Dr. David Begnoche - Host

Dr. David Begnoche is Associate Professor of Trombone in the TCU School of Music and maintains an active performing calendar with groups throughout the U.S. and abroad. His extensive professional performing experience includes titled positions with the Joffrey Ballet Orchestra (Chicago), Sarasota Opera (FL), Albany Symphony (NY), Spoleto Festival Orchestra (Italy), and Charleston Symphony Orchestra (SC). He has performed with numerous orchestras throughout the country including the Boston Symphony Orchestra and has recorded with the Boston Pops under John Williams.

A recipient of the Priddy Fellowship in Arts Leadership, Dr. Begnoche is a frequent and eager performer of new music and a strong advocate for American music in particular. He can be heard on première recordings of works by John Harbison, Gian Carlo Menotti, Steven Stucky, and Charles Wuorinen, to name a few. Contemporary music ensembles Mr. Begnoche has performed

with include Essential Music (NY), Fulcrum Point (Chicago), and, as soloist, with the Tanglewood Festival of Contemporary Music. Reflective of his advocacy of new music, Dr. Begnoche has been active in the commissioning of solo and chamber works. His work with Pulitzer Prize winner John La Montaine resulted in the final version of the composer's Trombone Quartet (2007).

Dr. Begnoche serves at Second Vice President of the International Trombone Association and has published articles in the International Trombone Association Journal, the Brass Herald, and the American Composers Forum.

Dr. Begnoche holds degrees from University of North Texas (DMA), the Manhattan School of Music (MM) and the New England Conservatory of Music (BM). His principal teachers include renowned artists Douglas Yeo (Boston Symphony Orchestra), John Swallow (New York Brass Quintet), Steven Norrell (Metropolitan Opera Orchestra), and Michael Mulcahy (Chicago Symphony Orchestra).



Dr. Karen Marston, Festival Director

Karen Marston joined the faculty at Mt San Antonio College in 2016, where she currently teaches chamber music and applied low brass and serves as Chair of the Music Department and Director of the Wind Ensemble. Prior to this position, she spent 15 years on the full-time faculty at San Jacinto College in Pasadena, TX. Karen holds degrees in trombone performance from the University of North Texas and Rice University, and both a masters and doctorate in music education from Columbia University. Her teachers include Jan Kagarice, Dr. Vern Kagarice, Dr. Royce Lumpkin, and David Waters.

Passionate about promoting gender diversity in music, Dr. Marston co-founded She Can Play Brass, a Los Angeles-based non-profit dedicated to supporting professional women who play brass instruments. Since its inception in 2023, She Can Play Brass has made significant strides in fundraising and has organized concerts, networking events, and educational initiatives to celebrate

and empower female brass musicians. Her commitment to championing women in music extends to her role as Director of the International Trombone Festival, where she established the International Women's Trombone Choir (IWTC), a group of over 30 professional female trombonists, which had its inaugural concert at the Georgia ITF in 2021. Dr. Marston has also been highly active as a chamber musician, and is the founder of many successful ensembles, including Omni Brass, the Resonance Brass Choir, the TexiCali Trio, and the Empress Trombone Quartet, many of which have also championed women in music.

Dr. Marston is active as an arranger, and her scores have been performed globally, with notable premieres including her adaptation of Saint-Saëns' Organ Symphony by the brass section of the New York Philharmonic in 2023, and a massive arrangement of the finale from Amy Beach's Gaelic Symphony for Monarch Brass and the IWTC, to be performed at the 2024 ITF in Ft. Worth, TX.

Recognized for her contributions to both performance and pedagogy, Dr. Marston has been the recipient of grants from esteemed organizations such as the San Jacinto Foundation, Brown Foundation, American Chamber Music Players of New York, and Houston Arts Alliance. Karen is an artist for Rath Trombones, England.

Dr. Justin Cook - Exhibits Manager, Festival Manager

Justin Cook is the Associate Professor of Trombone at the University of Central Arkansas where he teaches studio trombone, trombone choir, brass ensembles, low brass methods, and directs the Jazz Repertory Ensemble. In addition to his college teaching, Justin has been on staff at the Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp in Twin Lake, Michigan, Phantom Regiment Drum and Bugle Corps in Rockford, Illinois, and is currently on faculty for the Southeast Trombone Symposium and is the Festival Manager for the International Trombone Festival. In the summer of 2022 Dr. Cook was the host of the International Trombone Festival at the University of Central Arkansas.

Recently, Justin has been featured as a soloist with the Little Rock Winds, the University of Central Arkansas Symphonic Band and Wind Ensemble and, most recently, performed Bert Appermont's Colors with the Natural State Brass Band at the 2022 International Trombone Festival. At the 2020 CBDNA Regional at the University of Oklahoma, he premiered the Wind Band version of Anthony Plog's Double Concerto for Trumpet and Trombone with the UCA Wind ensemble. His first solo recording was released in 2018 and is entitled, "Connections." As a freelancer, Dr. Cook has performed with the Symphony of Northwest Arkansas, the Tulsa Symphony, Musical Productions at the Irving Arts Center, Dallas Summer Musicals, and The Arkansas Repertory Theatre. He has performed on the national tours of Mary Poppins, The Book of Mormon, and Wicked.

Equally at home as an educator and performer, the UCA trombone studio has seen tremendous success since Dr. Cook's arrival. The studio has tripled in size and now features two trombone choirs: The BearBones Trombone Choir and the Natural Slides Trombone Ensemble. The trombone choirs have performed at the 2018, 2021, and 2022 International Trombone Festivals and were featured performers at the 2018 Midwest Clinic in Chicago, IL. Dr. Cook's students have been finalists and winners of the American Trombone Workshop Solo Competitions, the Big 12 Solo Competitions, and the International Women's Brass Conference Solo competitions. They have graduated and been accepted to some of the world's most prestigious universities and conservatories.

Justin Cook is a S.E. Shires performing artist and Greg Black performing artist and performs exclusively on Shires trombones and Greg Black Mouthpieces.



Dr. Christopher Van Hof, Assistant Manager

Chris Van Hof is the Associate Professor of Trombone at Ball State University. He is also the Assistant Manager of the International Trombone Festival.

As a freelance performer, Chris is fluent in a variety of musical vernaculars. He is a regular substitute/ extra trombonist with the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra, performing as guest principal, assistant principal, and second trombone. He is also the Principal Trombone with the Carmel (IN) Symphony and a regular performer with The Indianapolis Chamber Orchestra. As a professor, the studio at Ball State University has grown to over two dozen in size under Chris' tenure, with graduates earning jobs as music educators across Indiana, sound engineers and live sound technicians, and pursuing graduate study at schools including the University of Michigan, the University of Minnesota, and Western Michigan University. The Cardinal Trombone Choir has performed at the 2018, 2019, and 2022 International Trombone Festivals under his leadership, as well as many regional performances throughout Indiana.

Chris studied at Western Michigan University, the Eastman School of Music, and at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Chris is a Performing Artist for S. E. Shires Custom Brass Instruments. He is a native of Grand Rapids, Michigan, and now lives in Indianapolis with his wife Andrea and their two boys Dexter and Fritz.

Dr. Deb Scott, Director, Composers Workshop

Dr. Deb Scott is the Professor of Trombone at Stephen F. Austin State University in Nacogdoches, Texas. She is a performing artist for Rath Trombones (England) and is active world-wide as a soloist and clinician in both classical and jazz styles. She is also a member of Monarch Brass. Scott's solo CD, *Playing Favorites*, was released in 2017 by Navona Records.

Scott joined the administration of the International Trombone Festival in 2019 as the Director of the Composers Workshop. She helps to promote new music for the trombone and coordinates all aspects of the workshop including performances of the music selected to be featured at the ITF .

SFA is a very large school of music and a great place to study trombone at the undergraduate or graduate level; the trombone choir has been featured twice at the International Trombone Festival (2010 and 2022) as well as other conferences. Dr. Scott graduated with top honors from Texas Tech University and received the top award for her master's degree, studying with Buddy Baker, at the University of Northern Colorado. She was the first woman to complete a doctorate in trombone performance from the University of North Texas; her primary teacher was Vern Kagarice.



Carol Jarvis, Digital Director

Carol Jarvis is one of the most in-demand session musicians in the UK. A multi-award-winning trombonist, keyboard player, arranger, orchestrator and voiceover artist, Carol has toured and recorded extensively with starts such as Sting, Queen, Seal, Rod Stewart, Amy Winehouse, Bon Jovi, Ellie Goulding and appeared on many renowned television programs with stars such as MUSE, Harry Connick Jr, Michael Bublé, Taylor Swift and so many more. Carol can also be found working with internationally renowned ensembles and some of the world's top orchestras such as playing guest principal trombone with the London Symphony Orchestra on many soundtracks. Regular film and TV session work fills a lot of Carol's diary and she can also be frequently found performing in London's West End shows. She is a professor of trombone at Trinity Laban Conservatoire of Music in London and the Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester where she, herself, gained the highest qualifications possible.

Carol is currently President of the International Trombone Festival Board, a post she has held since 2017, and in 2023 became the first female President of the International Trombone Association. Carol's orchestrations and arrangements have featured on albums at the top of the UK and US billboard charts, been recorded at the famous Capitol Studios in Hollywood and also played during the Academy Awards ceremony.


Andrea Van Hof, Director, Youth Workshop

Her public school ensembles have received the highest ratings at contests in Colorado and Indiana. An accomplished flutist, she also performs regularly in the saxophone section of the Indiana-based Director's Jazz Orchestra. An avid home cook and outdoor enthusiast, she lives with her husband Chris and their two boys Dexter and Fritz in Indianapolis.

Jeremiah Ward is an Assistant Band Director at Leander Middle School in central Texas, where he has taught since 2021. 

Joannès Rochut: More Than Bordogni

Douglas Yeo

Joannès Rochut (1881-1952) is well-known to trombonists around the world for his three volumes of Melodious Etudes from the works of Marco Bordogni (New York: Carl Fischer, 1928). However, his influence is far greater than his transcription of Bordogni Vocalises. Born in Paris, Joannès Rochut spent nine years of his childhood in an orphanage where he began playing trombone, and he significantly impacted international musical life as a performer, arranger of music, teacher, and orchestra manager. He was a first-prize winner at the Paris Conservatorie (1905) and performed as a member of the Orchestra de la Garde républicaine (Republican Guard Band), several orchestras in France, and the Boston Symphony Orchestra, where he served as principal trombonist from 1925-1930. He played trombones by Lefevre, Besson, and Vincent Bach, endorsed Holton trombones, and was the (posthumous) recipient of the International Trombone Association's 2021 Legacy Circle Award. Using rare photographs, archival documents, recordings, and neverbefore publicly seen artifacts owned by the Rochut family, this presentation is the first comprehensive look at Joannès Rochut's life and work as an impactful influencer that extends far beyond his Bordogni Vocalises publications, and it brings his life and work into sharp focus for today's trombonists.



Performance and Pedagogy on Multiple Low Brass Instruments

Dr. Carson King-Fournier, University of Wisconsin-Whitewater

JoIn the Applied area at most higher education institutions, there frequently are one or two faculty members teaching multiple instruments. While there are some exceptions, fundamentally these are the low brass faculty. One is often expected to teach the four traditional low brass instruments: trombone, bass trombone, euphonium, and tuba. Additionally, there is continual pressure on all institutions to cut costs and increase revenue and enrollment. With this pressure, as professors retire or leave an institution, departments are replacing them with part-time faculty, or in some cases hiring one person as a full-time tenure-track professor teaching all low brass instruments instead of multiple faculty. The skills acquired through doubling on an auxiliary low brass instrument at a high level not only improves one's musicianship and knowledge, but when applied to students of that instrument it yields faster progress and a higher level of performance. Through research that included significant performance study, teaching observations by industry professionals, and interviews with established performers and teachers, this presentation serves to outline a pedagogical and performance framework for those in positions where they are obliged to teach multiple low brass instruments, or those looking to perform on multiple low brass instruments more faithfully.

1:00 PM | Pepsi Co Hall Performing Artist Showcase #1 Drew Leslie, Colorado State University

"Extase" is a solo piece for unaccompanied trombone by the composer Emmett Yoshioka. It was composed in 1969 and is a very accessible piece for undergraduate and graduate music students to explore the genre of unaccompanied solos, and works well on both juries and recitals. Yoshioka is a composer with both Japanese and Hawaiian heritage and his piece features melodies that showcase influences from his varied background. My hope is that through this performance at the ITF, more people will become aware of this beautiful piece

and hopefully it will become a staple of the solo trombone repertoire.

This piece is for tenor trombone soloist within a brass quintet. It is divided into three movements, held together by a single motivic fragment that runs through the entire work. The first movement is brisk and explores some of the dynamic extremes the ensemble is capable of. The second movement is a passacaglia where the solo begins the melody, and the third movement relies heavily on the kinetic energy built up by a mixed meter. This piece will be performed by the La Moine Brass Quintet, the faculty quintet in residence at Western Illinois University.

PFT Duo is a chamber ensemble consisting of hornist Kristen Ronning and trombonist Martin Gelwasser. PFT Duo is committed to the creation and performance of new works for brass instruments. Through innovative programming, PFT Duo engages diverse audiences across the Midwestern United States.

Shoulder to Shoulder, for horn and trombone, was composed by Adam Scott Neal in 2018. This piece is "about solidarity and partnership." These concepts are musically reflected in the work through the way in which the two instruments primarily play homophonically or in conjunction with one another.

Tim Conner, University of Miami

Pairing these short unaccompanied works allows the music to in fact "tell a story" through musical expression. The first, "Mantram," is a somewhat obscure piece originally composed for double bass. The second, "Camel Music," was one of the first in our repertoire to explore extended techniques. I fear this delightful work has fallen off the radar, and that our younger generation of trombonists should be aware of this significant piece and hopefully carry it forward in our evergrowing canon of "contemporary music."



Since 2015, the Drei Bones Trombone Trio has been dedicated to performing and recording the existing trombone trio literature and commissioning works for trombone trio. The "New" includes a new commission, Freundschaften, by Catherine McMichael and recent works by Elizabeth Raum and Tom Davis. Representing the "Old" are lesser-known trios by Andre LaFosse, Henri Vachey and Allen Chase. Their debut CD, Drei Bones, was released in 2016, followed by Of Hammered Gold in 2018, both on the Emeritus label. 


Present moment awareness is a highly desired and valuable skill for performing musicians. Being fully engaged with one's playing, both in the practice room and in performances, can lead to not only greater productivity and a higher quality of playing, but a richer and more satisfying experience. But our attention is often pulled away from this present moment awareness, and distractions can often gain the upper hand. We are now living in what some would call the "attention economy." In this presentation, we will consider what this means, along with the idea that "where attention goes, energy flows." Ever-expanding research is revealing that our ability to pay attention and stay in the present moment is indeed a skill that can be improved upon. We will consider this research and what this means for musicians. 

Viento Sur Trombones is a chamber group that has managed to establish itself throughout time with a totally innovative style in approaching the Argentinean music repertoire. With international recognition (from the public, the press, and renowned artists worldwide), the ensemble stands out as a reference of chamber music for trombones. Betin Güneş (b. 1957) is a Turkish composer, pianist, and conductor living in Cologne, Germany. During his time studying composition in Cologne, he also studied trombone under Branimir Slokar, giving him unique insight into the idiomatic tendencies of the trombone. His composition 'The Trombonite, für Altposaune und Klavier' (1993) is one of the few contemporary pieces for alto trombone. It is episodic in nature and employs not only advanced techniques but also showcases the full possible range of the instrument. This piece was written for German trombonist Thomas Horch, and was recorded on his album 'Posaune in Europa.'

This four movement work explores the centuries-old idea of "thin places"—moments of rootedness to place when the veil between worlds is lifted—through sound. Beginning with a prelude as an invitation for reflection, it uses clarinet, trombone, and looper to capture emotions from wistfulness to spiritual anguish. Each movement's title reflects an untranslatable word from another language: Hiraeth (Welsh, longing to return to something that is lost), Dépaysement (French, feeling like an outsider), and Τοcκα (Russian profound yearning).

This arrangement of Hensel's Nocturne in G minor for trombone solo and piano was completed in 2023. "Aurum" by Evgeniya Kozhevnikova (a.k.a. Jane Kozhevnikova or Jane K.) is written for two trombones and piano. The work, "Aurum" (meaning "gold" in Latin), will be a reflection on things that are important and precious but not of material value, i.e. "true gold." Jane is an award-winning composer and performer (Downbeat Magazine, International Composer's Competition "Opus Ignatum", American Prize in Chamber Vocal Composition) and her previous works for trombone include "Ol Sailors Legends", written for trombone and piano and premiered in 2022, and "Brave Glory", written for brass quintet and premiered in 2023 at Trombonanza in Santa Fe, Argentina.

Open Forms in the Age of A.I., the case of Cage's Solo for Sliding Trombone and Somax2

The interest in the concept of "open work" emerged in the fifties. To articulate the various degrees of variability inherent in this musical approach, ranging from the subtlest to the most pronounced, one could employ terms such as "controlled randomness," "mobile forms," "open works," and/ or "indeterminacy."

From a performance standpoint, A.I. can be regarded as a collaborator that assists humans rather than merely serving as

a repository of answers. Engaging with an A.I., in "open form performance", is a process wherein the responses provided by the machine serve to stimulate and augment human creativity, rather than simply furnishing "well-formed" answers. This is why we use the term "co-creativity."

The central idea behind Somax 2 is to behave as a cocreative partner in the improvisational process. The system is capable of autonomously listening to and adapting to musicians, generating its material based on an external repository of musical material. It operates as a multi-agent interactive system facilitating live machine co-improvisation with musicians, leveraging machine listening, machine learning, self-organized maps, and generative units. This lecture is part of the REACH project supported by the European Research Council under Horizon 2020 program (Grant ERC-2019- ADG #883313).





Exploring and Transcribing the Sonatas of Anna Bon

Anna Bon (1738-1769), known as Anna Bon di Venezia, the Virtuosa di Musica di Camera for the court at Bayreuth, was an 18th-century Italian composer and performer. Critically heralded in her day, Bon is among the several centuries of women who have made vital contributions to the world of composition. There are anecdotes in history about composers like Fanny Mendelssohn, who composed incidental music and conducted "Sunday Concerts" in her home, or Nadia Boulanger, who was internationally renowned as a music pedagogue, but was also one of the first women to conduct her compositions with prestigious English and American symphony orchestras. Mapping the careers of the first women composers has been challenging. Now in the 21st century, we can begin to fully grasp the weight and depth of the role women composers have played in the development of music as an artform throughout history. Bon was a young contemporary of J.S. Bach, worked at the famed court of Esterházy, and composed chamber music, an opera, arias, divertimenti, and chamber sonatas. This

lecture recital will discuss Bon's six sonatas for transverse flute and violoncello or harpsichord, that have been transcribed for tenor trombone and piano. Bon wrote her sonatas in the style of Sonata da camera or chamber sonatas, which was a popular instrumental composition in the late Baroque Era. Her compositions possess stylistic aspects of both the Baroque and Classical Eras. This lecture recital will also discuss how imagination, musical counterpoint, and progressive features of the French Galant style, characterize Bon's sonatas. The lecture recital will conclude with a performance of one of Bon's Sonata's for transverse flute and violoncello/harpsichord, transcribed for trombone and piano.

The first theme begins with a melancholy passage in D minor that lands on a dissonant C# before resolving. The second theme revolves around F major, although has a much more passionate and stormy mood. The development stretches the technique of the trombone in terms of breathing and range. Neither of the themes return, instead, the melody converses with an improvisatory-like interplay with the accompaniment. Swedish listeners may be familiar with the opening theme as it was adapted for a popular television soap opera.

The solidarity extension project developed at the Industrial University of Santander is exposed, the main purpose of which was to create pedagogical-musical material (musical repertoire) to promote and contribute to the dissemination and appropriation of Colombian Andean music, having creation processes as a strategy. collaborative artistic, audio recording, theoretical-practical workshops, in addition to proposing a record production proposal. These processes in turn became the fundamental stages and objectives of the project. The musical repertoire was created for bass trombone and piano. In total, eight (8) works were commissioned, including arrangements and unpublished compositions, innovating with the musical format in addition to contributing to the dissemination of Colombian Andean music at a national and international level. The project, in turn, included a stage

in which a series of theoretical-practical workshops were held in three schools in the metropolitan area of the city of Bucaramanga, aimed at boys, girls and young people.







ITF Antiqua – 17th-century Venice: Beyond the basilica

David Yacus

In the period between the 16th and 17th centuries Venice reaches the height of its splendor, becoming perhaps the most opulent city of the time. Music represents not only an essential element in projecting an image of magnificence, but an important part of the culture and daily life of the city.

The basilica of San Marco established its first permanent instrumental ensemble in the mid-16th century, establishing a musical dynasty that would include many of the period's most noteworthy composers and musicians, including Andrea and Giovanni Gabrieli and Claudio Monteverdi.

Beyond the basilica, musical ensembles were regularly present in the most important events of the civic life of the city. The activities of the Scuole Grandi, devotional confraternities that promoted an intense musical activity during liturgical services, represent a concrete testimony to the musical atmosphere in which the musicians of Venice thrived. The aristocracy also made use of musicians for banquets, balls, weddings, and other sumptuous displays of wealth. This program looks beyond the basilican walls to focus on a small part of the large body of Venetian repertoire for small mixed ensembles of instruments and voices.

Alec Wilder's Sonata for Bass Trombone: An Arrangement for Chamber Winds and Rhythm Section

Dr. John Hagan, Northwest Mississippi Community College

This arrangement connects the Sonata for Bass Trombone with Wilder's Octets of the 1930s and 40s. The Sonata is notably similar in style to the "Third-Stream" aesthetic of the octets. Each of the sonata's five movements, as well as each of the octets, can be described in terms of their unique blend of classical and jazz styles. Structurally, each work lives in the classical world, while harmonically and rhythmically, persistent jazz influences are revealed. The octets, composed for flute, oboe/English horn, clarinet, bass clarinet, bassoon and a rhythm section of bass, drums, and harpsichord, establish an ensemble agile enough to negotiate the original

piano accompaniment of the Sonata, while providing opportunities for tonal colors and textures that bring new perspective on the work. This presentation will include a brief overview of Wilder's biography and contributions to American music, background on the octets and sonata, analysis of the arrangement, and then conclude with a performance of the work. 





COMPOSERS WORKSHOP ARTISTS

Rob Deemer

Recipient of the 2018 ASCAP Deems Taylor/Virgil Thomson Internet Award, Rob Deemer is a composer, conductor, educator, author, and advocate. His works have been commissioned and performed by the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra, the President's Own Marine Band, the U.S. Army Orchestra, the Rascher Saxophone Quartet, loadbang, Akropolis Reed Quintet, and Gaudete Brass. His work as an advocate for composers from underrepresented demographic groups led him to create the Institute for Composer Diversity at the State University of New York at Fredonia. His work with the Institute for Composer Diversity has culminated in partnerships with the League of American Orchestras, the National Association for Music Education, the College Band Directors National Association, the American String Teachers Association, and the Midwest Clinic. Deemer is Professor and Head of Composition as well as the Chair of the Department of Theatre and Dance at the State University of New York at Fredonia and serves as the chair of the National Association for Music Education Repertoire Diversity Initiative and the New York State School Music Association Composition & Songwriting Committee.



Noelia Escalzo

A prolific composer from Argentina, Escalzo's music has been performed in Argentina, Peru, Ecuador, United States, Spain, Mexico, Italy, and Germany. Her large works include commissions by ballet companies including the Orquesta Sinfonica of Salta, Argentina, and twice, the American Ballet Theater. She has been awarded the "Premios Nacional Clásica" by the Radio Nacional Clásica, Argentina. Her piece "Tromborerá" was the winner of the 2014 Edition Composition Competition at Trombonanza. She composed the first concerto for Contraforte Bassoon, premiered at the International Double Reed Conference by Lewis Lipnick and the National Symphony Orchestra of Washington D.C. Acclaimed guitar soloist, Sergio Puccini premiered her work, "Lalo Shifrin Tribute" in Los Angeles. She composed "Doctor Tango" for the Mayo Clinic in Minnesota. Her current projects include a composition for Andrea Bocelli's upcoming tour and a trombone duet with piano to be performed at the International Women's Brass Conference in Mito, Japan.



Jimmy Kachulis

Kachulis is an award winning composer, conductor, songwriter, lyricist scholar, ethnomusicologist, performer, and Grammy-nominated educator. He is currently a professor at the Berklee College of Music. His compositions have been selected multiple times for the ITF's Composers Workshop. He has given several masterclasses on world music for the workshop. He returns as one of the invited clinicians.



ABOUT ITA SOLO AND ENSEMBLE COMPETITIONS

The International Trombone Association Solo and Ensemble Competitions consist of 14 highly competitive categories that attract hundreds of submissions from around the globe. Panels of international teachers and artists screen the submitted recordings, selecting three finalists. The finalists then compete in a live final round at the annual International Trombone Festival to determine the winner. On the final day of ITF, the winners of each category are featured in the "Winner's Showcase" recital.

The origins of the ITA Solo and Ensemble Competitions can be traced back to 1971 when Henry Romersa, founder of the International Trombone Workshop, awarded a scholarship to a promising young trombonist to attend the first ITW in Nashville, TN. The first named scholarship was started a few years later in honor of Frank Smith, a trombonist in the US Airmen of Note who tragically lost his life in a car accident. Additional awards and scholarships were created and named in the following years in honor of influential trombonists, including Frank Rosolino, Donald Yaxley, Robert Marsteller, Larry Wiehe, and Lewis Van Haney. Annual ensemble awards were also established and named after Emory Remington and Kai Winding.

As these scholarships and awards developed and the interest in them increased, winners were selected by a scholarship committee through a more formal process via submitted recordings. The traditional "Winner's Showcase" that exists today began in the 1980's and has featured many of today's renowned performers and pedagogues throughout the years.

Due to increased popularity and participation, the ITA Board renamed each scholarship as a competition in 2001, and the current process of selecting finalists was established. The ITA Standing Committee on Competitions was created to oversee the competitions, with the ITA Competitions Coordinator responsible for their implementation. All finalists receive free tuition to attend the ITF while winners are awarded a first prize. These prizes can include instruments, mouthpieces, accessories, gift certificates, and publications generously donated by leading manufacturers and music publication companies. In recent years, many of the top professional trombonists have also donated private lessons to the winners.

The list of past scholarship and competition winners includes many of today's leading performers and teachers; Conrad Herwig, Michael Dease, Douglas Wright, Sasha Romero, Blair Bollinger, Peter Steiner, Achilles Liarmakopoulos, and Nathan Zgonc, just to name a few! In fact, many of these artists now serve as judges for the competitions.

As you enjoy this year's ITF over the next few days, I encourage you to attend the final rounds of the ITA Competitions and experience the impressive artistry of the young trombonists who are the next generation of performers and teachers. I also encourage you to support with your patronage our prize sponsors. Without their continued and generous support, the competitions would not be what they are today.

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
