Stewardship, Finance and Budget Presentation

The financial report was reviewed by Controller Erin Sacco. 2022 ended with a net operating surplus of about \$14,000.00, which will be earmarked for Maintenance Reserves. The 2023 budget was then

presented. This budget includes a 7% cost of living increase for lay staff and clergy as recommended by the diocese. Questions from members were answered.

Financial Report

The following summarizes the financial results for St. Andrew's for 2023 as well as the budget adopted by Vestry for 2024.

2023 Operating Income & Expenses

Due primarily to generous giving, St. Andrew's operating surplus for 2023 was \$66,050. Pledge giving was 103% of the budget and other contributions (including plate, special gifts, and special service offerings) was 120% of budget. Other Contribution income of \$134,671 includes a multi-year pledge to support clergy compensation at the rate of \$50,000 for five years. This special gift and the generosity of the whole community is supporting the church's ability to support two full-time clergy. The Diocese has also been making a financial contribution to St. Andrew's to support the second clergy position. The great result from 2023 of \$66,050 surplus has given Vestry the opportunity to set aside funds as a reserve to support the second clergy position through 2025.

Capital Campaign/Construction Loan

During 2023 the church collected \$34,310 of campaign commitments which allowed us to make an extra principal payment on the loan of \$32,000. Following the extra principal payment, we had the loan reamortized, which

reduces the required monthly payment. To expedite payoff of the loan, we have continued to make payments of \$1,250/month, as budgeted, even though the required monthly payment is now under \$600. The loan balance on December 31, 2023, is \$52,586.


2024 Budget


The 2024 budget reflects a 5% increase in pledges (\$544,746). Facility use and ministry/program income are also expected to increase. We have benefited from substantial Diocesan support and gifts from individual donors in living into the goal of having two full-time clergy. In 2024 we are planning to draw \$53,000 from Vestry reserves to support the operating budget. We also have included transfers from Food Pantry, Showers of Blessings, and Neighborhood Center funds of \$100/month to offset operating cost for utilities.

Where operating expenses are increased from 2023, it generally pertains to staffing changes. The Vestry approved a 4% cost of living adjustment. We will begin living into the cost of two full-time clergy in August 2024 when the diocesan support ends. Associate clergy time is allocated to Outreach & Mission, Worship & Fellowship, and Pastoral Care. Christian Formation has increased due to personnel changes. Buildings & Grounds have increased due to contracted labor (e.g., yard maintenance), utilities, and insurance.

Report from the Rector 2023

The Reverend Brenda Sol

Dear Ones,

This past year at St. Andrew's has been full of love, light and learning. We have been the recipients of kindness—financially and through people being willing to serve—and of wonderful surprises. All of which has brought a sense of renewal to our worship, fellowship, facilities, and neighborhood programs, as well as to our staff.

Through our Legacy Society, some long-time members bequeathed us a third of their estate. The two large contributions we received allowed us to complete the following projects and will soon provide for a few more, including resurfacing our parking lot.

- Renovating the sound system in the church building
- Building permanent storage enclosures in the Parish Hall (it takes a lot of supplies to provide 200+ families with food each week!)
- Repainting the walls of the entire Nave
- Changing out all the light bulbs in the Nave
- Replacing both outdated HVAC systems that provide heat and A/C to the church building (this included a much-needed roof repair)
- Expanding our Godly Play curriculum for the little ones
- Upgrading our website to create greater access and more welcome

Additionally, an anonymous gift of \$50K annually (we're in our third year of a five-year promise) allows us to continue our commitment of having a second clergy person on our team. These contributions have been rounded out by new members pledging at a much higher percentage than national rates of newcomers. Although some of us might worry we talk too much about money for a church, all of this is a sign that people see the impact we are having in people's lives (in and around the parish). We are a trusted place in which to invest, because we are, indeed, living out our call to be God's hands, feet, voice and heart in the world!

Another component of our success in 2023 has been the amazing team of staff members who support us. They are all dedicated to the St. Andrew's mission, and are a creative, collaborative bunch. This past year, with the help of the diocesan curacy program, we were also able to bring on board the Rev. Dawn Stary. In her full-time position, Mother Dawn is dedicated to supporting our community engagement ministries.

Other highlights for our community included our parish-wide "Savor Party" (see description in the "Stewardship" report below), a number of lively outdoor worship services that included baptism, and watching our courtyard become the community hub we envisioned. The campus is well-used, not only by the guests we serve through the Showers, Breakfasts, Mail Program and Food Pantry, but by our neighbors who play with their children on the labyrinth and chase their dogs on the lawn.

There is so much more I could say about this healthy, vital and vibrant place we call St. Andrew's, but space is limited, so I'll end with a HUGE thank you to all of you and the ways you contribute your time, talent, treasure and love. I appreciate you all!

Altar Guild

Altar Guild is the group that regularly takes care of setting up the altar for the various services held throughout the week and on Sundays, ensuring that there is an adequate stock of necessary supplies, and maintaining the supplies and equipment in good order. There are currently four teams who serve once a month during their team's assigned weekend. This year we have welcomed Kim Hogan as the cleanup person on the fourth Sunday of each month. Due to other commitments Ann Zavotsky and Betsy Vaughn have stepped down, we are grateful for all that they did for Altar Guild. We are grateful for all our faithful members, especially our team leaders, Lorraine Gritzen, Jill Svendsen and Bonnie Reichle. There are still a few areas where we could use some additional members so if you have a few spare hours once a month please let me know, everyone is welcome to check out the altar guild sacristy and see where the "behind the scenes" work happens.

As well as having a budget line item the Altar Guild income is generated through memorial giving in the form of donations, flower donations as a memorial or in thanksgiving for a special occasion. We are extremely thankful for all these donations.

Expenses include consumables such as weekly altar flowers, communion wafers and wine, sanctuary lights, candle oil, and such. Other expenses, which are not regularly occurring, include replacement or repair of broken or damaged items such as crystal cruets, chalices, worn linens, and seasonal expenses occurring at Christmas and Easter.

We are always happy to add new members to our ministry. Please prayerfully consider whether or not this ministry might be a good fit for your time and talents. The Alternative Liturgy Committee

This committee was formed in August 2022, and as our first meeting, we gathered for dinner church at the home of Carolyn Lee and Julian Betts. This committee was formed to offer creative ways to engage in prayer outside of our typical BCP liturgical format. We have had several offerings since 2022, including Mother Heather's re-imaging of the Advent Light & Remembrance liturgy in December of 2023. The Alternative Liturgy Committee began meeting again in December 2023 and agreed to work on creating a dinner church liturgy that will begin in 2024. The group is also considering exploring other forms of alternative liturgy for 2024.

Adult Education

The weekly Deep Dive Book Group continued to be our longest running Adult Education forum. Five to ten participants met weekly to discuss books that challenged us to examine, dig deeper, and, at times, reimagine our relationships with God, the church, and the world. The group is open to seekers, questioners, thinkers, readers, and talkers wherever they find themselves on their faith journey. Because the group is online, we are happy to welcome participants from outside St. Andrew's.

We began the year with the classic, "The Little Prince," and spent the summer meandering through the bible with Rachel Held Evans' "Slaying Giants." We expanded the community of voices this year by reading works from Indigenous author, Steven Charlston, African writer, Enuma Okoro, and Jewish Rabbi, Danya Ruttenberg.

Our Second Sunday Salon forum was successfully launched in June, offering monthly in-depth discussions about topics that ran the gamut from religious art and poetry to Indigenous People's Day and gratitude. The discussions have been thoughtful, lively, and well attended.

We provided Lenten and Advent calendars and devotionals to support faith-at-home practices, and again offered an intergenerational communion class along with an adult confirmation program. This year we also added an intergenerational personal advent wreath making event.

We concluded the Sacred Ground circle that began in 2022 and offered participants the opportunity to join the continuing discussions of the circles that finished prior. We are partnering with the diocese to provide circles when there is interest and facilitator availability. Please contact me if you are interested in joining or facilitating a future circle.

I am incredibly grateful for Michael Reichle and Catherine Campbell, whose efforts are the foundation of our Adult Education program. I am also grateful to Gigi Miller for her invaluable assistance with the intergenerational communion class, Sacred Ground circle, and Advent wreath making. Children and Families Ministry

Beginning the year with a permanent classroom gave our Sunday School teachers and volunteers a welcome bit of post-pandemic stability. This allowed them to focus all their energy on creating a safe and friendly environment that nurtures all our children in the love and light of God. A bequest allowed us to purchase supplemental materials rounding out our Godly Play curriculum with several Saint's stories and two foundational sacred stories. Thanks to a

generous gift from a parishioner, we were also able to introduce an enhanced art response time to our Godly Play program that delighted our students.

Because of an increase in the number of older children, we turned the Sunday School supply room into another classroom and introduced a new 5th/6th grade class. This class, called Holy Troublemakers, focuses on people of diverse faiths working for more love and justice in the world.

Our regular Sunday School program serves children ages 4 through 6th grade but, for the Summer, we invited everyone ages 2 and up into a relaxed art-based program focused on kindness. During this "summer of kindness", we played kindness bingo, drew sidewalk chalk murals for the parish, brainstormed kindness ideas, and celebrated with an ice cream social at the end.

We sent two Godly play teachers to their second diocesan Godly Play training, making them eligible for more advanced Godly Play training in August. We also welcomed a new assistant, Nick Dunstan, who joined our team in September. I continue to be grateful that the people of St. Andrew's recognize nurturing our children in the light of God is a whole parish activity.

Our children were active in worship leading our pop-up Epiphany and Easter pageants and, of course, our Nativity pageant on Christmas Eve—for which we were able to bring back the tradition of a live baby Jesus. The children also took a special role during baptisms, sprinkling the congregation to remind them of their baptismal vows, and they were active participants in our prayer stations. I give special thanks to Gigi Miller who went above and beyond to help make the pageant a not-quite chaotic spectacle of joy and love.

We continued to provide families with faith-at-home resources including family prayer jars, Lenten and Advent devotionals and calendars, Holy Week activities, and prayers for the 12 days of Christmas. We hosted a children's art area during the Art Show and Chili Cookoff and gave children an opportunity to make their own Advent wreaths at our well attended intergenerational wreath making event.

The children and their families participated in several family days of service, and our Sunday School Planning and Support committee continued to meet to help improve and refine our program. We partnered with Bethlehem Lutheran again this year for VBS, adding a day to the program and welcoming the participation of St. Andrew's youth and parents in our space themed week. We continued to work with the diocese hosting a diocesan-wide meeting of children and youth ministers and participating in planning sessions and retreats.

Building on the strength of our teachers, volunteers, and parents, we continue to reimagine and grow our programs under the guiding principle of creating a safe, welcoming environment for all children to grow in God's light and share it with the world. I am especially grateful to our Storytellers, Christie Hamel, Barbara Chung, Julian Betts, and Gigi Miller, and our assistants, Nick Dunstan, Lola Hubble, Colette Rossow, Jacob Super, and Jeane Quentin. I am also grateful to Virginia Bradley for her support of our art-response efforts and Debbie Hickson for creating beautiful materials for our classroom. You don't have to have a child in Sunday School to support our community's youngest members. Community Meal Ministry

The Community Meals Ministry continues to nourish the bodies and souls of all who come through the Parish Hall doors on Saturday mornings. In conjunction with services offered by Showers of Blessings and the Neighborhood Center, we provide warm smiles and listening hearts along with a full breakfast of bacon, eggs, pancakes, hashbrowns, fruit, and cereal.

In 2023, we served an average of 50 folks each Saturday. Our ministry is staffed by over 35 gracious volunteers, who give of their time and talent and work in teams of 6 or 7. Each team, one for each Saturday, is guided by 5 wonderful team leads. We also maintain a "stand by" list of over 10 volunteers, who generously fill in at a moment's notice in case of regular team members' illness or travel.

The Community Meals Ministry is intergenerational and includes volunteers of all ages. In 2023, members of our Sunday School participated Family Days of Service, and our joint St. Andrew's/Bethlehem Lutheran Youth Group cooked, served, and cleaned up on the Saturday after Thanksgiving. Our volunteers come from all over the North County coastal community, including the Encinitas Coastal Rotary Club, Bethlehem Lutheran Church, and Boy Scout Troop 777.

Continuing our tradition of offering a community Thanksgiving dinner, over 30 volunteers worked tirelessly to prepare and serve turkey, stuffing, and all the fixings to 35 folks. Just like last year, The North Coast Aquatics team provided the turkeys and the bulk of ingredients for the meal, while other volunteers brought pies and sides.

The Community Meals Ministry receives generous donations from several different sources, including the Encinitas Coastal Rotary Club and St. Andrew's Giving Tuesday. This year, we replaced the dishwasher to the gratitude of all volunteers and look forward to replacing the convection ovens and steam table in 2024!

Food was a crucial part of Jesus' ministry – from the wedding feast at Canaan, to the feeding of the multitudes, to the Last Supper, to His offering of breakfast to His disciples. By God's grace, Jesus himself became food for the spiritually hungry. "I am the Bread of life" (John 6:35) he says and reminds us that "blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness for they will be fed" (Matthew 5:6). When we gather at the breakfast table, we are nourished by God's presence in good food and fellowship. When we come to the altar, we partake of bread and wine, and remember Jesus' call to build God's kingdom on earth. Truly, as Mary sings in Luke 1:53, God "will feed the hungry with good things."

Coffee Hour/Fellowship

Fellowship takes many forms at St. Andrew's, including the Men's Hiking Group, Art and Soul, Deep Dive Book Group, XYZs and Aging Gracefully, Young Adult Bible Study, and Women's Spiritual Formation, among others. On Sundays at 11:00, parishioners join together during Coffee Hour in our welcoming courtyard, meeting and greeting, and making those important social and church business connections with each other. The Coffee Hour Ministry continues to be blessed with support from generous parishioners who provide delicious food trays for potluck events, and beautiful cakes for baptism celebrations. Faith in Action

Faith in Action (FIA) was established as a St. Andrews ministry in 2019 with a vision to live out our faith beyond the confines of our church family. Over the years, the St. Andrews community has served our neighbors through ministries such as the weekly Food Pantry, Interfaith Shelter, Community Meal, and Showers of Blessings programs. The mission of FIA complements these activities by looking to understand and address the root causes creating the need for outreach programs in our community, while also addressing gaps in services to our most vulnerable neighbors. The Neighborhood and Education Center is an outgrowth of the work of FIA, specifically created to provide those services lacking in our area. Helping us is SDOP (San Diego Organizing Project), an interfaith community organizing organization in San Diego County. As members of SDOP, our ministry receives help in our work, while building relationships with and supporting fellow SDOP members in their goals.

Some highlights from FIA this past year:

- Held its annual meeting in August to discuss goals for the upcoming year.
- Created a new mission statement:
- Organized an open house on January 16th for potential new members from St. Andrew's and other FiA affiliated churches.
- Began submitting monthly updates to the eBlast
- Continued relationship with County Supervisor Terra Lawson-Remer's office
- Offered support for various city, county, and statewide propositions
- Continued meetings and headway regarding affordable housing in Encinitas
- Continued our working relationship with SDOP (San Diego Organizing Project)

Food Pantry

We served between 200-225 families, seniors, and homeless each week. We were extremely lucky to have two new storage rooms built that hold all the canned and dry goods. Each week we set up tables and the clients choose what they need. Additional things to know include the following:

- We have vegan and gluten-free clients and provide food for them as well.
- We have been a part of the Fresh Rescue Program with Feeding San Diego and the San Diego Food Bank for many years. This program involves supermarkets donating food that they pull off the shelves, such as produce, bread, desserts, dairy, prepared salads, and meals. We are contracted with Gelson's, Sprouts, Vons, Aldi's and Prager's.
- We pick up produce and canned goods every Wednesday from the San Diego Food Bank. Produce is free and everything else is available for 19 cents per pound.
- San Diego Food Bank also provides diapers, which are given out weekly.

• All together we have approximately 50 amazing volunteers that donate 120 hours each week to sourcing the food, setting up for distribution, manning the distribution day and conducting administrative tasks. Our volunteers include missionaries from the Mormon church, students, members of the community, Bethlehem Lutheran, as well as St. Andrew's.

Mail Service

The mail service we provide at Saint Andrews is well used and growing. In October 2023 we asked our mail service clients to renew their agreement to continue to receive mail at Saint Andrew. We purged all the old agreements in January. As of January 6th, we now have 55 renewed, active agreements.

Most of the mail our clients receive at Saint Andrews comes from places like Social Security, the DMV, Medicare or other insurance, and the court system. Folks are very appreciative of having a safe, secure place to receive important paperwork.

Men's Hiking Group

On the second and fourth Sunday of each month, the men's hiking group meets at 1 PM at one of many north county trails. On these hikes, we get fresh air, exercise, make new friendships and renew old friendships. We often discuss that Sunday's readings or sermons. This a small but really convivial group, and we always welcome new hikers. (For those who are interested: the hikes typically last 90 minutes to two hours, and we usually pick a trail that has a few hundred feet of vertical climb and some beautiful views. Depending on the weather and season, the hike may be near the coast, or in inland valleys or hills. Sometimes we also find a place for a snack afterwards.)

Music Ministry

St. Andrew's Adult Choir provided special anthems and support for congregational hymnsinging throughout 2023. We learned an important lesson from the pandemic interruption that none of us will ever forget: we are truly a family! We treasure every opportunity to be together and raise our voices in song and praise.

Holding a parish singalong in the spring was very successful. Many parishioners enjoyed the opportunity to sing their favorite hymns, and we gained two new choir members as a result. In addition, four others have joined the group, some for big services such as Christmas and Easter, and others as regular participants. For Christmas Eve, there were 17 singers, which is the largest choir we've had for a number of years.

With special music provided by a brass quintet on Easter, as well as a bagpiper and drummer for St. Andrew's Day, our services were festive. Our "house band" that features guitars and percussion performed for outdoor services that were truly joyful, such as St. Francis's Day and the Bishop's Visitation on Pentecost. Music has always been an important facet of St. Andrew's worship, and we can look forward to more special offerings in 2024.

Neighbor to Neighbor Committee

The Neighbor to Neighbor (N2N) committee was created in an effort to craft closer relationships with our immediate neighbors. By inviting our neighbors to St. Andrew's, the N2N committee is working to learn what our neighbors celebrate and what challenges they face here in Encinitas. N2N aspires for St. Andrew's to be a place where neighbors can gather to get to know one another and a place where they can gather to inspire change that benefits our community. The N2N committee has met several times since the fall and plan to host an initial meeting with neighbors in February.

Parish Breakfast Ministry

The Parish Breakfast team has enjoyed preparing parish breakfast after the 10 AM service, typically on the first Sunday of the month. The breakfast team has enjoyed seeing how many people come to these breakfasts. Although the main goal is to deepen the ties in our church community, an important secondary goal is a free-will offering, as people are willing and able. The proceeds from which pay for the breakfast and then help to fund the Saturday morning community breakfast program. (Those who would prefer to give in a way that is tax deductible can contribute online using the Community Breakfast option.)

One of the many joys of participating in this ministry is the ever growing number of people who feel at home in the Parish Hall kitchen. Notable also are the friendships that deepen amidst the inevitable laughter as we work, while enjoying the aromas of bacon in the oven, potatoes on the griddle and eggs on the stove.

We have had almost 20 people volunteer in 2023, and each is free to choose whether to contribute a few minutes of help before the 10 AM service, cooking during service, or cleaning up afterwards. We welcome new participants, and it is fine if new volunteers would like to try it out, or to volunteer in some months but not others. Regardless, you will be helping to weave the fabric of the Saint Andrew's community.

Pastoral Care

The principal function of lay pastoral care is to visit those members of our parish community who are in the hospital or ill or recovering at home. This is something virtually all of us do on an informal basis.

The pastoral care team also takes Holy Communion, on a rotating basis, to those who cannot attend services but desire the comfort of Communion. We currently have 4 Eucharistic Visitors. Mother Brenda and the Eucharistic Visitors made 66 visits, taking Communion to 19 individuals.

If you think this might be a ministry for you, please contact Mother Brenda or Michael Reichle. There is some training required. But this is a highly rewarding ministry providing spiritual care, by Communion and prayer, to those in need.

Prayer Ministry

More than 20 dedicated volunteers pray daily over the names we received. Some prayer requests come to us through our website from people we've never met. Others arrive via a friend of a parishioner, and some originate from parishioners themselves. These requests are kept confidential by the team, but are added by first name to the Sunday bulletin and incorporated into the Prayers of the People during worship. Senior Warden's Report

It has been an honor to serve as Senior Warden since February 2023. When Mother Brenda asked me to serve in this way, for me it was an "easy yes" given the good work that this church is doing and the constructive, empathetic way in which I had seen our vestry work together during my first two years on vestry in 2021 and 2022.

2023 has marked a year of growth and change. We saw Heather Lawrence (now Ma) become ordained and married in the same week (!), and we enjoyed the many ways she served St. Andrew's before joining the Lutheran-Episcopal Campus Ministry at SDSU. She returned and led us musically through a moving and memorable Advent Liturgy of Light and Remembrance in December.

We welcomed our new Assistant Rector, the Rev. Dawn Stary, and her wonderful family. Mother Dawn has already made a mark on our church life, working with the Faith in Action group, providing memorable sermons and leading planning for a possible future dinner church, among many other contributions.

We also welcomed Mindy Bugaj as the Director of Youth Ministry for St. Andrew's and Bethlehem Lutheran Church. In addition to continuing the high school youth group and activities including the annual summer youth service trip, Deacon Mindy has led our new middle school group, another welcome sign of the growth in our ministries.

Many of us attended Pete Martin's ordination late in 2022. In 2023, we benefited greatly from Deacon Pete's contributions to our church, including regular sermons, and his help and pastoral care during our community outreach programs on Saturday mornings. Continuing the theme of growth in our church, Deacon Pete has initiated an online men's bible study group. His "Bible Bros" group regularly draws a group of men from the parish and beyond, and it is clear that we as participants are learning a lot and deepening our faith.

We are blessed with wonderful staff, with Virginia Sublett's expert and fun way of leading and instructing the choir, Erin O'Brien's continual creativity and dedication to Christian education, and Alison Lee's devoted work as Parish Administrator. Jack Deane and Simeon Bruce have also provided help in the office and have shared their considerable musical gifts with the congregation.

We are also blessed with the many volunteers and leaders from within and outside the congregation who contribute so importantly to our many outreach efforts, including the evergrowing Thursday Food Pantry, and the Faith in Action and Showers of Blessings work, among many others. As for vestry, our annual retreat in February was filled with even more joy than usual as we were at last able to hold the retreat in person, as the pandemic receded. During our two days at Mission San Luis Rey, we grew closer as a group. We reviewed the existing plans for our church community and thought hard about future possibilities.

A key theme emerged. We determined to continue to find ways to communicate to the community outside St. Andrew's about the affirming love which we cultivate in our parish. We live in an age when so many are looking for a spiritual home. Some of these seekers may not have been raised in a Christian tradition, and are not sure where to start, or what to expect in an Episcopalian Church. Many others were raised in a Christian tradition but as adults have keenly felt the pain of exclusion and intolerance in some other denominations. With this in mind, the vestry surveyed the welcoming messages of some other churches which we hold in high esteem. We concluded that our welcoming message, although highly welcoming, could be even more inclusive.

Our wonderful staff and some volunteers followed up on this idea, writing the new welcome message you will find on page 2 of each Sunday's bulletin. It makes even clearer that we welcome all, regardless of orientation, identity, belief or affiliation. Similarly, our wonderful Director of Christian Education, Erin O'Brien, deserves kudos for leading a re-design of the St. Andrew's website. Our new website, in addition to providing information in an even more efficient way to potential new members, exudes the sense of warmth and God's love present in our parish. Finally, in the next few weeks, your vestry will take part in an activity I co-designed with Mother Brenda that we are calling "Through the Eyes of a Newcomer". In this activity vestry members will imagine looking at our website, and attending a Sunday service or other church activity, and reflecting on what we could do to make all that we do more accessible, understandable, and welcoming to newcomers.

If the first theme of our vestry retreat was outreach to the community, the second theme was about "inreach", in other words reaching out to each other in the parish, to live out God's wishes for us as a Christian community. As one important part of this work, the congregation embarked on a series of conversations about Becoming an Affirming Congregation, which concludes on January 28. We also look for new ways to engage all parishioners in education activities and volunteer activities, so that St. Andrew's becomes about Sunday, and much, much more.

In conclusion, I would like to thank my fellow vestry members, Mother Brenda, Mother Dawn and Deacon Pete for creating such a positive, forward-looking environment. I finish my year as Senior Warden in awe of the contributions that they and all of you make to create such a vibrant spiritual community. Gigi Miller, who is an exemplar of faith, love and service, will make an extraordinary Senior Warden for our congregation in 2024. May the coming year continue to reveal new ways in which we can serve the broader community, to reach out to that community with the Good News, and to continue to learn, to work and to grow together in our parish.

Service Assistants

Showers of Blessings (SoB) Encinitas/Carlsbad

As we start our 8th year of service, Showers of Blessings (SoB) is a community outreach program which serves those in need every Saturday, including holidays, from 8:30 am to 11:30 am in North Coastal San Diego County, by meeting one of life's most basic human dignitiescleanliness. Each guest is provided a private hot shower, including clean underwear (including bras), socks, and toiletries. Additional services includes snacks, coffee (courtesy of Encinitas Starbucks) and miscellaneous pre-breakfast food items courtesy of Carolyn Lee; book checkout from the SoB library on wheels (drop your unwanted paperbacks in the SoB narthex bin); a professional hairstyle, free of charge; unlimited use of our donated musical instruments (guitars and piano); and clean, donated clothing items (ex.; shoes, seasonal: pants/jeans/sweat-pants, short and long-sleeve shirts/sweats; blankets, hats, gloves, coats/sweaters). Mechanically, showers are provided by a single mobile shower unit, consisting of a dual-shower/sink trailer towed by a truck. Operationally, showers are provided by a generous and loval base of volunteers. Associated services include a hot, sit-down meal, courtesy of St Andrew's Saturday Food Ministry and, courtesy of the Neighborhood and Education Center: Mail Distribution, Computer Tech Lab, monthly TrueCare Medical and Dental Vans and San Diego County Healthcare professionals. Showers of Blessings services are also provided weekly, on Tuesday's from 8 am till 11 am, by St Patrick's Catholic Church at their Father Moore Center on Madison Ave in Carlsbad. The Shower unit is stored at the Father Moore Center when not in use.

In 2023 at St Andrew's, over 1,300 SoB guests received showers (22-29/week) and 700 haircuts were given, while overall our number of guests signing-up for services increased from 1,600 to 2,200. This amounted to over 2,200 hours graciously donated from our dedicated group of volunteers.
