

Permaculture Plants (With contributions from Natalie Bogwalker & Cailen Campbell)

Definition: Plants that provide a relatively high output, providing multiple functions and elements, while requiring relatively few inputs. They consider the ecology of the surrounding area and serve beyond the human world.

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The list of useful and important plants in the world is incredibly long. Not all of those plants made it onto this list, so that we could go into more detail with some that we more commonly include in our cultivated landscapes. Some of the plants not included are plants that we harvest regularly from the forest but don't tend to plant. We'd like to tip our hats to some of these valiant and helpful friends: Tulip Poplar, White Oak, Hickory, White Pine, Beech, Black Locust, Redbud, Black Walnut, Sugar Maple, Hemlock, Hawthorn, Jujube, Medlar, Quince, Spicebush, Spikenard, Perennial Leeks, Spiderwort, Smilax, and many more dear friends!




