Code of Ethics

*A Note about the Code of Ethics - We recognize that birth work is incredibly nuanced and that some birth photographers will practice in a way that is different or unique to what we suggest here. This code of ethics is simply meant to be a guiding document that will help influence your own business and practice.**

O1 Basic Requirements

All Certified Birth Photographers Shall:

- Have fulfilled the requirements outlined for Certification. Photographers may choose between three avenues to gain certification, outlined on our Certified Birth Photographers Web Page.
- Acknowledge and adhear to our Code of Ethics





O2 Additionally, All Certified Birth Photographers Must:

- Have attended and photographed at least 15 births.
- Maintain a professional camera and at least one professional lens, as well as adequate backup gear.
- Maintain a professional website with a visible, highquality portfolio of birth work.
- Possess a thorough understanding of editing techniques and professionally edit each image that is delivered.
- Carry liability insurance and provide appropriate professional contracts to protect both themselves and their clients or models
- Have a solid relationship with a professional back-up photographer

03/ Business Requirements

- Carry appropriate business liability insurance
- Use a legal contract for each birth session, client, or model that clearly outlines the expectations of all parties involved
- Maintain necessary local business licenses
- Pay applicable taxes including but not limited to State, Federal, Income, and Sales tax
- Charge a living wage to both support themselves and to increase the success of birth photographers locally and internationally
- Foster and encourage the overall positive perception of value of birth photography offered at sustainable rates



- Maintain professional communication with peers, clients, families, and other birth professionals
- Maintain a professional website with a portfolio of images
- Refrain from plagiarism, copyright, and trademark violations in every form

04/ Working with clients


- Maintain prompt and professional communication with clients and families
- Maintain clear communication with clients before, during, and after the birth
- Respect family's freedom and ability to choose their care provider
- Respect the families and birthing persons freedom to make their own birth and health choices

Together we can do more

- Protect clients privacy and personal medical information by understanding and respecting HIPPA guidelines
- Refrain from offering medical advice or services to clients unless concurrently hired and legally contracted as a care provider
- Avoid harm and operate their business with compassion
- Use inclusive language and maintain a business presence that is free of discrimination, judgement, and hate

05/ Working in the Birth Space

- Not photograph or film any other hospital patients or bystanders while attending a birth
- Honor the sacredness of birth and each family's space and needs during the birth process
- Place the family's story and desires above all else, including the desire for certain portfolio images
- Be willing to stop photographing or using flash if client feels disrupted Work collaboratively and professionally with each family's chosen or assigned birth team
- Work thoughtfully in tandem with and support of other birth professionals, even if they are not doing the same
- Not get in the way, or obstruct the work or movement of the family, client, or other birth workers in the birth space
- Comply with requests of medical care providers, including the request to stop photographing or filming



06/ Knowledge, Gear, Skills

- Maintain at least one professional camera body and lens, in addition to a quality back-up Have a solid understanding of their camera & gear
- Have a solid understanding of the exposure triangle, aperture, shutter speed, and ISO
- Have a solid understanding of how to create engaging images with sharp focus
- Know how to work in multiple lighting conditions including but not limited to low light, candle light, sunlight, window light, fluorescent light, operating room lighting, and spotlights
- Know how to create natural, true-to-life skin tones through lighting and editing
- Know when to use flash and when to turn it off



- Maintain and develop the skills and equipment necessary to document births in a variety of settings, including small rooms, cluttered rooms, outdoors, and the operating room
- Know how to edit and finish images

07/ Birth Knowledge

- Adhere to basic safety principles when working in a hospital, birth center, and home birth environment
- Have a working understanding of common birth terms, including dilation, effacement, station, breech, Pitocin, and Cesarean Section
- Have a working understanding of common interventions and complications, including but not limited to vacuum or forceps extraction, episiotomy, and meconium aspiration.
- Not need to rely on the birth team for information about when to expect a birth to happen



08/ Professionalism

- Mindfully post images that were explicitly approved via a model release contract
- Keep their personal problems and conditions from interfering with their work
- When necessary, use a back-up photographer if they are unable to professionally provide the services promised for any reason (including being under the influence of drugs or alcohol)
- Develop a community in which reliable backup photographers are readily available
- Respect the process of birth
