
Ceiling Shattering: How Do American Women See Kamala Harris?

Kamala Harris is the second woman to be nominated by the Democrats in 8 years. Her candidacy embodies a potential historical first woman to be President, as well as other identities, including her biracial identity.

We asked 1487 women across the country how they viewed the political import of the Harris candidacy, with an emphasis on how they view key messages connected to the key role Women of Color play in defending and advancing American democracy from their position of intersectional insight (and historic exclusion).


We found that women's views on Harris are strongly colored by partisanship and ideology, and diverge across racial lines. But providing more information about her—even something as simple as reminding them she may soon be the first female President of the USA—increases support for her and may spur further action for women candidates and Democrats down the line.

We also dug into the idea of "Linked Fate" among women—the idea that women's fortunes in society are connected. This is a strong predictor of agreement with feminist politics, and an area for further messaging and study.






In the topline horserace, most segments of women lean toward Harris, but her lead is not huge and substantial numbers remain undecided






There's a lot of uncertainty about how much of a hurdle Harris's gender will be in winning the election






Enthusiasm for Harris's historic "first" potential is highly correlated with partisanship






Appreciation of her role model potential is more widespread






Appreciation of her role model potential is more widespread






There is a lot of uncertainty around how to place Harris in the lineage of WOC leading democracy






And a lot of uncertainty around whether to center Women of Color in democratic efforts







Black Women are Much More Likely to See Harris (and Women of Color) as Important Leaders for Democracy




The Implications of Harris's Identities *Vary:* Women are likely to see her candidacy as making women overall, and Black women, more represented—but much less so Asian women



(Re-)Introducing a National Figure

Harris's move to the top of the ticket was met by a burst of enthusiasm, but many voters are still unfamiliar with her despite her time as VP. Most are still learning about her personal and professional background

The campaign has leaned into some aspects of that background that connect to potential policy priorities. For example:

- A childhood steeped in civil rights activism that connects to current attacks on inclusive education, DEI efforts, and how we teach American history
- Support for womens rights, especially by fighting threats to abortion and other reproductive healthcare
- A "smart on crime" prosecutorial background that contrasts her concern for protecting the vulnerable with Trump's pattern of abusive behavior
- Experience as Biden's VP, inheriting some foreign policy commitments (especially in Ukraine and Gaza)

Message Test: Experimental Framework

To evaluate what kinds of appeals are likely to re-engage women voters to motivate support for Harris this cycle, we tested several messages:


- (1) A control message that Harris is an historic candidate because of her identities as a Black woman;
- (2) A message using the **Alliance for Black Equality's ad frame** that describes Harris's roots in the Black community and her plans protect **the accurate teaching of Black history in schools** from attacks by Republicans (**Book bans message**);
- (3) A message describing Harris's commitment to equal rights for women and to **protect abortion rights** from bans allowed by Trump and the Supreme Court (*Abortion message*);
- (4) A message describing how Harris is committed to Israel's right to self-defense and though she supports a cease-fire in Gaza will not push for an end to weapons sales to the Israeli government (*Hawk message*).
- (5) A message describing Trump's criminal background and Harris's experience as a "smart on crime" prosecutor who used the law to protect vulnerable people (*Prosecutor message*);




Outcome: Change in Support for Harris

- Providing more information can move many voters, especially those not familiar with Harris
- Even the control condition—simply telling respondents she was Black and a woman—increased her approval among a (net) 10.5% of respondents.
- The other messages moved similar numbers of respondents.
 - The **Abortion** message, which is the message most clearly connected to gender, had a low net effect, likelydriven largely by the parties' well-known positions on the issue. Among non-Republicans, it is a net +17, similar to the other messages.
 - The **Book Bans** message draws very little backlash among women, making it a strong net positive, especially among Black and white women. It is much less popular among Asian women.
 - The Hawkish message was as influential as the control, but also had high negatives among younger and more liberal voters; in a separate poll, it was actually net-negative among Gen Z men.
 - Perhaps surprisingly, the **Prosecutor message** is the strongest net overall, driven by positive responses among more conservative white and Asian respondents
- In the electorate overall, it is not clear that substantive framing does much to reliably find more support for Harris, especially among lower-engagement women. Simply providing the anodyne historic "first" information does about as well, and produces no negative reaction. Tarrgeted framing may be more effective within particular groups:
 - The Book Bans and Abortion message worked particularly well for Black Women and White Liberal women
 - The Abortion message worked particularly well for Asian and Latina women

Onward!

- The core elements of Harris's plan to further introduce herself tend to positive or neutral reactions from Black voters.
 - All five frames for introducing Harris increased approval and favorability among voters who don't know her already, and majorities connected them with Democratic values
- However, the Hawk and Prosecutor frame are riskier
 - They increase approval overall, but also slightly turn off some key groups of voters.
 - For messages targeted at Black voters and women, we recommend these messages be muted or crafted with great care.
- Building consciousness of connections between women—their Linked Fate—may boost support for WOC-led politics generally and KH as a candidate in particular



About this poll

- Respondents recruited through Cloud Research panel, September 5-10, 2024
- Total N=1487; oversamples of Black and Latina women
- Weighted for national representativeness where appropriate, for within-group representativeness on race-group-only estimates



The Agenda: In General, the Harris Campaign Engages on Women's Top Issues


- Women are half the population, so on questions like issue priorities we're not surprised to find that women's top priorities are similar to other polls' results in the population at large.
- The variation in issue priorities across racial subgroups of women (following slides) are more noteworthy
 - Black women prioritize race; other POC groups all de-prioritize it, or emphasize immigration












...But Subgroups of Women Want Different Emphases




