





### **EMRS State Voting Intentions Poll - November 2023** REPORT VERSION: FINAL

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The survey was conducted from the 20<sup>th</sup> to the 27<sup>th</sup> of November 2023.

1,000 Tasmanian registered voters were interviewed, and responses weighted to reflect the Tasmanian adult voting population. A sample of this size provides a maximum margin of error of  $\pm$  3.1 percentage points at the 95% confidence level.

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
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# TASMANIAN STATE VOTING INTENTIONS





The most recent EMRS poll was conducted from the 20th to the 27th of November 2023, calling landline and mobile phone numbers throughout Tasmania.

### **Summary:**


- After a significant drop in May, support for the Liberal State Government has started to recover, with a +3pt increase to 39%.
- Support for the Labor Party has fallen 3pts to 29%.
- Support for The Greens is down by 2pts to 12%.
- 19% of respondents say they will vote for someone other than a Liberal, Labor or Tasmanian Greens candidate, with 17% supporting an independent candidate.

Q. If the Tasmanian State Election for the House of Assembly was held today, who would you vote for? If unsure, respondents were then asked: Q2. Even if it's a slight leaning, would it be the Liberal Party, the Labor Party, the Greens, an Independent, or some other minor party? Respondents who declined to answer or not registered to vote were removed from analysis - Nov-2023: n=911

## TASMANIAN STATE VOTING INTENTIONS







The proportion of voters nominating Jeremy Rockliff as their preferred Premier in the latest November poll remained unchanged when compared to August 2023, standing at 42%

Meanwhile, Rebecca White has lost considerable personal support as preferred premier, down by 4 pts since August, standing at 35%.

Nearly one in four voters (23%) were unable to make a choice between the two leaders – this represents the highest level of undecided vote in the premier stakes since March 2017.
