Elevating Education Success Toolkit

- <u>Legal Center for Foster Care & Education</u>: The Legal Center for Foster Care and Education, a project of the American Bar Association's Center on Children and the Law, is a centralized source of information on foster care and education across the country. Their resources on updated federal guidance to support the educational success and stability of students in foster care, including summaries and short videos, can be found <u>here</u>.
- <u>Treehouse Pre-K High School Academic Resources</u>: A collection of educational resources for students, caregivers, educators and more, created by Treehouse in Washington State.
- <u>Comprehensive Education Toolkit for Youth who are Systems Involved</u> (2025): This toolkit, created by the Alliance for Children's Rights in California, compiles three prior toolkits (for youth, court and legal partners, and school districts) and covers the rights of youth who are systems involved and their education rights holders, school stability, enrollment, credits and graduation, and school discipline.
- <u>Foster Love Project Black Hair Care Resources:</u> This page is designed to equip adults caring for black children around hair care. Hair care can deeply impact the confidence and self-esteem of young people in care and their ability to attend and engage in school.
- <u>Authentic Story Telling Toolkit: Supporting Young People in Sharing their Truth</u> (Juvenile Law Center, 2022): This is a toolkit for those working with youth to share their stories in youth-friendly and culturally competent ways.

• **Connect with peers using the** FosterClub app. On this app, you can access programs and exchange tools and tips with people who get where you've been. You can also find opportunities and events, including live meetups and workshops.

- <u>Transition Toolkit (FosterClub)</u>: FosterClub's Transition Toolkit is designed for foster youth aging out of care. The toolkit includes planning worksheets, record keeping, detailed maps, and resources.
- <u>Campus-Based College Support Program Guide</u> (National Research Collaborative for Foster Alumni & Higher Education): This guide is a living document on campus-based support programs across the U.S., including information for each state about tuition waivers, ETVs, and other programs to support youth with foster care experience pursue higher education.

The Guide is a project of the <u>Trauma and Learning Policy</u> <u>Initiative</u> (a collaboration between Massachusetts Advocates for Children and Harvard Law School), which houses <u>tools and resources</u> on creating traumasensitive schools.

SHARING INFORMATION:

Educational Information Sharing – What School Staff Need to Know (ABA Center on Children and the Law, 2025): This guide, part of a larger National Data Toolkit, clarifies which parties may access information and records and when to consult with the child welfare agency to ensure student privacy rights are protected.
