Shall the legal voters of the Lincoln School District authorize the School Board of Directors to expend \$4,927,939.57, which is the amount the School Board of Directors has determined to be necessary for the 2024-2025 school year?

Board Priorities



- Elementary Education: Continuity of adult/child interactions at Lincoln Community
 School that build strong relationships and trust essential to a safe and creative
 learning environment
- Secondary Education: Engage and support Lincoln families and students so they are able to make informed and appropriate choices
- Academic opportunities and systems that facilitate and support all learners
- District business office: Continue to build strong and sustainable operational structures that reflect new district-level Prek-12 responsibilities
- Community: Support and encourage programs that align with our deep sense of connection and the empowering possibilities of small, community-based schools
- **Voters**: The collective will of Lincoln voters brought LSD into existence for the benefit of all. A core district responsibility is crafting a responsible budget that is true to our values, respects our capacities, and is affordable for taxpayers.



FY25 Budget: Investing in our Values

- Ensuring continuity of programming and services while assuming new district and supervisory requirements
- New grades 1-2 multi-age classroom teacher, to respect class-size guidelines given anticipated increase in enrollment and distribution changes
- Facilities and tuition contingency planning, to promote operational stability
- Establishing an onsite, locally managed food program that produces nutritious, tasty meals and nurtures community connections



FY25 Budget: State and Federal Elements

- State categorical grants, Title 2, IDEA-B
- Increases in health insurance (~16.4%), cost of living expenses
- Program requirements: e.g., management of food program/reimbursements, universal PreK
- Vermont's education funding system: changes to pupil weighting levels and included categories; Act 127 tax phase-in mechanism

Factors That Determine Lincoln's Homestead Tax Rate

- Adopted School District Budget
- New Pupil Weights (Act 127)
- Property Tax Yield
- Homestead Rate Discount (H.850)
- Common Level of Appraisal (CLA)

Calculations updated using new property yield estimate (VT JFO, 2/15/24) and new Homestead rate discount (H.850, 2/22/24.)
• H.850 repeals 5% homestead tax cap (Act 127)

Update on Town-wide Reappraisal and CLA



Why/how it's different this year:

From the **VT Tax Department's Property Valuation and Review 2024 Annual Report:** In the year that a town updates their Grand List values and completes a reappraisal, they will receive a recalculated CLA for the purposes of setting their education property tax rates, per 32 V.S.A. § 5406(c).

Also, from the VT Tax Department Education **Tax Rate Calculations FAQs** page: **My town is completing a reappraisal this year. What will our Common Level of Appraisal (CLA) be and what will happen to my tax bill?**

In a reappraisal year, the CLA for a town is calculated differently. If the Director of Property Valuation and Review has certified that a town has completed a town-wide reappraisal, the common level of appraisal (CLA) for that town is equal to its new grand list value from the reappraisal divided by its most recent equalized grand list value for purposes of determining education property tax rates.
