



## Chief Executive Officer's Report

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### 1. Introduction

In addition to ‘business as usual’ issues, we have been focusing on key deliverables, including:

- Wrapping up BCLP programme, including reporting and audit requirements
- Executing CSIRO ‘Circular Economy’ project
- Organising conference
- Working on financials
- Following up on previous motions and preparing motions for the AGM

### 2. Basin Community Leadership Program

In March, we were able to fulfil our commitment re The Basin Community Leadership Program (BCLP) with Face-to-Face Workshops in a COVID-19-safe environment.

Participants completed the MDA Academy Online Training prior to attending the face-to-Face workshops. The Online Academy covers five modules including: Leadership Theory; Water Literacy and Communicating with Impact.

The MDA worked in partnership with LGA’s to support the community, boost the local economy and encourage trade in small businesses. Whilst we have completed the proposed workshops as planned, there is potential to conduct further workshops with targeted community groups.

As part of the programme, we may be eligible for further funding having now completed our requirements as well as all requisite reporting. In addition to all reporting, a financial audit was required. This was completed and submitted before the end of financial year. (ie June 2022)

### 3. CSIRO and the Circular Economy

CSIRO Land and Water has partnered with MDA to investigate and explore a series of strategic growth areas that align with the biggest land and water challenges faced by Australian governments/agencies, industries, and communities. These growth areas will build on capabilities and that of our partners and transform the boundaries of the types of products, research projects and services we might collaborate on.

They have identified Repurposing Waste / Circular Economy as a strategic growth area, and we are interested in validating this with LGA's as a valued partner. We would like to understand more about how LGA's work within the repurposing waste / circular economy area within their organisation. They are also keen to hear about any future aspirations they might have in regard to infrastructure solutions they need now and into the future. To capture these insights. We completed a series of meetings in May and June that will help inform the future of this growth area and ensure they can design solutions that are of value for all. We will be presenting to CSIRO Directors on 20<sup>th</sup> July.
