BRENDAN MOLLOY CHATS TO THE SENIOR SQUAD TEAM MANAGER, STEVIE HOLISZ

I RECENTLY caught up with Steve Holisz to find out about his life in rugby and how he fits in the busy senior squad team manager role with a demanding career.

'I'm a St Boswell's boy. I started playing rugby at the age of 8... Crichton Cup and all that. I played in all sorts of positions... winger, scrum half, even flanker. Then at 22 I moved to Leicestershire with work, and played for Hinkley - I had to drive past 3 other clubs to get there but they wore black



And how did you get into the Team Manager role?

"When my son Joe started playing, I was helping out with the mini coaching....with Scott Wight, Kev Brown and other parents. Then, during Covid, I had a conversation with Moff which led to me coming on board as a Team Manager. There were four of us to start with (Robbie Brown, Gus Redburn, lain Lindsay and myself), eventually looking after the whole Senior Squad, but over time this has settled down to myself and lain sharing the role."

And, forgive me for asking, but what does a Team Manager do?

"We make sure the coaches, players, physios and medical staff have everything they need in order to deliver to the best of their abilities. This could be anything from clean kit, correct kit (Steve is already thinking about shirt logos for next season!), pre- and post- match food, transport to away games etc. But to be honest it's more than this. It's about being there, particularly for the young lads coming through. It's not just about getting rugby results, it's about helping the squad become better people. I believe we're good at providing a 'safe place' to lads at the club who need to open up, to get support and to not be afraid to ask for help."

You have a demanding career, and I know you commit a lot of your spare time to Melrose Rugby. So why do you do it?

"I suppose I missed rugby after I stopped playing. I enjoy being around the squad and the coaching team - there's a sense of camaraderie and togetherness on a Tuesday and Thursday evening at training, and on a Saturday of a match, that I love. Helping people achieve their potential - that's very rewarding, and the lads are extremely grateful - they acknowledge how much effort we put into the finer detail of things. And there are some great days on the pitch....I loved last year's success in the King of the Sevens - that was special."



...IT'S ABOUT BEING THERE, PARTICULARLY FOR THE YOUNG LADS COMING THROUGH..."

Something I always ask: what are your thoughts on the future direction of the club?

"Things are uncertain at the moment, especially with the changes to the Super Six. Until things are clear, it will naturally be unsettling, and challenging. But with change comes opportunity, and I believe we are in a good place to adapt and overcome these challenges."

Finally, what three words would you use to describe yourself?

- "1. Organised I'm always thinking ahead, I think it's the Project Management side of my day job what's coming up next week, next month, next year?"
- "2. Positive I like to present a positive attitude to the lads, even when things are a bit mayhem the boys don't need to know what's going on behind the scenes!"
- "3. Fun Have the craic, if you're not enjoying yourself, there's no point in doing it!"

Thanks Steve, it was a pleasure to meet up.

THE MELROSE SEVENS weekend kicks off with the Jackson Distillers Hall of Fame Dinner on Thursday 11th April at 7pm. This event will witness the induction of three rugby luminaries – Carl Hogg, Arthur 'Hovis' Brown, and Ross McCann – into the Melrose Sevens Hall of Fame. It's an evening of reflection, reminiscence, and homage to those who have left a mark on the sport.

Youth development and the celebration of women in sports take precedence on Friday 12th. The day starts with the Merchiston Junior Coaching Clinic at 10am, which aims to nurture budding talent and instill a passion for rugby from a young age. As the afternoon unfolds, youth matches and the Melrose Wasps U-16s Drummond Cup provide a platform for emerging stars to show off their skills. Friday evening will see the Melrose Wasps U-18s Tournament take place from 5:30pm, where eight local Borders sides vying for the coveted silverware, the Jim Tellfer Cup and the Melrose Shield.

Concurrently, the Celebration of Women in Sport event kicks off at 6pm, honouring over 30 nominees and championing gender equality in sports. Sponsored by GoFibre, Friday's rugby events will be complemented by the GoFibre Food Village, offering an array of culinary delights including tapas, Greek street food, and artisanal pizza, open throughout the weekend to fuel spectators.

On Saturday 13th April, the climax of the tournament unfolds with the highly anticipated 1883 Centenary Cup, commencing at 11:04 am with a clash between Hawick and Currie.

Among the teams set to dazzle spectators are the South of Scotland Barbarians, brimming with local talent including Finn Douglas, and defending champions Monaco Impis, bolstered by the presence of former Springbok Sevens star Dylan Sage. The opening fixtures promise enthralling local derbies including Gala vs Peebles and Jed-Forest vs Kelso, with hosts Melrose eagerly anticipating a showdown against the victor of Selkirk vs Edinburgh Accies.

Later in the afternoon, the women's Mike Bleasdale Cup, proudly sponsored by Breadalbane Finance, kicks off just after 3:30pm, promising adrenaline-fueled encounters and moments of sheer brilliance on the field.

The Fanzone, a vibrant hub of activity in The Triangle, will be filled with excitement throughout the day, offering entertainment options for spectators of all ages. As dusk descends, the Fanzone transforms into a party zone, with local DJs Callum Gallagher and Dougie Telfer leading revelers on a musical journey through the decades.

For easy travel to and from the event, ScotRail and Borders Buses have collaborated to provide a great shuttle service. An additional train service departs Tweedbank at 19:52 to provide an easy commute post-final, while the 777 shuttle bus service will shuttle spectators between Tweedbank train station and Melrose.

For those unable to partake in person, the excitement of Saturday's rugby action will be broadcasted on the BBC iPlayer from 4:30 pm, with the entire day's proceedings available for viewing on the Melrose Sevens YouTube channel.

YOUTH SURVEY RESULTS

MELROSE Rugby Youth Section ran the 2024 Youth Survey among parents and guardians over the last month.

The purpose of this survey is to understand the key issues and challenges facing the parents and our youth players. We are specifically looking at what parts of the youth section are working well, what bits need a bit of spit and polish, and what bits need a complete rethink.

The survey closed on the 15th of March and the results are in!

There was a ton of great feedback (thank you!) and in the main, the responses fell into 4 sections. We will be reporting back on how we are trying to improve based on this feedback (as well as reaching out to ask for volunteers to help in some of these areas) in future issues of The Rose - but for this and next month's edition, here is a little more detail on each section and what we are doing immediately from your feedback.

1. COMMUNICATION

YOU SAID:

You don't know what's going on with the wider club, the board, at the Youth Committee.

SO WE ARE:

Sharing The Rose to everyone on Teamo to read about everything that's going on in the club, with the board and the wider youth sections. We are also planning to regularly update you on improvements from the Youth Survey feedback in future issues of The Rose. We are also looking at improvements in the Youth Committee to help with information sharing.

YOU SAID:

Coaches want to be more involved with decisions that directly affect them.

SO WE ARE:

Looking at the role of the parent rep as part of the wider Youth Committee structure review, does this do what we need it to? Is this one role or multiple? Should we loop in coaches into key decisions or leave it to the year groups to disseminate information/gain feedback/agreement? We will feedback on this in a later issue of The Rose.







2. THE YOUTH COMMITTEE

YOU SAID:

You don't know who is on the Youth Committee

SO WE ARE

Planning to dedicate this section in a future issue of The Rose to tell you who is on the committee and what their role is, how you can contact them and (importantly) how you can get involved!

YOU SAID:

You don't know who your parent reps are (or what their role is)

SO WE ARE

We are going to detail who the parent representatives are for each year group, what they do and how you can contact them in the Youth Committee update (mentioned above)

YOU SAID:

Much of what is covered at the Youth Committee is not relevant to your child's age group

SO WE ARE:

Looking at the overall structure of the Youth Committee to try and make it more efficient and answer a lot of your feedback, we will cover that in the dedicated Youth Committee section in a future issue of The Rose

YOU SAID:

You would like more info and communication from the Youth Committee and the Board.

SO WE ARE:

Looking at how more parents can be involved and receive communication from the Youth Committee and the Board as well as ask questions and make suggestions, again, we will cover that in the future dedicated section in The Rose.

3. TEAMO

YOU SAID:

Different year groups use Teamo in different ways (some don't use it at all)

SO WE ARE:

Going to engage with all year groups to understand how they use it and (where applicable) why they don't use it to try and find a solution that suits everyone. The main thing to remember here is that Teamo was primarily brought into Melrose Rugby youth section to protect you and your children's personal data (name, age, address, telephone numbers, date of birth, etc...). If any of this information is stored on personal devices or bits of paper there is a risk of loss of data where a coach or volunteer phone is lost or otherwise compromised (e.g. Google or Apple account is hacked into) or the paper is lost or blows away at the side of the pitch. So, it's important that as much information as possible is stored in Teamo. That said - we do understand and share some of the frustrations around the ease of use of the platform.

YOU SAID:

You get too many messages from Teamo

SO WE ARE:

Speaking to Teamo to see what can be done about this. We understand this is generally where a parent has more than 1 child or where the parent or child is in multiple Teamo groups that all get the same message (and therefore you get the same message multiple times). Unfortunately, this is a problem with the Teamo platform and we need to rely on them to resolve. The Teamo support team are very helpful and engaged so we hope we can find a solution soon.

4. MAKING EVENTS & MATCHES MORE FAMILY FRIENDLY

YOU SAID:

You would like to bring your children to club events and senior matches but there isn't enough to keep them engaged

SO WE ARE:

Going to look at ways to make events and match days more engaging for the youth section and try and look at ways to get the youth more involved with senior match days. One idea is creating a rota to allow all year groups to be part of a guard of honour at home games in the coming season!





YOUTH RUGBY

U18s

OUR VALIANT U18s played their last 15 a-side games of their season with two friendlies against Merchiston and North Berwick. Both games were played on The Greenyards and unfortunately resulted in resounding defeats.

What was remarkable was how the squad galvanised through the season. They showed resilience and determination despite going down to some heavy defeats. "Credit to the boys" said forwards coach Kev Brown.

"Many other teams would have folded in such adversity, but these boys had eachothers' backs and grew together as a team as the season went on". The U18's focus now turns to Sevens' tournaments across the Borders.



U16s

MELROSE WASPS U16s came up short in the East Youth Cup Final at the DAM Health Stadium on Saturday 23rd March. The boys came from 17-0 down to give themselves the chance to win the game, eventually losing out to a strong Currie side 37-33.



The character of this group is epitomised in how they play, they never give up. In 2021, this age group had 6 players. That core group have been influential in growing the playing group and ensuring that new players are welcome and always encouraged to be able to fulfil our fixture's in the Borders Conference. The future is exciting for these players both individually and as a group as they move into U18 Rugby next season.

FOR 2024/25

THE SRU made the recent announcement of the league reconstruction for next season. This has happened as Super 6 will finish after the Sprint Series.

The Southern Knights has been a difficult chapter the club's journey. The concept was a good one but was not widely supported. Everyone has their view, but the idea was to give players (mainly younger players) the opportunity to play at a higher level of rugby to bridge the gap between club and pro rugby. The rugby at this level was undoubtedly of a higher standard than club rugby. Our squad for this upcoming Sprint Series is an exciting one with many good local players involved and a local coaching team. Please give them your total support over this last Sprint

Series - the players deserve it.

Regarding the leagues for next season, the SRU did a good job in a very short time of putting a focus group together, involving discussions with all clubs in National 1,2,3 & 4 as well as the present Super 6 clubs. Seven options were put on the table and other options welcomed. There was never going to be a solution that would suit everyone but, in my opinion, there were good rugby discussions by most involved. Unfortunately, there were some with only self-interest, but they were in the minority. The recommendation
