

Here are some fascinating facts about dinosaurs:

Word Origin: The term "dinosaur" comes from the Greek words "deinos," meaning "terrible," and "sauros," meaning "lizard," translating to "terrible lizard".

Time Span: Dinosaurs roamed the Earth for over 150 million years, from the Triassic period about 230 million years ago until the Cretaceous-Tertiary (K-T) extinction event 65 million years ago.

Extinction: Most dinosaurs suddenly went extinct about 66 million years ago due to an asteroid impact, volcanic eruptions, and climate changes.

Size Variance: The smallest dinosaurs were the same size as hummingbirds at only 2 inches (5 centimeters) long, while the longest reached over 120 feet (37 meters) in length.

Feathered Dinosaurs: Many dinosaurs had feathers, not just avian dinosaurs. The largest known feathered dinosaur was the Yutyrannus huali, a super predator and cousin of T-Rex.

Longest Neck: Sauroposeidon had an exceptionally long neck, estimated to be around 39 feet in length.

Flying Reptiles: Pterosaurs, often confused with dinosaurs, were flying reptiles that lived alongside dinosaurs.





Compulsory Recipe

Traditional Parkin Recipe

Yorkshire Parkin is a traditional British ginger cake that is particularly popular during Bonfire Night and Halloween. Here's a recipe for a classic version:

Prep Time: 15 minutes - Cook Time: 1

hour 35 minutes

Servings: 12

Ingredients:

110 g soft butter

200 g golden syrup

110 g soft dark brown sugar

55 g black treacle

110 grams self-rising flour

225 g medium oatmeal

2 tsp ground ginger

1tsp ground mixed spice

Pinch of salt

2 medium eggs (beaten)

1 tbsp milk

Instructions:

Preheat the oven to 275 F / 140 C / Gas Mark 1. Grease an 8 x 8-inch square cake tin.

In a large, heavy-based saucepan, melt together the butter, golden syrup, brown sugar, and black treacle over a gentle heat. Do not allow the mixture to boil; you simply need to melt them together.

In a large, spacious baking bowl, stir together the self-rising flour, oatmeal, ground ginger, nutmeg, mixed spice, and baking powder.

Gradually add the melted butter mixture, stirring to coat all the dry ingredients and mix thoroughly.

Gradually beat in the eggs a few tablespoons at a time.

Add a tablespoon of milk at a time if the mixture feels dry. You are looking for a soft cake batter. Stir well.

Pour the mixture into the prepared tin and cook for 1 1/2 hours, until firm, set, and a dark golden brown.

Remove the parkin from the oven and leave to cool in the tin.

Once cool, slice and store the parkin in an airtight tin for a minimum of three days for the best flavour.





RULES AND GUIDANCE FOR COMPETITORS 2025

GENERAL

There is no entry fee for entry to any of the competition classes except for the Companion Dog Show (details see Schedule). However all those wishing to be on the Showground during the Show must purchase must purchase and wear an admission wristband.

COMPETITION CLASSES

The following rules apply unless otherwise indicated in the description of a class:

- 1. Entries accepted from residents of the Parish of Chalfont St Giles and the surrounding area within a 20 mile radius, unless otherwise stated in the class or division.

- 4. Each person may submit only one entry per class, except in Division H Art (check division listing for details). A group entry will **only** be accepted in Class J69.
- 5. Juniors may enter Adult Classes, but may <u>not</u> enter other Junior Classes outside their age group. Juniors wishing to enter adult classes online must follow the instructions given.

The Ian Grant Memorial Salver

Allen Mitchell Trophy (best exhibit by a novice)

HONEY SULTANA AND APRICOTCAKE. Exhibits must be made to this recipe. 227g self raising flour, 227g honey, 113g butter, 2 medium eggs, pinch of salt, 113g sultanas, 60g dried apricots, soaked overnight and chopped, 1tsp of lemon zest, 3tbs milk.

Preparation; Cream the butter with honey until light and fluffy. In a separate bowl, beat the eggs together and gradually add the beaten eggs to the butter mixture a little at a time, beating between each addition, adding some flour if the mixture begins to curdle. Gradually fold in the flour. Add the fruit, lemon zest and milk. Put the mixture into an 18 cm lined round cake tin. Bake at 160°C/(150°Cfan)/325°F/gas mark 3 for approximately 1hr 30mins until the cake is firm. Timing is a guide only as appliances vary.
