SEASON AFTER PENTECOST — LIFE IN THE KINGDOM

For the first half of the church year (Dec-May), we observed the great events in the life of Christ. This is sometimes referred to as the "Festival Half" of the church year, where the majority of our high festivals are celebrated. We rejoiced at His birth (Christmas), followed Him in His Lenten walk, stood beneath His cross (Good Friday), celebrated His empty tomb (Easter), acclaimed Him as He ascended to His throne (Ascension), and received His promised Spirit on Pentecost. The second half of the year (June-Nov) has many names but all of them emphasize the life of Christ's Church which flows out of the accomplished events in Christ's life. In this season, which officially started last week on Holy Trinity, the church hears the great teachings of Christ and grows in her understanding of the new kingdom He established.

Life in this kingdom is not a solitary existence; Christ has called us into His Church. Throughout this season we'll learn what that means and looks like. Jesus Himself will tell us what it means, how we are to live, and the characteristics we display to the world. We love God above else, purely because He loved us first. That affects the way we live, what we value, and how we seek to answer our doubts.

PARTICIPATION & CHILDREN

Even from their earliest years, children are models of faith for all of us. Our worship format not only encourages families to be together, but is designed for active engagement and participation by all, including children. The sights and sounds of active children are a great joy to us and evidence that God is blessing our future even now. It is purely by grace, not by our own efforts or morality, that we are saved.


The Invocation is a

reminder of who we are by recalling the words which were spoken at our baptism. It is the historic Christian practice to make the sign of the cross upon hearing these words throughout the service whenever the sign of the cross is made.

There is a wide gulf between God in His holiness and us in our sinfulness. We put on clean clothes in the morning to come to church, but more importantly we need a clean heart in the presence of the Lord. So at the very beginning of the Divine Service, we lay our sins on Jesus through confession and are assured that God does not condemn us for our sins, but forgives us for the sake and on account of Jesus.

Because Jesus took away the sins of the world, He authorized His followers to announce His forgiveness to all who repent of their sins. Jesus' forgiveness, proclaimed by His servants, **"absolves"** us, that is, it sets us free from the guilt of our sins.

KYRIE ELEISON

"Lord, Have Mercy"

Originally, the phrase **'Kyrie eleison'** (Greek words meaning 'Lord, have mercy') was a praise-shout similar to the Hebrew shout 'Hosanna' or the modern 'Amen!' But by the 400s A.D. the phrase was adapted into the Christian church's liturgy.

When used in the Divine Service, the Kyrie is sung in a somber tone, crying to our Lord for His help and mercy in all the needs of this earthly body and life. The petition "Lord, have mercy" is found in many psalms as well as in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke. It is always a cry for help in distress, and one our Lord is eager to answer. In peace let us pray to the Lord.



For the peace from above and for our salvation, let us pray to the Lord.



For the peace of the whole world, for the well-being of the Church of God, and for the unity of all, let us pray to the Lord.



For this holy house and for all who offer here their worship and praise, let us pray to the Lord.





GLORIA

"Glory to God in the Highest "






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The Gloria immediately follows the Kyrie in a swift change of mood. It is an outburst of joy and praise to the Holy Trinity that lifts the worshiper from thoughts of human need expressed in the Kyrie to the glorification of God's majesty, power, and holiness.

Jesus said that the angels in heaven rejoice over just one sinner who repents. In response to our Lord's gracious absolution, the Church sings as the angels did on that first Christmas night: "Glory to God in the highest!" (Luke 2:13, 14) which, in Latin, is **Gloria in excelsis Deo.**

Martin Luther rightly said the **Gloria** "did not grow, nor was it made on earth, but it came down from heaven." The earliest known date for the Gloria in a worship service is A.D. 126.

FOR I DESIRE MERCY, AND NOT SACRIFICE

HOSEA 6:6

Hosea 6:1-6


The prophet Hosea has a conversation with the LORD on behalf of the people of Israel.

Israel begins speaking as Hosea acknowledges that the LORD has cut them with the condemning words of His law. God's judgement is just as Israel's love for God was fleeting.

Starting in verse 4, Hosea now speaks on behalf of the LORD who reiterates His just judgment but then comforts with His desire to show them mercy.

It is interesting that in the final chapter of Hosea, the LORD concludes with this promise to Israel: "I will heal their waywardness and love them freely, for my anger has turned away from them" (14:4). **Psalm 119**, is the longest psalm and the longest chapter in the Bible. Our psalm for today includes verses 65-72, which provide us with a thorough meditation on God's Word and encourages us to take it seriously. It is a prayer that disproves the claims of the devil and provides comfort, instruction, and thanksgiving for the believer.

The pastor will introduce the refrain. Please repeat it and elsewhere as noted. Please also join in singing the verses in bold print as you are comfortable.



Do good to your / servant according to your / Word, LORD.

man, I was shown mercy because I acted in ignorance and unbelief. ¹⁴ The grace of our Lord was poured out on me abundantly, along with the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. ¹⁵ Here is a trustworthy saying that deserves full acceptance: Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners–of whom I am the worst.
¹⁶ But for that very reason I was shown mercy so that in me, the worst of sinners, Christ Jesus might display his unlimited patience as an example for those who would believe on him and receive eternal life.
¹⁷ Now to the King eternal, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory for ever and ever. Amen.

THE HOLY GOSPEL

CONFESSION OF FAITH

The Apostles' Creed

I believe in God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth.

I believe in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended into hell. The third day He rose again from the dead. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty. From there He will come to judge the living and the dead. *continued* Paul goes on to give a simple, beautiful expression of the gospel which any and every Christian can say.

Jesus calls the tax collector, Matthew, to be one of His disciples. This upsets the religious elite of the day which causes Jesus to explain the way God truly operates. He desires to give mercy more than receiving people's sacrifices.

This portion of God's Word will be the basis for today's sermon.

The historic creeds (Apostles', Nicene, Athanasian) are the cherished possession of the entire church down through the ages. The church has maintained the confession of these creeds and has even suffered martyrdom rather than deny the faith confessed in them. Therefore, the use of the historic Christian creeds is a very important part of Lutheran worship.

Matthew 9:9-13



I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Christian Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

This modern hymn beautifully expresses how it is that great sinners like Paul, Matthew, you and me can be confident we are loved and forgiven by God. The answer lies 'beneath the cross.'

PREFACE


The Lord be with you.



Lift up your hearts.



Let us give thanks to the Lord, our God.





Ruth 2:4; 2 Timothy 4:22

The words of the **Preface** are repeated again to begin the Sacrament. They are rooted in Scripture and have been spoken or sung by Christians to begin the Sacrament portion of the service for over 1800 years.

Together we lift our hearts in faith to our Lord, who comes to us in Holy Communion to give us His saving gifts.

"The Lord be with you" echoes greetings exchanged by God's people throughout the Bible (see Ruth 2:4; 2 Timothy 4:22). It is truly good and right that we should at all times and in all places give you thanks, O Lord, holy Father, almighty and everlasting God, through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who promised that wherever two or three come together in His name, there He is with them to shepherd His flock until He comes again in glory. Therefore, with all the saints on earth and hosts of heaven, we praise your holy name and join their glorious song:

We praise our God using words from the angels around God's throne (Isaiah 6) because our Savior is here with us in a special way in Holy Communion. We also echo the words spoken of Jesus as He entered Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. As Jesus entered on a lowly donkey that day, so He comes to us today in simple bread and wine.

This song is called the **Sanctus**, which is Latin for 'holy.' It is also one of the oldest song of the liturgy already present as early as the turn of the first century.

The Words (Latin: 'verba') of Institution both proclaim the words of Jesus and declare the Sacrament to be what it is: His true body and blood, under the bread and wine, given for us to eat and drink for the forgiveness of sins.



THE WORDS OF INSTITUTION "Verba" | Matthew 26:26-28

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Our Lord Jesus Christ, on the night He was betrayed, took bread; and when He had given thanks, He broke it and gave it to His disciples saying: "Take and eat. This is my # body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me." Then He took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them saying, "Drink from it all of you; this is my blood 🗣 of the new covenant, which is poured out for you for the forgiveness of sins. Do this whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me."

The sign of the cross reminds us of Christ's death.

The peace of the Lord be with you always.

Amen.



John the Baptizer once called Jesus the **"Lamb** of God." The innocent death of Christ in our place frees us from sin's guilt and condemnation.

Through His atoning work, we have peace with God. This song is known as the Angus Dei, Latin for 'Lamb of God' and dates back to the 7th century.

DISTRIBUTION HYMN

"Chief of Sinners Though I Be" | #578

This classic hymn echoes the words St. Paul confessed earlier: "Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am the worst" (1 Timothy 1:15). It is not our morality of lack of sins that draws the love of God to us. Rather, it is God's desire to show and be merciful that draws Himself close to even the chief and worst of sinners.

DISTRIBUTION HYMN "With All My Heart I Praise You, Lord" | #658

Matched with a popular melody, this hymn, written in the 17th century, was recently translated into English. In it, we boldly confess our sins and confident rejoice in God's forgiveness. God delights to show us mercy by announcing our forgiveness through His servant and at His table.

After the Distribution is complete, we conclude with this prayer:

CLOSING PRAYER

Having received the gracious gift of our Lord's forgiveness in the Body and Blood of Christ, we respond with a prayer of thanksgiving. O God the Father, source of all goodness, in your loving-kindness you sent your Son to share in our humanity. We thank you that through Him you have given us pardon and peace in this Sacrament. We also pray that you will not forsake us but will rule our hearts and minds by your Holy Spirit so that we willingly serve you day after day; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.
