Nigeria is one of the most studied countries in Africa. The dense trove of sources on the country continued to motivate scholars to conduct research across multiple disciplinary confines. This roundtable seeks to reflect on the changing landscape of research in Nigeria from scholars at different stages of their career. African Studies Review - Writing Workshop

“How to write about films: Interdisciplinary approaches” (Open only to the preselected participants)

Writing about films has become a common practice in several disciplinary fields. Beyond film and media studies, films can be discussed as sociological, historical or anthropological sources, they can be analysed as forms of literary texts, and can be reflected upon from a political economy perspective, as artefacts that reveal specific material, economic and political conditions, production processes and working environments. They are also often used as teaching tools to trigger debates about specific topic with students and as research tools to engage in more creative and interactive forms of ethnography. This writing workshop, organized by the [Film Review editorial team](#) of the [African Studies review](#) (ASR), the official journal of the [African Studies Association of America](#) (ASA) as part of the [2025 Lagos Studies Association Annual Conference \(LSA 2025\)](#), intends to encourage an interdisciplinary debate on how we write about films in our respective disciplines and for what purposes. Each year, the LSA Conference features a roundtable on the nitty-gritty of academic book publishing. At LSA 2021 and 2022, series and acquisition editors from Ohio University Press, University of Michigan Press, James Currey, Duke University Press, and Cambridge University Press participated in our book development workshop. This preconference seminar will complement our regular sessions on “From Dissertation to Book Manuscript” and “Journal Article Publishing.”

At LSA 2023, acquisition editors from Indiana University Press, University of Illinois Press, and University of California Press joined us. This year, we welcome series and acquisition editors from Ohio University Press, University of Wisconsin Press, Brill, and Anthem Press. They will answer the big question: What do editors look for in a book manuscript?

This roundtable serves as a bridge between the book writing process, which we regularly teach at the preconference and the final product that we celebrate at the book panels. The roundtable promises to attract early career scholars who are revising their doctoral dissertations into publishable book manuscripts, among other categories of academics looking for credible outlets for their rigorously researched works.
