43 schools participated in the first Kansas Walk to School Day.

In October, Kansas joined communities across the country and participated in Walk and Roll to School Day. The Kansas SRTS program created materials and templates to help support these communities to make holding the event easy and fun.



44 communities registered for our first Kansas Bike to School Day.

The Kansas SRTS program created a toolkit and other resources to help communities across the state plan for and hold their events. Registered communities also received encouragement items like bike lights, a multi-tool, banners, and more to make the day special for everybody!



6 Safe Routes to School Plans were completed as part of the Planning and Programming Grants.

These plans identify programs and projects that make walking, biking, and rolling easier, safer, and more fun in these communities.
