

2023-2024 YEAR-IN-REVIEW

NOTE FROM QRITICAL CO-LEADS:

In 2023, we founded and launched QriTical: queer + trans research hub to serve as a connector and intellectual hub for Two Spirit, Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Queer, Intersex, Asexual (2SLGBTQIA+) faculty, staff, students, and the broader community at Mount Royal University. QriTical is a university-wide and interdisciplinary initiative that aims to bring together 2SLGBTQIA+ people from across campus and the broader community.

Building OriTical was motivated by a variety of factors at MRU, including a 2022 hiring year which saw 60 new faculty join the campus community. Many new gueer and trans studies scholars from a wide range of disciplines joined MRU at this time, and it became clear that there was a need for a pathway to connect and collaborate. While MRU hosts a variety of student-focused spaces, 2SLGBTQIA+ faculty members as a group have not been collectively engaged in relation to their research, teaching, or community-based activities. MRU also lacked a space to facilitate connections between 2SLGBTQIA+ students, staff, faculty and the broader community. We saw this gap in support for 2SLGBTQIA+ research, teaching, and community-engagement as an opportunity to create something new and innovative at MRU.

We aim for the OriTical hub to be a space where people come together to build intellectual communities, solidarities, and a sense of belonging. We see our work with the hub as supporting and uplifting research, teaching, and community mobilizations that challenge cisgender and heterosexual norms from an intersectional lens. We are explicitly committed to decolonial, anti-racist, anti-oppressive engagements with queer and trans studies, and our work aims to facilitate social change.

Our first year was focused on building visibility and establishing the hub on campus. Through conversations in Summer 2024, we secured a home-base in the Trico Changemaker Studio, where we have office space and are able to hold meetings and host community members and events. In Fall 2024 we gained university-wide recognition as an official "Research Collaboration". We also wrote a lot of grants, sought internal and external funding for a range of faculty, student, and community-focused events that we highlight in this report. By all measures, OriTical had a banner first year!

Moving forward, our hope is for OriTical to continue to grow as a connecting place for 2SLGBTOIA+ communities within and outside of the university, to support initiatives that aim to foster solidarity and

community, and to establish MRU as a key site for queer and trans studies locally, provincially, and nationally. In order to continue the work of QriTical, we are seeking consistent and sustainable funding which will increase our abilities to expand our programming, to facilitate longer-term initiatives geared at structural and social change, to redistribute resources to enable a broader array of 2SLGBTQIA+ student, staff, faculty, and community initiatives, and create time to continue to build and sustain meaningful relationships.

The success of OriTical would not be possible without our Core Faculty team, Jill Thompson, Gloria Perez-Rivera, Gio Dolcecore, and Lisa Gasson-Gardner, and our student assisstants, Mel Perez-Morales, Zachary Barnes and Jules De Guzman.

We ate beginning to dream about our initiatives for the 2024-25 academic year and we can't wait to continue what we've started!

LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT



ALBERTA TRANS STUDIÉS TEACH-IN

On January 31st, premier Danielle Smith announced a slew of new gender and sexuality policies focused on education, healthcare, and sport. Under the guise of "preserving choice" for kids and "extending care" for adults, these policies will directly and negatively impact children, youth, and our students in the immediate future.

In immediate response to this announcement, OriTical organized an online teach-in featuring 8 trans studies scholars and experts from Alberta who engaged with attendees to dispel mis/disinformation, explore the impact of the proposed policies on communities, and to explain the larger context in which these proposed policies emerged.

More than 850 members of the general public from across the country attended.

The Alberta Trans Studies Teach-In was supported by the MRU Faculty of Arts, MRU Department of Child Studies and Social Work, the MRFA (Mount Royal Faculty Association), the 2SLGBTQ+ Health Hub, and the J-Series (Athabasca University).

HISTORY WITH A DRAG QUEEN: NAZI PUNKS F*CK OFF

On February 8th, this event drew more than 200 community members and MRU students, faculty, and leadership for an evening of learning with Karla Marx (developed and embodied by Dr. Victoria Bucholtz, MRU faculty). Known for her comedic brilliance, riveting historical analysis, and cheeky approach to educating through entertainment, Karla Marx and company used the art drag to lead the audience on a reflective journey through histories of facism and the contemporary rise of global fascist politics.

Paying particular attention to questions of gender and sexuality, Marx invited the audience to think critically and carefully about the role that "sexual anxiety" is playing in our current social and political landscape. In the context of growing and loudening anti-2SLGBTQIA+ movements in Canada- often under the guise of "protecting the children"- this teach-in offered offered audience members a chance to better understand the functioning of "sexual anxiety" in right-wing movements while enjoying drag numbers by Karla Marx, Smokey Waters, Rip Em, and Ruffen Tumble.



THE TEA: QRITICAL DIALOGUES IN TEACHING AND LEARNING

"The Tea" dialogues are an opportunity for MRU faculty and staff to informally discuss teaching and learning experiences and strategies. In January 2024 we held one dialogue focused on "Teaching Gender and Sexual Diversity" in which we discussed how the rise in "antigender ideologies" and anti-2SLGBTQIA+ hate movements were affecting our classroom dynamics, pedagogical approaches, and approaches to supporting students.

In February 2024 we convened "Holding Space", a gathering for 2SLGBTQIA+ staff, faculty and allies to digest and discuss the impacts of new anti-trans policy announcements on campus life.



THE QUEER AGENDA

What's on your queer agenda for 2024? Held on March 1st, this community showcase featured panelists from MRU and the broader community who shared what was on their queer agendas for 2024. Showcasing advocates, community organizers, MRU students, this event brought together 'town and gown' for an afternoon of sharing, strategizing, and queer joy! More than 70 members of the community, students, faculty, staff, and administration attended this event.



This event, overall, was genuine in being inclusive towards the 2SLGBTQIA+ community. Not only that, but they were also very inclusive of specifically the BIPOC 2SLGBTQIA+ community. ORITICAL LAUNCH

Following The Queer Agenda on March 1st, we officially launched the QriTical hub! Hosted at the Trico Changemaker Studio, the launch party featured MRU's very own Karla Marx (MRU faculty member Victoria Bucholtz) with fellow performers King Smokey Waters, Dayna Hart (MRU alumni), and Doggi Chow, and DJ Mollyfi.

OriTical is the first university-wide research hub that focuses on queer and trans studies and the first 2SLGBTQIA+ initiative that brings together faculty, students, staff, administration, and the community to facilitate and celebrate research, teaching, and community engagement.

Over 50 community members, students, faculty, staff, administration, and alumni attended the launch to celebrate this milestone at MRU and to connect with 2SLGBTQIA+ folks on campus.

QUEER JOY! ART + ACCOUNTABILITY ON ALBERTA POST-SECONDARY CAMPUSES

The Queer Joy! project was a collaboration among Mount Royal University, MacEwan University, Norquest College, and Olds College.

Recognizing a need to build solidarity among postsecondary 2SLGBTQIA+ students, staff, and faculty, we got together to plan a multi-campus arts event focused on queer joy. Held on March 13th 2024, this event brought together more than 70 students, staff, faculty, and alumni from across our four campuses for a collective arts engagement session facilitated by social artist Melanie Schambach.

The Queer Joy! digital mural contains artworks from 53 2SLGBTQIA+ participants. This image was created by, with, and for 2SLGBTQIA+ people. Our hope is that it resonates and sparks joy among those who encounter it, and that by dwelling on different aspects of the images viewers can reflect on the importance of queer joy in our lives and what queer joy can look like.

LET'S GET QRITICAL! STUDENT COLLOQUIUM

This inaugural student colloquium showcased the research, creative, and community organizing work of 2SLGBTQIA+ MRU students. Held on April 5th in alignment with MRU Research and Scholarship Days, the student colloquium brought together more than 50 students, their families, communities, and MRU faculty, staff, and administration in a half-day of learning and celebration.

The event included two interdisciplinary student panels and a digital display of creative works. Twenty MRU students from faculties across MRU showcase their work in this event, including from the Faculty of Arts (Psychology Women & Gender Studies, Criminal Justice), the Faculty of Business and Communication Studies (Journalism), and the Faculty of Community Health & Education (Social Work, Child Studies).


