

A Letter from our Chairman, Penny Enroth

In 2022, our country faced challenges that the Palmer Foundation addressed through our grantmaking. A tight labor market, the War in Ukraine, and lingering effects from the pandemic caused high inflation. Companies had trouble finding and keeping talent. Society struggled with mental health issues. These difficulties and more inspired the Palmer Foundation to help where we could make a measurable impact.

Since 1990, the Palmer Foundation has awarded domestic grants to more than 410 distinct 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations, primarily in Midwestern and Mid-Atlantic states, as well as international grants to worthy organizations working in countries where family members have lived.

Throughout the years, as new generations of family members have joined our Board, our focus has accommodated their special talents, skills, and interests. The Palmer Foundation empowers people to reach their highest potential. We strive to be a catalyst for change.

To that end, we made some significant investments in youth development, workforce training, poverty alleviation, clean water, and litigation in 2022, including seven contributions to first-time grantees.

Today, we remain committed to ensuring that increasing numbers of people in America and in the developing world have access to clean water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH). Too many people in the world have little to no access to basic safe drinking water and facilities. Clean water is in short supply. Our Foundation particularly focused its efforts on cleaning up the Great Lakes, Cape Cod Bay, the Chesapeake Bay, and North Carolina's waterways.

We also prioritize workforce development initiatives, particularly those that involve providing specialized training and skills for veterans, youth, and those in trade schools. In 2022, our Foundation invested in a retreat center to teach personal dimensions of leadership to business professionals, students, and tradespeople, and funded a workforce development program to help 240 disadvantaged people in the Seattle area to develop their talents, among other projects.

In addition to focusing on WASH and workforce development, our Foundation made many other significant contributions to provide arts education for young people, transportation for after school programming, healthcare for infants with cleft lip and palate, emergency services for battered women, and an app in India to connect orphans with families quicker and with greater success.

It is with gratitude for our blessings that we are pleased to participate in the experience of philanthropy and share these acts with future generations.

Keys Heights Progress Report

We are grateful to the Palmer Foundation for helping to make this project happen.

Thanks to a land donation, we are underway building four 3 bedroom, 2 bath affordable housing units located at 88670 Overseas Highway. This project will provide housing for 4 families, including: a Monroe County Tax Collector employee, a Monroe County teacher, a local wedding planner, an a long time Keys family. The donation from the Palmer Foundation has helped to make the American dream a reality for these four families.

We are excited to report the progress of the Keys Heights Project is underway and on the projected path to meet all target dates, as well as the projected budget. Globally, there are major delays in production of materials and deliveries due to the pandemic, but we are fortunate to hav successfully reached our goals and our forecasted budget. We are scheduled to complete construction in March 2022.




Financial Highlights
