspaper, The Royal Gazette, available at my favorite bookstore, The Bermuda Bookstore on Queen Street. While you can read about the usual political squabbling and business news, perhaps the best way to get to know Bermuda is to learn how we permanently leave our paradise for, ahem, an even greater reward. You'll learn that nearly everyone has a nickname, i.e., Robert "Baggy Socks" Clarence Burgess or Mildred Jane "Cookie" Smith. But, most importantly, you'll see how much we love each other and how in Bermuda, family always includes "special aunts and uncles" (no relation) and that "special friends" will take high honor, too. Oftentimes you'll be encouraged to wear "colors" to the funeral for a joyful send-off. My all-time personal favorite was the passing of veterinarian Dr. Robert Steele and the mandate, "At Bob's request, no black will be worn, except for ladies' underwear!" My kind of guy.



### 2. MEET A HIGHER POWER

After exploring Parliament, take a walk to our beautiful cathedral. The Cathedral of The Most Holy Trinity is located on Church Street (naturally) and for a small admission fee of \$3, one can shake off world events big and small for a moment of quiet reflection. It's a lovely example of Gothic architecture and you might note, there isn't a single building in Hamilton that is higher than the Cathedral. It's proof that even politicians can be intimated.





"Be prepared. If you are invited to a true Bermudian's home for cocktails, don't even think of leaving before midnight. You'll have plenty to eat but after a few rum swizzles you'll probably have to cozy up in your host's guest room for the night. And no worries, that's how true Bermudian hospitality works!"

### 3. LEAVE THE POLITICS AT THE DOOR

Speaking of politicians—and when in Hamilton—take a walk over to Sessions House, a grand Italianate building where Parliament is held. (Tours are daily from 10:30 a.m. except when Parliament is in session.) Just like the United Kingdom, our form of government is the Westminster system. Parliamentarians sit across from one another and say things like "my learned colleague" as they debate the business of the day. Should anyone veer off from proper protocol, the Speaker of the House will waste no time admonishing the offending MP with a bang of his gavel and a call to "Order!" Surrounded by portraits of former Speakers of the House and Her Majesty, the Queen, Bermuda's Head of State, a parliamentary session can be wonderfully intense.

### 4. CHARGE IT, PLEASE

Where do I shop in Bermuda? Everywhere. I believe in supporting our local economy as we have so many wonderful offerings on the island. Here are two favorites: for a combination of fashion, home décor, and inspired one-ofa-kind gifts with a global perspective, I go to Urban Cottage (Front Street). Owner Nicole Golden is simply a marvel and has even been able to help yours truly with something special despite my midsection! Check out the Habitat for Humanity ReStore, which is chock-a-block full of wonderful, gently used treasures. OK, I'll say it. Bermudians are house proud and love to change up their décor frequently. Think of it as an archeological dig without the hard work. You might even find a few pieces of your cherished crystal or china that for a few dollars you can tuck away in your suitcase. One visitor had to go out and buy new luggage so that she could take home eight panels of custom curtains from a very, very prominent Bermudian's home.

### 5. HISTORY LESSON

You must visit the town of St. Georges, the original capital of Bermuda. To get to this magical slice of island life go to the Central Terminal (located right next to City Hall on Church Street) where you can take a bus directly to St. George's every half hour. While you wait, you can take a guick peak at the beautifully designed City Hall by the late architect Will Onions. (Yes, his real name!) Once in St. George's, pay a visit to St. Peter's Church (the oldest continuously used church in the Western Hemisphere) and be sure to walk behind the church to the cemetery. Stories of families and the hardships of early life settling on a tiny volcanic rock are all here if you look closely. Go back in time and walk along Old Maid's Lane, Aunt Peggy, Needle and Thread, and Silk Alley. Peek at the stonewashed cottages and imagine life four hundred years ago. Take a stroll up Duke of Kent Lane and visit the Unfinished Church. When the congregation ran out of money back in 1899 they left the structure unfinished—yet not for a moment does it feel incomplete. Many a bride and groom have said their vows at the Unfinished Church. Perhaps building a life together should start at a place that reminds us that you can build the roof later, just make sure you have each other.



### 6. IN THE PINK

Bermudians are spoiled for choice when it comes to beaches. Heck, many Bermudians live on their own beach! If you want to feel like you're on a private beach with your toes in the pinkest sand on the island, sneak away to Whale Bay Beach in Southampton. Pack a lunch and you'll probably have this wonderful beach nearly all to yourself. We typically grab takeaway from Brew, located on Front Street, for a beach day. Try their refreshing lemonade with raspberries with either a mixed salad or have a panini with prosciutto and mozzarella. We sit on a big blanket with an old umbrella and pinch ourselves for our good fortune.

### 7. LET'S DO LUNCH

I have two favorite spots for a sandwich.

I head to the Chatter Box Cafe on Reid Street (part of the Washington Mall) where I can say hello to everyone, including Minister Wayne Furbert, who is so wonderfully good-natured despite my mouthing-off tendencies. Try the turkey wrap with avocado, cheddar cheese, and bacon. Or I go to Dangelini's Café & Bakery on Front Street by the ferry terminal so I can catch up with more local friends and give the minister a break. My favorite? This girl loves a tuna melt. If I'm feeling like I deserve one, I finish off with a big cookie covered in frosting. Bliss.







### 8. HEART OF STONE

If you're all beached out, find time to bring the wee ones to Crystal Caves in Hamilton Parish (not to be confused with the City of Hamilton). It's magical. Then after they've cooled down from spelunking you can take them around the corner for the promised ice cream at Bailey's Bay Ice Cream Parlour. It's locally crafted and we serve it at our house all the time. Yum.

### 9. SMILE

Bermudians are known for being some of the nicest people anywhere, with the country even being ranked as one of the "world's friendliest islands" in Travel + Leisure World's Best Awards. The magazine quoted Mark Twain's observation of Bermuda as "that happy little paradise," and the place he'd rather stay than go to heaven. With its watercolors and gentle hills and bays, even the architecture and landscape seem to smile. All this welcoming warmth makes the place a breeze to explore and makes it a pleasure to discover its most intimate aspects, feeling like you've made new friends.



### 10. WHATS UP?

My husband and I have several places that we love dearly for dining out but whenever we need to be treated like family, we head straight for Portofino on Bermudiana Road. Owners Simone and his knock-out wife, Karen, have been taking care of us and our dog, Charlie (a Cavapoo!), for years. Want the local rock fish grilled or pan-fried? Done. You need a couple of pizzas for a large group? Done. For families with children, it's a godsend. Trust me.

When we dine "smart casual" (Bermuda speak for a bit more cleaned up, i.e., ladies can wear a simple dress or blouse and trousers, and gents are not required to wear a jacket and tie), we love to dine at Ascots Restaurant, housed within our favorite small boutique hotel, Royal Palms Bermuda on Rosemont Avenue. Before dinner, have a drink at Ascots' intimate bar or, as we like to say, our living room. Sitting on one of their comfy sofas or chairs or right at the bar, our standard go-to toast with a delicious Dark 'n Stormy is to "Raise your glass and lower your standards!" Works every time. If you want that "Where do locals go in Hamilton?" experience, this is one of the best. Begin with their local codfish cakes and be sure to try any local fish specials on offer such as the wahoo or rock fish. I'm always keen on their sirloin steak with a kicky peppercorn cream sauce. So good! The Royal Palms also has one of the prettiest gardens around, so be sure to sit a spell and admire the flora before or after dinner.

## LIVING Legend

With its iconic white and blue architecture spilling down vertiginous cliffs to the sea, the fabled Greek islands are the stuff of mythology, literally. Fall under the spell of Mykonos and Santorini, the stars of the postcard-perfect Cyclades chain, and embrace the romance.

Close your eyes and dream of

paradise. That vision might entail blazingly white architecture topped with azure domes that flanks volcaniccrafted cliffs. Shield your eyes from the bright sun and take in the mirage of windmills, which stand tall like manyarmed sentries. Colors are saturated and clear. Hyper-pink bougainvillea creeps hither and yon. Waters are sapphire, turquoise, and cerulean and cascade onto stunning beaches. Surfers ply wind-lapped waters, fishing boats bob in the harbor, and church bells peel in the distance. An infinityedged swimming pool beckons in the distance, and, yes, that might be a flock of goats high atop a hill.

You find yourself in a charming taverna that opens onto an oliveshaded terrace and you blink twice.

A glass of retsina wine magically appears, and you savor the exceptional, pine-scented flavor. And, yes, you must

try the golden calamari that whisks by and perfumes the air.

Greek gods once frolicked upon these legendary shores.

And now it's your turn. Welcome to the Cyclades.

### HELLO, MYKONOS!

The ship docks in Tourlos, which sits about a 30-minute walk from the island's bustling town, Chora, but take the cruise shuttle unless you don't mind the lack of sidewalks.

As you drive along the coast to the old town, take in the dramatic rocky landscape peppered with white-washed, cube-like houses. But don't let the far-flung, moon-like surroundings fool you, Mykonos is not an island that has yet to be discovered. The who's-who have been flocking to this once-rural escape since the 1960s (think Ari Onassis and Jackie O.), and today Mykonos is the most crowded

and popular island within the Cycladic archipelago. And that's the magical, incongruous duality. You can feast on the simplest of Greek delicacies and lose yourself in a narrow alley with stars twinkling overhead. Or you can sup on salmon karashi su miso from top toque Nobu Matsuhisa before dancing until dawn to the mashups of a top-flight DJ.

Chora, or Mykonos Town, wraps the harbor and boasts innumerable cafes and restaurants that look out onto pure blue bliss. Wander the charming byways filled with Candyland-plucked houses, shops, galleries, and restaurants. There are museums catering to folk art and archeology and atmospheric, time-stopped churches. Take photos in the Little Venice neighborhood with its charming buildings and bougainvillea-draped balconies that spill onto the Aegean. And don't miss the ring of windmills that stands tall above the city and that




once ground wheat and barley courtesy of the seasonal northern "meltemi" winds.


Order a coffee and traditional pastry on a terrace by the main harbor and watch the hustle and bustle as island life unfolds. Afterward, head for one of the many renowned beaches, each with its own unique vibe and sensibility. If you seek a lively and action-packed time, catch the bus to famed Paradise, Super Paradise, or Paraga. Families might opt for Ornos or Platys Gialos, and those who want something more unique might try Panormos and Agios Ioannis. Windsurfers should head to Kalafatis Beach, about 25 minutes from Mykonos Town. And don't overlook super-chic Psarou Beach, home to the fantastic Nammos Mykonos beach club, the perfect spot to hobnob with the jet set (think anchored yachts aplenty). But even mere mortals can kick back for an exceptional lunch and enjoy the freshest of seafood before taking a dip in the jewel-like sea.

A beachgoer at Nammos strikes up a conversation as towels are shaken out and flip-flops kicked off.

"I come to Mykonos every year," says the tall, tan New Yorker. "I love the mix of rustic and high-end, the historic and cutting edge, the endless sun, and the world of possibilities. There's something for everyone to do on this magical island."









Cruise ships disembark by tender within Santorini's stunning caldera, so expect plenty of action when you arrive at the bottom of the hill, aka Gialos, that leads up to the bustling town of Fira. Here, you can take the cable car up the hill, walk the 586 steps, or ride a donkey. Yes, truly, ride a donkey—it's a bit wonky but, ultimately, wonderful.

When you hit town, chances are you will be ready for a spot of fortification, so settle in at one of the many cafés for a pastry and coffee. Get the camera ready for stunning whitewashed buildings with whimsical domes, stonepaved streets, and views of the sea and cliffs that will leave you reeling, but in a good way. Shopping options abound so stock up on gifts for the folks back home. And be sure to get off the town's main drag to avoid the crowds: You will discover myriad surprise-anddelight moments such as tucked-away chapels, arches that frame the sea like a painting, and plenty of sunbathing





cats. After you've explored, hail a cab and head to the charming towns of lively Oia or more laidback Imerovigli for architecture and vistas that are, incredibly, even more wow-inducing.

Oia, for one, perches high, high above the sparkling caldera and houses stunning homes, shops, restaurants, and hotels carved from the volcanic rock. There's nothing claustrophobic here, just improbably cozy and inviting caves as you have never seen before.

Over Aperol Spritz cocktails at the always-busy Hassapiko bar in Oia, a conversation strikes up.

"I adore Santorini," says a well-heeled fellow American. "But you have to find those off-the-beaten-path moments. And be sure to come back and spend a few nights on the island so you can really tap the myriad experiences that an afternoon alone won't allow. Staying in a cave hotel—and waking up to that view!—is a once-in-a-lifetime experience. And, of course, the sunsets in Oia are like nothing you have ever seen."

As the day progresses, you might choose to relax by the sea, so make a reservation at one of the island's numerous beach clubs that are perfect for lounging in style. And note that Santorini's beach clubs are less frenetic than those found on the sister island of Mykonos, so you can really chill out without that thumpity-thump beat. Think high-style Nikki Beach that sits on the black beach at Monolithos, Theros Wave Bar (the massages here are amazing!), and the bohemianstyled, eclectic Yalos. Settle in for a spirited lunch before splashing about.

You'll head back to the ship energized and, most assuredly, sun-kissed and smiling.




assau, the capital of the Bahamas and the island chain's largest city, retains vestiges of its British colonial past paired with cutting-edge resorts that spill onto crystalline beaches and turquoise-hued waters. Think glorious scuba diving. Hollywood-worthy sunsets. Colorful Bahamian cuisine packed with seaplucked flavors. Loads of activities for the kids. Markets aplenty, overflowing with just-caught fish and handwoven straw crafts. Forts. Fishing. Distilleries. Pirates. And so much more.

"We have been coming to Nassau for years and love how easy it is," says a well-heeled traveler whom we meet over drinks at the Baha Mar. "There are great hotels that have sprung up in recent years such as the Ocean Club, and downtown has some really relaxed, fun eateries. The Island House, a new boutique-styled hotel on the western side of the island, is one of my favorite resorts anywhere. And you

can always island hop!"

Downtown Nassau is the perfect spot to wander and just get lost. Candy-colored British colonial architecture pairs perfectly with buzzing markets where you can pick up loads of treasures for the folks back home. Settle into a charming café like Bon Vivants or Café Matisse and relax. Or take an easy ride over the bridge to Paradise Island and live large at Atlantis or tuck into a chic cocktail at the Ocean Club. You might also wish to visit one of the new super resorts such as Baha Mar with its trio of farflung hotels and eateries overseen by the likes of Marcus Samuelsson. Better yet, hail a cab and enjoy a conch salad at relaxed, easy Dino's. Says island resident and interior design force Amanda Lindroth, "Dino's is a dream—an island-y, roadside shack with enormous charm and authenticity. It is only 25 minutes west along the beautiful West Bay Street. Perfection.







### My Nassau

### 1. GOLF

There are some incredible courses to play on the islands including Atlantis' Ocean Club Golf Course on Paradise Island or the Royal Blue course at Baha Mar.

### 2. THE FISH FRY

For local cuisine, visit Arawak Cay, colloquially called "The Fry" or "The Fish Fry," where you can indulge in local dishes such as conch salad, cracked conch, peas n' rice, Bahamian mac n' cheese, guava duff...and the list goes on! Don't forget to "hydrate" (wink!) with local cocktails such as the Bahamamama, Yellowbird, Goombay Smash, or Sky Juice!

### 3. GRAYCLIFF

This historic property in downtown Nassau is not only a five-star restaurant but offers cigar rolling classes, their very own chocolatier, wine tastings, and tours on-property.

### 4. TRU BAHAMIAN FOOD TOURS

This locally owned and operated company offers a variety of food and culture tours that center around downtown Nassau. Tru's walking tours will whisk you through downtown's historic sights while you stop for tasty treats enroute.

### 5. DOWNTOWN NASSAU

Nassau's downtown is full of wonderful shops, atmospheric restaurants, government offices and buildings, and, of course, the famous Nassau Straw Market.





ften referred to as the most beautiful island in Mexico, laidback Cozumel is the antithesis of the raucous scene at anything-goes Cancun up the mainland coast. Think miles of pristine beaches and vast swathes of wild parklands that allow you to really turn off and get away from it all. And while there are the usual suspects of sprawling chain hotels, the island also offers a constellation of charming boutique hotels. Wonderful beach clubs, too Terrific restaurants round out the Cozumel mix. And did we mention the jewel-like, sparkling waters that surround this unspoiled gem...

Cozumel's bustling downtown, San Miguel de Cozumel, sits on the island's northwest coast and offers ferry services that ply the waters between the isle and the mainland. Wander San Miguel's colorful streets: It's a great walking town with parks, galleries, bakeries, and more, and there are spot-on sunset views to be had from the waterfront. Stop for Mexican handicrafts at Los Cinco Soles and enjoy a spirited lunch of street tacos paired with a potent margarita. And be sure to get out of town, too! Explore the island's unspoiled nature with a Jeep tour. head to a beach club, or try your hand at snorkeling. If you're a diver, book an excursion to visit one of the island's famous dive sites. There's also sportfishing, Jet Ski rental, and numerous other outdoor activities. If you have an evening, too, plan to dine at Buccanos with its magical setting or sample Mayan cooking at Ix-Kool (try the ceviche with jicama and a habanero kick or the citrus-kissed cochinita pibil pork).

### My Cozumel

Global Editor at Large Jason Oliver Nixon first discovered Cozumel as a teenager and returns often decades later. Here, his five favorite finds on this magical, unexpected island. "I love that you can really turn off in pristine nature in Cozumel or kick back with cocktails at a groovy beach club or dine out in style without any pretension. Cozumel is truly a special place that often gets overlooked."

### 1. DIVING

### Cozumel is famed for its diving

thanks to the island's extensive reef system. There are sites for all abilities:
Beginners might try Columbia
Shallows while more experienced divers gravitate to Santa Rosa Wall or Colombia Wall with its cave, tunnel, and cavern systems. Watch for the gorgeously colored Blue Tang fish as you explore!



### 2. REMOTE BEACHES

The west side of Cozumel houses the majority of the hotels and beach clubs, but the eastern side of the island offers wonderfully remote beaches peppered with local dive bars such as Rasta's (try the coconut shrimp). Hire a taxi to carry you east then find the perfect spot, plunk down, and turn off.

### 3. BEACH CLUBS

Book a day at a beach club. Cozumel has numerous sea-facing clubs to choose from that offer everything from all-inclusive packages to spa services, swimming pools, restaurants, and endless water activities. Here are four of our favorites: Cabana Beach Cozumel (we love the private cabanas with healthy WiFi for our Instagram posts), Paradise Beach Cozumel (oh, the numerous toys such as the inflatable water slides and trampolines), Buccanos Beach Club (close proximity to town and fabulously crystal-clear waters), and Mr. Sanchos Beach Club (perfect for the lively, party hearty amongst you).


### 4. LOS CINCO SOLES

Stock up on colorful treasures for the folks back home at atmospheric, theatrical shop Los Cinco Soles. You'll find everything from Mexican silver to handicrafts—from Talavera pottery to folk art sculptures, black clay pottery, and rainbow-hued textiles. Their "Mexicatessen" offers traditional Mexican cooking essentials—from chocolates to coffee and cooking sauces. After shopping, wind down with a potent margarita at their Pancho's Backyard restaurant in the store's verdant patio.

### 5. PUNTA SUR ECOLOGICAL PARK

Reserve a private Jeep tour of the sprawling Punta Sur ecological park situated at the southern tip of the island. There's a lighthouse, stunning beaches, mangrove swamps, and plenty of wildlife—from crocodiles to an innumerable species of birds.





erfect beaches. Turquoise**hued waters**. Stingrays and starfish. Turtles. Caves. Stunning resorts. A bustling, charming downtown in the form of George Town. An appreciation for the beauty of nature. A wonderfully friendly populace. Dive sites aplenty (think bronze mermaids and a submerged submarine rescue ship!). A bioluminescent bay. Myriad cultures coming together swimmingly. A stunning culinary scene. Terrific shopping in George Town. Mix it all together, shake, shake, and pour. Welcome to Grand Cayman, a small slice of heaven situated south of Cuba and west of Jamaica.

George Town is the main hub and is perfect for exploring and some knockout shopping. Grand Cayman is a British Overseas Territory so traveling around the island by taxi might be the best option for many reasons (they drive on the left and there are roundabouts aplenty).

Once you reach your on-island

destination, do nothing for a spell. Truly. Sit under a palm tree beside the diamond-like waters and turn off. Your mental health will thank you. But if you need some action, there's plenty to be had. Grab your sunscreen and head to Rum Point beach, a 50-minute drive from the cruise terminal. It can get busy, but it's a great place to depart for a tour of the Stingray City sandbar. Plus, the beach has a restaurant, changing rooms, and showers, so it's a great place to take the kids. Hold a turtle at the Cayman Turtle Centre or take in the abundant starfish crawling about at Starfish Point. Seven Mile Beach is a stunner, but there are plenty of less-developed beaches—such as Smith Cove with its rock formations and stellar sunset vistas—on the island to enjoy. The diving is excellent with exotic-sounding names such as Devil's Grotto and Eden Rock. And don't miss the blow holes on the island's East End that shoot water some 20 feet up into the air.

### 1. BARS

I have two favorite bars on the island.

One is Coccoloba Bar & Grill at the Kimpton Seafire Resort + Spa where you can pair a great cocktail with spectacular sunset views on Seven Mile Beach. Try the guacamole. The other is Next Door which is a new speakeasy-type bar at Camana Bay.

### 2. CULINARY EXPERIENCE

There are so many great restaurants on the island—we are very spoiled.

A few of my favorites include Agua Restaurant & Lounge, Ragazzi Ristorante Pizzeria, Calypso Grill, and sushi restaurant Taikun at The Ritz-Carlton. All are so good!

### 3. LOCAL EATERY

My favorite local eatery is Mango Tree
Bar & Grill. The food is fantastic. I also
love the jerk pork at Peppers Bar &
Grill. Sometimes the simplest
foods are the best.

### 4. BÀCARO

Sure, I am biased but Bàcaro is the best restaurant on the island. Enjoy a wonderful lunch on our patio with a glass of wine and watch the boats leave the yacht club as you experience culinary nirvana. We are the only tapasstyle restaurant on Island. Standouts include the mad deviled eggs, the beetroot potato gnocchi with green peas, and the lavish mixed grill.

### 5. PEDRO ST. JAMES

This is the oldest stone building on the island and a national historic site where you can learn about the wonderfully rich history of the Cayman Islands.


### 4. FAVORITE ART CULTURE DESTINATION

plit in half, the magical island of St. Martin/Sint Maarten packs a two-fold punch in a 37-square-mile footprint thanks to its lively Dutch/French dual personalities. The Dutch side bustles with activity and features stellar shopping, hopping nightlife, stunning seaside vistas, and the island's sleek international airport. The French side is a tad more relaxed with an emphasis on culinary masterstrokes, sophisticated shops, stylish beaches, and beach-facing, chic bars. On either side of the island, dress up or down and make a gorgeous day of it. And, no, you don't need to show a passport to hop from the Dutch side to the French and vice-versa—it's the oldest officially open border in the world.

Colorful Philipsburg is the beating heart of the island's Dutch side and offers a wonderful selection of colorful shops that feature everything from far-flung jewels to the perfect island-plucked gifts for the folks back home. Palm-lined Front Street is the main drag in Philipsburg and follows the curve of the bay. Walk from one end to the other and take in historic sites such as the historic

Pasanggrahan boutique hotel, which once served as the royal guest house for Dutch royalty, or pop into a casino to try your hand with lady luck. Stop in at one of the local eateries to sample Johnny cakes, conch, or the national dish of callaloo, a hearty soup packed with greens, pork, onions, and more. Head to Kalatua Beach Restaurant on Mullet Bay for a terrific lunch on one of the most beautiful beaches on the SXM. From fresh burrata cheese with blackened tomatoes to thyme-smoked mahi mahi with a green pea mousseline, you can't go wrong.

### 3. BOAT EXCURSION

Take a boat excursion into the glorious waters surrounding St. Martin. You might even decide to visit neighboring Anguilla's Prickly Pear Cay for a spirited lunch. On every excursion we discover new hidden and magical spots. Layerin music and cocktails, and you'll have a truly magical day.

### 4. FAVORITE DINNER SPOTS

We are biased, but our La Cigale (The Cicada) sits in an oasis of palm trees facing the bay and offers terrific sunset views. The cooking is exceptional—try the sea bass fillet paired with a leek fondue. We also love Mario Bistrot at the Cliff for the stunning location paired with terrific pastas such as the gnocchi with oysters and truffles. And Alina Restaurant in Maho offers superlative sushi with spot-on service.

### 5. FAVORITE NIGHTLIFE

**Besides Mimosa Skylounge**, Maho has numerous other options for night owls—whether the casino or dancing the night away at long-running nightclub Mykonos. Everyone will find something here to suit their taste and vibe.



Picture vertiginous peaks such as Mount Liamuiga, a volcano that is carpeted in lush rainforest vegetation and topped by a crater lake. From the volcano's summit, take in the magnificent vistas towards surrounding islands including Saba, Saint Barts, St. Martin, Nevis, and Antigua. And, yes, that was the sound of vervet monkeys chattering away in the trees above you. Far below beside the crystalline sea, St. Kitts offers crowd-free beaches, incredible diving thanks to spectacular coral reefs, golf, relaxed dining (think conch fritters and salt fish and dumplings on the local-eats list), and health and wellness options aplenty. Layer-in a warmth and generosity courtesy of the smiling locals, and you will truly feel welcomed. Explore the former sugar plantations such as the Wingfield Estate that were once the world's largest cultivators of sugarcane, sip a rum-loaded Pirate's Punch cocktail or three at the Shipwreck Bar & Grill, or kick back on

the beach at the Park Hyatt and take in a postcard-perfect sunset. And do mind the mongoose family that just scampered across the road. P.S. The average annual temperature ranges from 77-82 degrees Fahrenheit. Now that's bliss.

Historic Basseterre is the capital of St. Kitts/Nevis and dates back to the 17th century when it was founded as a French colony. Walk this pictureperfect city of 14,000 residents and stop to sample the fresh fruit or purchase the wonderful crafts being sold by local vendors. There are numerous restaurants and shops looking onto Independence Square, the center of town, that make for the perfect place to sip a late-morning coffee at the Gallery Cafe. Book a walking tour of the city and learn about the impressive history that has carried Basseterre through the centuries. And be sure to get out of town: You can get anywhere in the island in 45 minutes or less-whether the Brimstone Hill Fortress or The Strip (aka, an atmospheric collection of beach bars and clubs)—and the best way to travel is by taxi, which are plentiful.

A visit to the St. Kitts Eco Park offers the perfect opportunity to purchase fruits, vegetables, and plants. Walk the grounds and through the fruit trees area where fruit-picking just might be allowed.

### 4. THE KITTITIAN HILL RESORT

The Kittitian Hill Resort Development

is a great escape for some quiet time as you're nestled within the lush rainforests of Mt. Liamuiga. It's the perfect place for breakfast or lunch. Or book a day pass to use the pool.


### 5. CARIBELLE BATIK!

**Dutch outpost sparkling** in the southern Caribbean off Venezuela, Aruba beckons for endless fun under the sun, but it offers so much more than languid days spent upon the shore. Thank those pesky trade winds for the siren song that lures windsurfers and kiteboarders from around the globe to the wind-whipped waters. Keep your eyes open for leatherback turtles that are among the species that lay their eggs on the island's coast. Try a typical Aruban dish such as curry goat, keri keri, and pan bati with their African, French, Dutch, and other

far-flung influences.

Port of call in Aruba is Oranjestad, and the capital city delivers plenty of action in the form of restaurants, shopping, and cultural attractions. But be sure to get out and explore the rest of this magical isle. Taxis are widely available and are a great way to get around the 20-miles-long and six-miles-wide (at its widest point) island. Plan to live in a swimsuit and comfortable top paired with flipflops and water shoes (the island is largely igneous, so you don't want to tear up your feet on the rocks). While the days are hot and arid, the temperature cools off at night so pack a light jacket or sweater. The island's official currency is the Aruban florin but American dollars are accepted everywhere. It's a great island for families as there are myriad activities for the kids—besides the stellar beaches-including the fact that it is rated as one of the safest islands in the Caribbean. Hello, butterfly farms, donkey sanctuaries, caves, natural pools, and national parks that cover almost 20% of the island. So dive wholeheartedly into this island that claims to be one of the happiest places in the world.

### 1. EAGLE BEACH

### Eagle Beach is a beach neighborhood

### 3. PALM BEACH

Palm Beach is a resort area situated on the northern coast of the island that is known for its calm waters and long sandy strip lined with bars and restaurants. Nearby, you will find the lush Bubali Bird Sanctuary, which is home to the island's beautiful herons and other migratory birds.

### 4. THE BUTTERFLY FARM

The beautiful Butterfly Farm nature sanctuary is home to hundreds of butterflies in a rainforest-like enclosure. The Butterfly Farm offers guided tours, providing guests with insight on the evolutionary cycle of these remarkable creatures. Great for kids.

### 5. THE GUADIRIKIRI CAVE

### 3. SUNSET LOCATION


**My favorite location for a sunset** is the Rincón or in the grounds of the El Morro fort in Old San Juan.
