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HOW TO USE

Although *Just a Hat* is designed to augment English classes, it is adaptable to social studies, American or world history classes. History teachers may tailor the chapter activities to their own objectives. All educators are invited to add additional questions or activities they think will tap into readers' interests.

Essential Materials:

For enrichment activities:

Steps to use:

- 1. A concise guide to the literary elements (Quick Lit) is included so that activities may be completed without a literature textbook. Make students a copy of the Quick Lit section to keep.
- 2. Review the lesson objectives for the chapter. Consult the Quick Lit content for the corresponding elements of fiction or literary devices. If the reader is unfamiliar with those elements, present a short lesson and some practice.
- 3. Assign the reading chapter. Review the activities for the chapter and prepare for discussion.
- 4. Assign readers activities as age-appropriate. Although many activities may be completed orally, "The Hat" question for each chapter is designed especially for class discussion. Before undertaking class discussion for "The Hat" activity question, ensure the reader understands when its use is an idiom. To ensure comprehension, perhaps ask the reader to put the idiom in his or her own words.
- 5. If needed, check answers against those suggested in the answer key.

READING FOR IMAGINATION

For the educator and parents:

Reading is an important skill, yet it is more than practical. Reading ignites the imagination to transform the black-on-white letters into vivid colors. Although the author describes the characters and setting, it is readers who select the shades of paint colors and details of how the characters look and the places they go. Readers imagine the sound of the characters' voices, what they smell, and how they move with very few words by the author to guide them.

Imagination's root word is "image." A mental image is how the reader draws the pictures or creates actors for the internal video of the story. The better the writer, the easier it is for the reader to imagine the story as living the experience. The Quick Lit printable guide to imagery and literary devices is a supplement to the chapter activities for Just a Hat. Using Quick Lit, readers can review elements of fiction, especially thought and imagery. The guide is not intended to be used in isolation from other language curricula, but to augment literature instruction for middle school to high school levels.

QUICK LIT

ELEMENTS OF FICTION

Theme - the underlying meaning that the author is trying to get across. The moral of the story.

Mood - the emotional state of the author as he or she writes the story. It is the author's attitude toward the subject. Sometimes the author's mood and tone may be identical; often they are not. For example: The mood may be disgusted and the tone sarcastic. The mood may be sympathetic and the tone inspirational. The mood may be bitter, but the tone ironically happy.

Tone - the term used for the manner of speaking. The tone of voice used by the author to reveal his or her mood. Example: If the tone is sarcastic, the mood is probably hostile. If the tone is cynical, the mood may be bitter and resentful.

Conflict - Those things or problems that present obstacles to the character obtaining what he/she desires. The most common are: Conflict with the self, Conflict with others, Conflict with nature, and Conflict with the supernatural.

Motivation - the thing that makes the characters think what they think and do what they do. A character may have more than one motivation.

Plot - the sequence of events that make up the story. There are 5 elements of plot:

- Exposition. Introduction of characters, establishing the setting, and introducing the primary conflict of the story.
- Rising Action. Those multiple moments of conflict that raise the stakes and create tension as the story moves forward.
- Climax. The peak of tension, plot, and character in the story. It's the moment the main character is forced to make a lifechanging decision.
- Falling Action or Denouement. This is when conflicts begin to be resolved.
- Conclusion. The part of the story where characters tie up the loose ends to their problems.

Characterization - describing the personality or individual quality of a person or thing. The five methods are physical description, action, inner thoughts, reactions, and speech.

Setting - the time, place, and circumstances in which the story occurs or develops.

Foreshadowing - a hint of what is to come later in the story that adds to the tension.

LITERARY DEVICES

Imagery and Melody in Fiction or Poetry

Imagery is imaginative figures of speech. It is the most general type of descriptive language that appeals to the five senses. Sound effects may also affect imagery.
