

And they were afraid. ³⁶Those who had seen it told them how the one who had been possessed by demons had been healed. ³⁷Then all the people of the surrounding country of the Gerasenes asked Jesus to leave them; for they were seized with great fear. So he got into the boat and returned.

³⁸The man from whom the demons had gone begged that he might be with him; but Jesus sent him away, saying, ³⁹Return to your home, and declare how much God has done for you. So he went away, proclaiming throughout the city how much Jesus had done for him.






THANKSGIVING AT THE TABLE



For as often as we eat this bread and drink this cup, we proclaim the Lord's death until he comes:







Come to the banquet, for all is now ready.


Thanks be to God.

We sit. All are invited to the Lord's Table. Communion is distributed by intinction. Intinction involves dipping the consecrated bread (wafer) into the chalice of wine and then eating.

Ushers will invite both sides of the congregation to come forward via the center aisle. The Pastor will hand you a wafer at the head of the aisle. After receiving the bread, proceed to your side and dip it into the chalice of wine, being mindful not to submerge your fingers. If, by chance, the wafer goes directly into your mouth, don't worry—the Pastor will gladly provide another. Return to your seat via the side aisle.

For those who prefer, prepackaged wafers and grape juice are available. Gluten-free wafers are also available. Notify the Pastor of your preference when arriving at the front. You may stay in your seat for communion, and the Pastor and Assisting Minister will bring it to you. Please dispose of your trash after worship if you have any.



MUSIC NOTES from John Sparkman

Among today's favorite summer hymns and songs of the St Philip community is the infectious *This Little Light of Mine*, which you cannot deny is super fun to sing, no matter your age! While often mistakenly believed to be a spiritual from the era of slavery, *Little Light* is a gospel song written especially for children around 1920 by Harry Dixon Loes.

However, the song gained wider popularity during the Civil Rights Movement of the 1950s and 60s. Zilphia Horton, who also helped popularize *We Shall Overcome* and *We Shall Not Be Moved*, adapted the song from Loes' children's hymn to a protest song, introducing it to Pete Seeger at the Highlander Folk School, a center for social activism during the fight for Civil Rights.

Also of special note is today's prelude, written by Florence Price, who, in the 1930's, was the first African American woman to be recognized as a symphonic composer and the first Black composer to have a composition played by a major orchestra.

Price composed over 300 works, including four symphonies, four concertos, plus numerous choral and solo vocal pieces and a few works for solo organ like today's *Adoration*. In 2009, a substantial number of unpublished scores were found in her former summer home, which has fostered a renaissance of interest in her music in recent years.

Blessing Box Non-perishable Food Items Needed



Canned items: *fruits*, *soups*, *beans*, *pastas*, *pasta sauces*, *vegetables*, *and meats* (tuna, Vienna sausages, chicken).

Boxed items: instant dry milk, rice or rice packets, pastas noodles & spaghetti, instant oatmeal, Hamburger Helper, and instant mashed potatoes.

Plastic jars: *peanut butter and jelly.*

Men's Breakfast, Saturday, July 12


