

An Overview: Emergency Management

Emergency management professionals aim to protect communities by coordinating and integrating activities necessary to build, sustain, and improve the capability to mitigate against, prepare for, respond to, and recover from threatened or natural disasters, acts of terrorism or other man-made disasters (FEMA, 2022). There are several career specializations in emergency management including but not limited to state government, local government, hospitals, and universities. Additionally, emergency managers come from varying backgrounds, such as public safety, security, law enforcement, government, and media communications. In the past several years, there has been a shift from second-career professionals to first-career college graduates in the emergency management sector. Overall, the field of emergency management offers a vast amount of career opportunities to professionals with varying backgrounds.

Career Profiles: Emergency Management with Northwell Health

Aimee Corke, Director

What are your current roles & responsibilities? I am the planning lead for Hospitals, Skilled Nursing Facilities, and Ambulatory Practice locations including article 28 facilities. My role is really to help and build partnerships with our practices. Sometimes, sites need corporate crisis management support to help them make progress in areas that are identified as a need.

Can you provide an overview of your career path?

I started as an administrative assistant in environmental services at Long Island Jewish (LIJ)-Valley Stream, which was then known as Franklin Hospital. I was going to school for nursing and decided to change my major to Emergency Management after being a member of the hospital's Disaster Response Team. While on the Disaster Response Team, I realized that I preferred a career that would expose me to different situations, people, and challenges daily.

What do you like most about Emergency Management?

It's something different every day. Some days its nonstop; some days you have time to breathe. You interact with so many different people and it's all under the umbrella of helping patients. Although we are not providing direct patient care, we support our sites in a way that patient care is not impacted at the bedside when crises occur.

What are your current roles & responsibilities?

I oversee emergency preparedness activities for Northwell Health's Shared Services – Core Laboratory, Pharmacy, Home Care, Hospice, Human Resources, Financial Services, Revenue Cycle, and Payroll. I'm also the Lower Hudson Valley liaison for the recently awarded Regional Training Center healthcare grant.

Can you provide an overview of your career path?

I had a bit different path than most who work in this industry. I was a Political Science undergrad and spent five years working in Washington, DC. While out to lunch with my co-workers, someone suggested I pursue a career in Emergency Management. This was a couple years after Katrina, FEMA was hiring, and they said it's a good path to go into. I received my degree from CUNY John Jay and interned with Mount Sinai's Emergency Management program. Within three months of the internship, I was hired at St. Luke's Cornwall Hospital in Newburgh, NY.

What characteristics do you think make a good Emergency Manager?

Calm demeanor – being able to compartmentalize and handle multiple different tasks without losing focus. This skill may take an entire career to master.
