#### Jewish Art is Repairing The World

It's been a long journey getting here. When Todd, Becca and I started putting this festival together we were daunted by the work in front of us. How would we get it all done? Where would the money come from? How would the structure be built? It seemed we had set out up Everest with very light packs.

We started the climb, one foot in front of the other, because this is important. Jewish art is important to me and to the world. I am a Jew by Choice, and without JFest I don't think I would have discovered this truth about myself; my life is so much fuller for it. I also truly believe we are doing the work of *tikkun ha'olam* (repairing the world). It saddens me that antisemitism is on the rise, as is hate against many marginalized peoples. I can think of no better way to combat that than through art. Through art we find that we all are attuned to music, we all see ourselves in the person on stage, and we all see that we share a common experience of strife, suffering, and love.

You, reading this, are repairing the world. You are as much a part of this art as anyone on stage. The time you took to get here, the money you spent on a ticket, the donation you may have given...the art cannot be done without you. Now we all will sit in the dark together and breath the same air as the people on stage. In this moment, we are one, we are making art happen, and by doing so we are standing against hate and ignorance.

I am deeply grateful to be part of this festival. I'm grateful to Todd Salovey, Doug Jacobs, Sam Woodhouse and the San Diego Rep family for starting it. I am grateful to the Lawrence Family Jewish Community Center for giving us the structure we needed. I am grateful to the donors and ticket buyers who allowed us to put this all together. I am grateful to you, for being here and sharing this experience, breathing this air. I don't know if I've ever been more grateful than I am today.

Thank you, thank you, thank you. It cannot be said enough.

#### From the Associate Producer

The Whole Megillah is "Unapologetically Jewish"

In 2008, I had my first foray into professional theatre acting. *Blessing of a Broken Heart* was a new play performed in The Lipinsky Family Jewish Arts Festival, directed by Todd Salovey. During that very special process, I connected with theatre artists that have since become lifelong collaborators and friends. As a newly bat-mitzvah-ed 12 year old, I definitely thought I knew how the theatrical process should be run and, like Bottom in *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, I wanted to play all the parts–and not just onstage. I was ready to single handedly act, direct, stage manage, and produce the whole thing. I even started to offer Todd my unsolicited directorial input during rehearsals to which he patiently responded: "Becca, I've got this one handled – I'll bring you on as the director for the tour." The show went on tour. So then Todd changed his refrain: "I've got the tour handled too – we'll get you on board for the feature film." I'm still waiting for that phone call.

That project lit a spark for me, igniting a love of theatre that will last my entire life, and particularly a love of new Jewish work. When Todd approached me with a suggestion that maybe I'd want to create a new festival from scratch within the JFest umbrella, I knew exactly what I wanted to focus on: workshopping and giving voice to new Jewish work. I've been so lucky to get to spend the last three years scouring the country for new Jewish work towards selection for our new works festival: *The Whole Megillah*. The Whole Megillah is a passion project for me and has been vastly different each year, with one guiding principle: we put on plays that are "unapologetically Jewish". The national landscape of Jewish theatre is growing and evolving, and we are so lucky to be right at the forefront of making it happen. Little did I know as a twelve year old in that first production in JFest that this festival and new Jewish theatre would become such an integral part of my creative life. Every year, JFest and *The Whole Megillah* get bigger and better, with more moving parts and more people touched by the amazing projects we get the opportunity to produce. I've grown into an artist with JFest, and I can't wait to see where this journey goes next.

#### Ali Viterbi (Director) Statement about what the show means to her:

I started writing *Women of Valor* when I was 15 years old. I am now 30, so this project has been with me for half my life. I couldn't be more grateful. Working on *Women of Valor* year after year has shaped who I am as an artist, as a woman, and as a Jew.

Over the past 15 years, I have had the privilege to interview and share the stories of 94 remarkable women in the San Diego Jewish community. Each of the 94 strong, committed, and passionate women have inspired me to pursue a life of Jewish service and meaning. They have given me wisdom in dark times and gratitude in joyful times; and through their example, have taught me how to overcome adversity, honor our past, and build a better future in community.

This year's women are no different. We are honored this year to share the stories of six remarkable women and pillars of the San Diego Jewish community: Sheila Lipinsky, Beth Sirull, Amelia Glaser, Annie Benaroch, Jan Landau, and Fanny Krasner Lebovits. Fanny was previously honored as a Woman of Valor 13 years ago in 2010, but this year's performance features a new piece of her remarkable story in honor of her 100th birthday.

Thank you so much for being here, and I hope the stories of these incredible women in our community inspire you too.



### Festival Keynote: Judaism and Art Rabbi Meir Soloveitchik

Monday, June 5 at 7:30pm | Congregation Adat Yeshurun, La Jolla

Rabbi Dr. Meir Y. Soloveichik is one of the world's preeminent Jewish thinkers and educators, and he's one of America's most influential religious leaders. He is the senior rabbi of Congregation Shearith Israel in Manhattan, the oldest Jewish congregation in the United States. He is also director of the Zahava and Moshael Straus Center for Torah and Western Thought at Yeshiva University. Rabbi Soloveichik has lectured internationally to Jewish and non-Jewish audiences on topics relating to faith in America, the Hebraic roots of the American founding, Jewish theology, bioethics, wartime ethics, Jewish-Christian relations, and more. He writes a monthly column in Commentary magazine, and his writing has appeared in the Wall Street Journal, the New York Times, Mosaic, First Things, Azure, Tradition, the Jewish Review of Books, and many other outlets. Rabbi Soloveichik is a descendent of one of the Jewish world's great rabbinic dynasties. He graduated summa cum laude from Yeshiva University, received his rabbinic ordination from the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary, and studied at its Beren Kollel Elyon. He has also studied at Yale Divinity School, and in 2010, received his doctorate in religion from Princeton University.

Congregation Adat Yeshurun is a vibrant Jewish community in the heart of La Jolla ("The Jewel"). Our membership is diverse, coming from many different countries and backgrounds, blending together to create a welcoming atmosphere of caring and spiritual growth. Not all of our members come from an Orthodox background, but we all come to Adat Yeshurun to grow spiritually and intellectually, and to increase our understanding of Judaism and what it means to be an observant Jew. The community was started 30 years ago by Rabbi Jeffrey and Shoshie Wohlgelernter and now consists of approximately 250 families. Rabbi Daniel and Brooke Reich are the Rabbi and Rebbetzin of the Congregation.

### Perla Batalla in *House of Cohen:*The Songs of Leonard Cohen

Thursday, June 15 at 7:30pm | The Lawrence Family JCC

In 2015, Grammy nominated singer Perla Batalla began pondering songs to include in a followup CD to her 2007 tribute release to friend and mentor Leonard Cohen. As a longtime singer and touring band member with the legendary songwriter, Perla knew there was much of Cohen's body of work she still wanted to perform and record.

Batalla's first Cohen CD, "Bird on the Wire" was produced with Leonard's blessing; he attended the recording session, weighed-in on material, arrangements, and uncharacteristically participated in a photo session at his Los Angeles home to promote the project.

Cohen's passing in November 2016 reaffirmed Batalla's mission of sharing the lesser-known songs of Canada's poet laureate. She also wanted to dispel the too common mischaracterization of Cohen as "The Godfather of Gloom".

Perla Batalla selected songs and rare personal anecdotes that serve to reveal Cohen's lighter side (like Mr. Cohen's deep affection for the .99 Cent Store and his delight at dining on hot dogs at Home Depot). Perla reveals the timelessness of Cohen's art through her signature crosscultural style, to convey her sincere respect and deep love for the music, the poetry, and most of all for her dear friend, Leonard Cohen.

"I feel that the coming together of voices has the power to touch Leonard's spirit and his lifelong devotion to art and the mysteries of the human heart. Live music is about being in the moment, and I always have this secret expectation that as we lift our voices up together we will feel Leonard all around us."

theatre dybbuk creates provocative new works that blend physical theatre with poetry and music for exciting, utterly singular live events. The company explores the rich world of Jewish history, building lyrical performances that illuminate universal human experience for contemporary audiences.



With an in-depth development process that can range from a few months to three years, Artistic Director Aaron Henne builds each piece with a cast of dedicated professional actors, designers, musicians, and scholars. The resulting works, from the dark and visceral dance theatre of cave... a dance for lilith to the shadowy and immersive hell prepared: a ritual exorcism inspired by kabbalistic principles, performed within a dominant cultural context, are challenging and beautiful to behold.

about *The Merchant of Venice (Annotated), or In Sooth I Know Not Why I Am So Sad*: This multidisciplinary production brings together elements of William Shakespeare's *The Merchant of Venice* with Elizabethan history and news from the 21st century to expose the underbelly of the classic play, taking a kaleidoscopic view of the ways in which members of a society displace their fears on the "other" during times of upheaval.

The show's presentation at The Lipinsky Family San Diego Jewish Arts Festival is part of a rolling world premiere which began in Los Angeles and will continue at the Oshman Family JCC in the San Francisco Bay Area. The show will then tour to additional metropolitan areas including Portland, Oregon and Baltimore, Maryland.

"Anti-Semitism has real impact beyond just hate crimes. It distorts our understanding of how the actual world works. It isolates us. It alienates us from our communities, from our neighbors, and from participating in governance. It kills, but it also kills our society. Anti-Semitism isn't just bigotry toward the Jewish community. It is actually utilizing bigotry toward the Jewish community in order to deconstruct democratic practices, and it does so by framing democracy as a conspiracy rather than a tool of empowerment or a functional tool of governance."



Curtis was the creator of the San Diego Folk Festival and the Adams Avenue Roots Festival, an audiophile, folklorist, author, raconteur, radio host, and proprietor of Folk Arts Rare Records. His shop was a mecca for some of the most celebrated American roots musicians in America, such as Jack Tempchin, Tom Brousseau, A.J. Croce, Mojo Nixon, George Winston, Sue Palmer, Alison Brown, Tomcat Courtney, Tom Waits, Gregory Page, Mike Seeger, Sam Hinton, and many others who were profoundly influenced in their careers and lives by Lou.

His influence on musicians who flocked to his shop extends far beyond this corner of the world (today the shop is located at 3610 University Ave. San Diego, CA 92104 under the visionary leadership of Lou's protege, Brendan Boyle).

**Park & Market** brings UC San Diego downtown—in a glorious new state of the art building in East Village. Here, experts, community leaders, artists, entrepreneurs, and visionaries will mingle and confer—welcoming you into the mix.

### Chagall



Thursday, July 6 at 7:30pm | The Dea Hurston New Village Arts Center

This play written by Yale Strom & Todd Salovey with music and songs by Yale Strom depicts the lives of the Chagall's before they left their homes in Vitebsk, Russia and moved to France. This reminiscing takes place during the German occupation of France during WWII. Slowly and steadily the Chagall's are caught up in the dragnet where all the Jews of France are being imprisoned then deported to concentration camps to the East.

Yale Strom has always loved the work of the artist Marc Chagall, in particular its innate Jewishness and capturing of shtetl life. This project's journey began in 2009 as a ballet; since then, and over the course of several workshops, it has evolved into a full theatrical musical, encompassing dialogue, characters, song and dance. In 2019, Strom began to develop the story with Todd Salovey. They wanted to tell the story not only of Chagall but of his partner and muse Bella Chagall. The story's arc includes their daughter, Ida, American Varian Fry and Chagall's creation and alter-ego, the Green Fiddler. The play is set in April 1941 in Gordes, France, now under Germans occupation with the eager collaboration of the fascist Vichy government. Despite the deportation of Jews from France and other European countries, the Chagalls are reluctant to abandon their village in southern France. They think they have time and can tolerate living under the increasingly antisemitic restrictions. But Varian Fry, under the auspices of the Emergency Rescue Committee (supported by Eleanor Roosevelt among others) and Vice Consul Hiram Bingham IV have already begun to get "celebrity" visas to escape and come to America. The Chagalls confront a new, worse peril as they reflect on their lives in Vitebsk. in France and the unknown future. What will it be in a strange new country where they don't speak the language? What will become of their life's works? What will they be as refugees in a new world? Music from the Green Fiddler, songs sung by the cast and Chagall's own artistic vision help to tell this fascinating story, one that has become relevant to contemporary life.

The piece takes place between June 1940 and August 1944.







