

The Storytelling/Storyacting Process of Vivian Gussin Paley

- 1. Set up a story table with paper, crayons, etc. Even just a clipboard works!
- 2. Choose a scribe- someone who will write down children's stories.
- 3. Tell the children that the storytelling/storyacting center is open.
- 4. The scribe writes down exactly what the child says. Clarifying questions are o.k, but only the children's own words are recorded.
- 5. When the storyteller is done, the scribe should underline each character (this can include trees, cars, rainbows...whatever images make it into the story).
- 6. Act out stories the same day they are dictated.
- 7. Bring all the children into the "story circle;" a "stage" marked with masking tape is inside the large circle.
- 8. The author of the first story joins the teacher and picks which character s/he wants to be. The teacher then chooses other children who will play the rest of the roles and they enter the stage area.
- 9. The teacher gives the children a cue that the storyplay is about to begin (something as simple as a clap pattern, or "3, 2, 1, Story Play Begins, ACTION!").
- 10. The teacher then reads the story as the children act it out on the stage.
- 11. When the story is over, the teacher says "The End," or some other phrase that cues the children that this story is over.
- 12. The actors and author return to their seats. The next author is called up and the process repeats itself.
